### Speculative Sentiment Unsettled by Events of Past Few Days.

NEW YORK, Oct. 8 .- The conflicting vary-ing movements of prices in the stock market ing movements of process in the state inter-today showed that speculative sentiment was considerably unsettled. The buying of yester-day, which came from a few concentrated sources, evidently made an impression on professional traders.
