TACOMA BALL PLAYERS FATTENED THEIR BATTING AVERAGES.

They Fell Upon Pitcher Salisbury and Rained Base Hits Over the Diamond.

Battling averages were fattened yesterday by the Tacoma players at the expense of Mr. Salisbury. Batting rallies in three innings gave the Tacoma men seven runs and the victory, while the Portlands were able to connect with St. Vrain's delivery for only four scattered hits, which brought three men across the home plate. The chief interest of the game was created by the heavy struts of the visiting players. Almost at will base hits were rained out, and the Portland fielders were kept busy running after ground balls and high sky-scrapers. In the first inning the hammering began. The game went wrong for Grims' men at the start, and at no point of the contest were they in sight of the opposing team. McCarthy struck one of the first balls pitched, sending it to Anderson for an easy chance, which he failed to accept in his usually handy fashion. Then Murdock came to the bat. He hit a high fly that was seen to take its flight over the heads of Brown and Muller, who were running back like scared deer to get under it. They ran until they struck the fence, and then paused to see it sail over the red champagne advertisement on the centerfield boundary.

Murdock's Home Run.

Murdock had seen the elusive promise on the fence. "One bottle of champagne to the man hitting this sign." He had the direction of the ball sighted in good shape. But he put more force to the blow than he calculated, for instead of hitting the sign it sailed clean over it. It is a question whether he is entitled to the bottle. Other players have sent the ball over this fence, Tinker and Klop, but neither one of them has home runs compared in length to Murdock's. It looked as if he had designs on the Chapman School building. This brought in Tacoma's first two runs. Portland signed a collective sigh, and started in on the long stern chase.

The third was another miniature Waterloo for Portland. McCarthy again started the conflagration by lining out a hit to center. Murdock flew out to Tinker. Flannery came up with a hit. Lynch added another hit to the total, and McCarthy scored. McIntyre sustained his reputation for a heavy hitter by lining out a three-bagger. McCloskey flew out to center, scoring McIntyre on what some cranks call a "flying sacrifice." Struts ended the inning by striking out.

Portland shone in the fourth to the extent of two runs. With one man out Deist took first on an error. Anderson followed with a base and scored on the same kind of a play. Tinker came up with a hit, scoring Deist, and stole second. Anderson scored on Vignere's out, and Tinker went on to third, and attempted to steal home on a pitched ball, and was touched out by the watchful Zearfoss.

Tacoma crossed the plate for the last time in the fourth. Zearfoss took a walk to first. On the next play St. Vrain sent the ball to Deist, and a neat double resulted, Anderson putting out Zearfoss at second, and McCarthy completing a neat double play in the seventh, retiring Tinker at third and throwing Weed out at first.

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TROOPS GO TO SAMAR.

General Smith Sails From Manila With a Force.

MANILA, Oct. 9.—General Smith sailed from here today for the relief of the island of Samar. He will take command of Samar and Leyte, so as to enable General Hughes to devote himself to the island of Cebu, where trouble is possible unless strong measures are used. General Smith will be accompanied by a battalion of the Seventh Infantry, who are anxious to avenge the disaster to Company C, of the Ninth Infantry. PRINCE CHING'S DEMAND. He Asks That the Foreign Merchants Be Removed From Peking.

PEKING, Oct. 9.—Prince Ching has written to the Ministers of the powers requesting a withdrawal from Peking of the foreign business establishments. He says that Peking is not a treaty port, but a foreign business house has been illegally established here and should be moved to treaty ports. He desires the Ministers to secure their removal.

The Ministers arranged for a meeting to endeavor to agree upon joint representations in opposition to Prince Ching's demand. A controversy regarding the payment of the octroi by foreign merchants has been the subject of the issue. One foreign house doing business with the Chinese objected to the octroi tax, arguing that the goods were for the use of the legation, and that the goods required by the legation could be ordered by them from treaty ports, and when so ordered are not dutiable.

The foreign business community in Peking, although small, is independent. Its presence is essential to the comfort and convenience of the legations, and its removal would be a disaster. The Chinese, however, are determined to have the goods required by the legation moved to treaty ports, and when so ordered are not dutiable.

When the demands to be included in the protocol were framed, Mr. Conger proposed including the opening of Peking to foreign trade. This suggestion was favored by a majority of the Ministers of the powers, but M. De Giers, the Russian Minister, opposed it so strongly that the question was dropped because of the necessity of unanimity.

