

PORTLAND LOSES BOTH

"HOT AIR JOHN'S" TEAM TOO MUCH FOR THE LOCALS.

Show of Contest in First Game, But Second Was Merely an Indecipherable Slaughter of the Wounded.

These few lines express our feeling, but don't imagine we are squalling. Though we're sad because Tacoma took the two. Six thousand people wondered where the Portland team had blundered. And the double beat has made 'em mighty blue. For the pennant was grateful, but it's sad and likewise fatal. That we couldn't win the last game of the year. Just for one we sure would thank 'em, as it is, we'd like to speak 'em. But we couldn't hear enough 'em, and we got it in the end. The score aptly tell the story of our great city's glory. In a contest swift and gory, in which race we "also ran." "Fair Tacoma, we will greet you, but you bet, we'd like to beat you." Is the turn-out of a disappointed fan. —Ballew.

Six thousand shouting and enthusiastic people saw the last pitched ever the plate yesterday in the last game of the championship series of 1901. The season went out in a blaze of glory, but also in defeat for Portland's proud aggregation, which covering the past weeks ago, and to whom the last few games have been merely practice. Grim's Webfooters were nearly all crippled yesterday; in fact, there was hardly a sound man in the team. Vignore was lame, Tinker was "banged up," Mahaffey was out of the game altogether, while Grim, who took his place, retired at the end of the first announcing that he was "charley-hosed." Glendon, who usually is in the pink of condition, was lame also, but he played both in the league game and the exhibition game which followed it, pitching the latter. Jake Deisel, who seemed to be the only man in the team whose underpinning was substantial, was kept busy running the bases for his maimed and wounded associates.

The first game yesterday was the closing one of the season. The second game was merely exhibition. Portland lost both, being outplayed at almost every point by her less-crippled antagonists. The score was 4 to 2 in the first game.

Tacoma's run-getting started in the second inning. McIntyre led off with a hit. McCloskey followed with a cannon-ball shot to Anderson. He was out, but McIntyre got to third on the play. Stults hit to Weed, who was playing third. Weed fielded the ball poorly, and threw wild over Grim's head on first. This performance scored McIntyre, while Stults took second. Zeafloss followed with a hit, while Stults was caught trying to steal home. Carter came to the bat next, and Vignore tried to catch McCloskey, who was running for Zeafloss's second. Deisel, who was covering the base, let the ball go through him, and McCloskey went on to third. Carter got to first and McCloskey scored for Zeafloss on Salisbury's fumble. The score was 2 to 0. By this time the hopes of the Portland shouters had fallen to zero. They hoped for nothing, but McCarty, the next man up, died at first, and the fatal inning was over.

In the third inning, with two men out, Muller made a two-base hit, which fanned the smoldering hopes of the Portlanders. Great things were expected of Deisel, who followed him, but that young exulted at first, and the side went out. Deisel himself had knocked a two-bagger in the first inning, which profited Portland nothing.

Weed distinguished himself in the third inning by a running one-hand catch of a fly by Flannery, and the end came with two feet of the grandstand, and Portland rose up and shouted.

In the fourth Portland finally got action, not, however, until two men Anderson and Glendon had gone out. Then Sam Vignore opened a clean hit. Weed made himself the hero of the day by landing out a two-base hit, which scored Deisel, who was covering the base. Then old Jack Grim, despite his "charley-hose," knocked out a single, which scored Weed. This tied the game, and it looked as if Portland might win the series.

Grim's "charley-hose" was too much for him, and he was caught trying to purloin third. Tacoma scored again in the fifth. Carter started the game with a double, and McCarty sacrificed him to second. Murdoch failed to connect with first, but with-eyed Jack Flannery, he of the ready tongue, slammed over to the corner, and Carter scored. Lynch was next up, and was hit by a pitched ball. The prospect seemed good for another run, but "Joe Wagon" McIntyre flew out to Muller. From that moment it was all over. The only feature from a Portland standpoint for the rest of the game was Deisel's left-handed catch of a fly by McIntyre. Tacoma, however, had a run in the ninth. Stults struck out, and Zeafloss followed with the hit of the game. It was a three-bagger clear over to the corner of the center field fence. Zeafloss is handicapped by a lame leg, so lame that he wears a knee-pad and brace; but the way he flew around the bases was a wonder. He was cheered to the echo. "Hot Air John" McCloskey took his place at third, and mumbled in when Carter made a single. That ended the run-getting. Portland went out in one, two, three order in the last half of the inning.

