

PLAYED A DOUBLE-HEADER

PORTLAND WINS ONE GAME AND SEATTLE THE OTHER.

Two Home Runs Over Left-Field Fence in First Game—Second Was Merely a Slugging Match.

Seattle and Portland played a double-header yesterday, and honors were even at the conclusion. Seattle won the first game by a score of 12 to 5, and Portland the second by a score of 13 to 5.

The largest crowd of the year witnessed the two games. Standing room was premium on the grandstand, and the bleachers were filled to overflowing. It was a noisy, demonstrative crowd, as will be seen by the following scores.

The feature of the first game was two home runs over the left-field fence. Klopff made one for the Seattle team, and Timmer for the Portland team. Both runs occurred in the eighth inning, and Klopff's scored an additional run for Seattle. Until yesterday no home run had been made over the left-field fence this season. Two have been made over the right-field fence, one of them by Muller and the other by Rick Adams, both of Tacoma, but now with the Spokane team.