May Be Compromised. LONDON, Oct. 10.—The Peking correspondent of the Times, in a dispatch dealing with the demand of Prince Ching for the removal of the foreign business houses, says: "Probably the difficulty will be arranged by a compromise. China, considering that reputable merchants should remain pending the revision, and the Ministers agreeing to enforce payment by their respective nationalities of the full duty on the 5 per cent import duty plus the 2½ per cent transit duty, which will come into operation November 11."

To Study French Ordnance. NEW YORK, Oct. 9.—Fifteen Mexican artillery officers sailed for Antwerp on the Red Star Line Southward, today, en route to France, where they will study the manufacture and manipulation of French ordnance. The officers, with a single exception—Colonel Gilberto Luna—are Captains or Lieutenants in the artillery branch of the Mexican Army. They are in the city of Mexico, where President Diaz is spending two years at LeCreusot and study the famous artillery made there, which has been adopted by the Mexican Government in place of the German guns formerly used.

Colonel Luna in an interview said that the Mexican Army is in splendid shape. The country is free from brigands, he said, and in every way is in a peaceful as well as prosperous condition. On the day previous to his departure from the City of Mexico, Colonel Luna had a long talk with President Diaz, who, he said, is in splendid health.

Isank's Anarchist Paper. WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—Abraham Isank, publisher of a paper in Chicago, called "Free Society," formerly known as "The Brand," which was barred from the mails by the Chicago Postmaster last week, has applied for re-entry of the publication to the second class. Postmaster Coyne forwarded a copy of the paper containing an article by Emma Goldman on the assassination of President McKinley for a ruling on the new paper.

Humorous Incidents. NEW YORK, Oct. 9.—A letter purporting to be signed by Chauncey M. Depew, John D. Rockefeller and Mark Hanna was turned over to the police at Newark, N. J., by a stockbroker of that place, and as a result four men are under arrest charged with burglary and arson. The letter was addressed to John Tortorelli and contained the statement that the signers had set fire to the stockbroker's place of business, and referred to articles stolen from the building. Oscar Steigle, Marcus Dussler, Charles Hoyt, stepfather of Dussler, and Ralph Catena, all of Newark, were arrested and are charged with the offense of burning the building, robbing it and then sending the letter. It is said that the men have confessed.

COACH RACE AGAINST TIME. Attempt of Vanderbilt Party to Break Coaching Record Falls.

NEW YORK, Oct. 9.—The coach "Tantivy," in which Alfred G. Vanderbilt, James L. Ross, and Morris E. Howlett endeavored to lower the coaching record from New York to Philadelphia and return, left the Holland House in this city at 5:55 o'clock this morning. The tally-ho reached Trenton at 12 o'clock on schedule time and left at 12:32 for Philadelphia.

The Turn at Philadelphia. PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 9.—Covered with dust and 38 minutes late, but enthusiastic to a degree, the Vanderbilt coaching party arrived at the Hotel Bellevue in this city, the turning point in the record run, at 2:21 o'clock this afternoon. Six minutes were spent at the hotel, and then the return journey to New York was begun. A large crowd greeted the party as the perspiring horses came to a standstill. Mr. Hyde, after laying aside the reins, jumped down and was followed by Mr. Vanderbilt. The party, with the exception of Mr. Howlett, entered the hotel, where sandwiches awaited them. Mr. Howlett waited to turn the coach after the new relay of horses had been hitched up, which he did at 2:32. By the time he got to the Bellevue steps the others were coming out. Mr. Vanderbilt took the box, gathered up the reins, flipped his whip over the horses' backs and started off at a smart trot up Broad street. The crowd cheered and in a minute the coach rounded the City Hall and was lost to view to those gathered at the turn of the street at the Bellevue. Mr. Hyde said that the trip over was a splendid one. The roads were deep with sand in New Jersey and rough in Pennsylvania from Trenton to Bristol. Much of the sand, however, was due to one of the leaders going lame immediately after leaving Trenton, at which place the party was on time.

Over an Hour Late at Trenton. TRENTON, N. J., Oct. 9.—The coaching party reached Trenton on the return trip at 6:43 P. M., one hour and eight minutes behind schedule time. Mr. Vanderbilt drove into Trenton, where three minutes were consumed in making the change of horses. The party left at 6:46. Mr. Hyde driving. Fully 1000 persons were gathered in front of the Trenton House where the party arrived.

Back at New York Three Hours Late. NEW YORK, Oct. 10.—Mr. Vanderbilt and party reached Elizabeth, N. J., at 11:43 o'clock last night, leaving at 11:46. The coach reached the relay station at Newark, N. J., at 12:25 A. M., and left at 12:32. It should have been at Newark, according to schedule, at 9:55 P. M. Wednesday.