It has been a long time since Weed received any applause from the grandstand until yesterday. Although a modest fielder, his hitting is not good; but the plaudits which greeted his performances yesterday more than compensated for the long period of silent toleration with which he has been regarded. The whole game was snappy from start to finish, and 'twas a pity that the pennant-winners could not have kept up their lick in the last game of the year. Salisbury and Carter both pitched good ball.

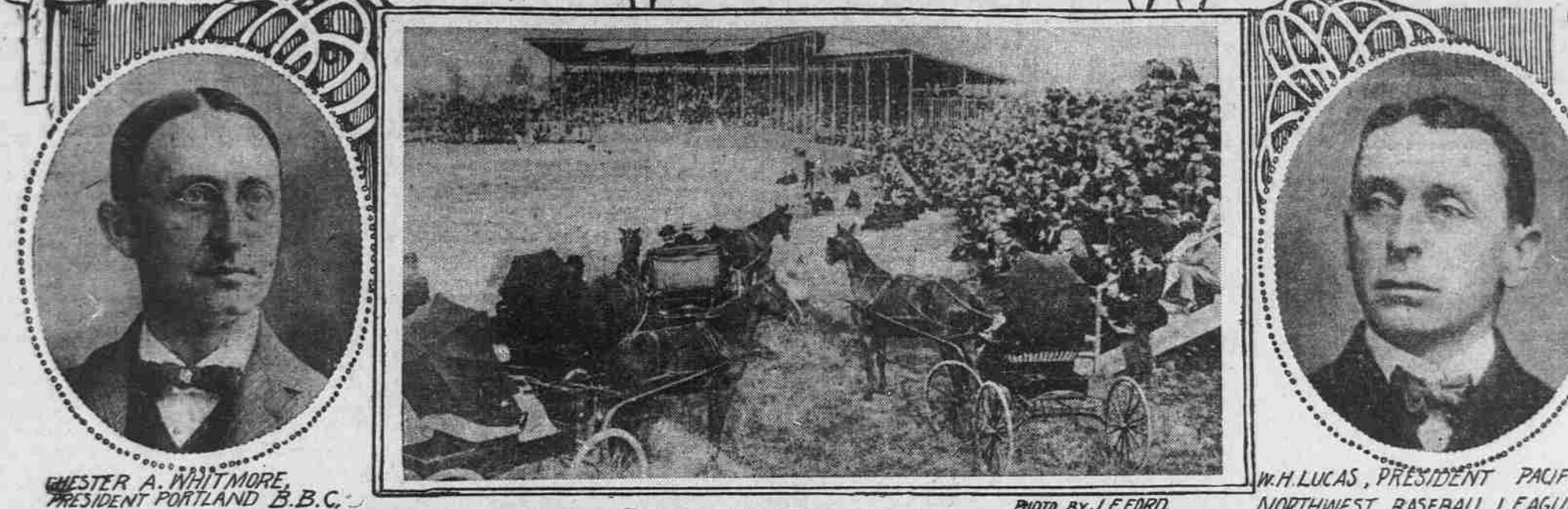

BALL SEASON IS OVER

IT WAS SUCCESSFUL FAR BEYOND HOPES OF PROMOTERS.

Portland Reserves Her Entire Team, Including Manager Grim-McCloskey Out at Tacoma.

Yesterday's games at Seattle and in this city closed the baseball season of 1901. The season has been a most successful one, and has reawakened interest in the National game in the Northwest to a degree that the league managers scarcely dared to hope for at the beginning of the season.

The league has been a financial success, and President W. H. Lucas has been very hard on the money. "Portland and Seattle will both pay dividends on their stock, and Tacoma and Spokane will at least break even. It is possible that they also will pay something on their stock. That remains to be seen."

"We have played the cleanest baseball of any league in the United States," continued Mr. Lucas. "There have been no times when the game has been played in a disgraceful manner of rowdism such as have characterized the game in many other cities, and the quality of ball which our boys have put up has been first class. In every instance, almost, the spectators have had more than their money's worth."

A meeting of the league directors and stockholders will be held in Seattle Tuesday, at which time officers will be chosen for next year. It is certain that the four cities now in the league will continue, and it is possible that others will be added. It will be impossible to give anything definite about this matter, however, until after the league meeting, and it is likely that we will not know anything about it until late in the winter. There is some talk of Montana cities—Butte and Helena—going in. There is also talk of joint teams for Walla Walla and Pendleton and of Vancouver, B. C., and Victoria joining the league. All this talk is in the air as yet, and the situation will have to be carefully canvassed before anything can be arranged."

Following is a list of the players reserved by the teams:

Portland—Entire team, including Manager Grim.

Spokane—Adams, Marshall, Knox, Loughhead, Kelly and Swindell.

Tacoma—Zeafloss, St. Vrain, Murdoch, McCarthy, Stults, Carter, McIntyre, Lynch, Murdoch, Flannery.

Seattle—Frery, Hickey, Harmon, Stovall, Hurley, Peoples, Klop, St. John, Ziegler, Bodie, Rockenfield, Nagel, McGregor, Scholz, O'Connell, and McGee. These are players that Manager Dugdale signed this year, but who have not been given an opportunity to play.

None of the players thus reserved can be signed by any other league in the United States, except the American Association or the National League. As all baseball cranks know, the National League withdrew its protection from the minor leagues several weeks ago. This act forced the minor leagues to organize for their own protection. They have adopted a rule that no reserved player can be signed by any minor league without the consent of the team reserving him. The officers of the National and American have declared their policy to be to sign no reserved players for a minor league without the consent of the team signing him. The Minor League Association has adopted a rule that any reserved player jumping to either of the two major leagues cannot come back to the minor leagues if he fails to "make good" in the faster company. If, however, he is sold by a minor league team to one of the major league teams and fails to "make good," he is eligible to return to the minor league.

It will be observed that the Tacoma league has not reserved its redoubtable manager, John McCloskey. It is no secret that McCloskey is not popular in Tacoma, either with the fans or with the directors of his team. It is said that he has spent too much money for the results he has accomplished, and his year's work has not been a success from a Tacoma standpoint. McCloskey will winter in Louisville.

It is not known who will be the active member of either the Tacoma or the Spokane teams. "Doc" Brown, the Spokane sporting man, will continue, however, to guide the destinies and handle the cash for the Spokane aggregation. Brown is willing, and always has been, to spend money for good players, and it is not his fault that Spokane closes the season at the tail end of the league.

D. E. Dugdale will manage the Seattle team again next season. Dugdale has made a herculean effort to win out against all kinds of ill luck, and throughout the deep gloom that has enshrouded the Seattle team, he has never been known to complain. He will make the effort of his life to get together a pennant-winning team for next year.

Portland's record is best expressed by pointing out the fact that the officers have reserved the entire team. Not only that, it is the team with which the sea-

son was opened, with one addition, Glendon. Portland's team work has won the pennant, and the managers and directors believe that nothing will be gained by releasing any of the present men and seeking for new ones. Many local enthusiasts believe that the team could improve in its hitting, but the fact remains that it won the pennant, heavy hitting or no heavy hitting.

The directors and stockholders of the Portland team will meet tonight to go through the books and figure out profits for the season.

The active spirits in promoting baseball in Portland have been C. A. Whitmore, Jack Marshall, Will Goldman, A. H. Deyers, Major J. P. Kennedy and a number of other enthusiasts, and at the end of the season they are proud of their work and of their team.

BOXERS TOOK A REST.

Smith and Tracey Relaxed Training for Their Contest.

Smith and Tracey, who are training for their 20-round contest, which takes place before the Pastime Club at their rooms in the Exposition building, October 25, did not do any training yesterday, both being in first-class condition and near the required weight. Smith, having to reduce more than his content, has been working very hard, but the mysterious one appears to glory in it. He does 10 miles on the road every morning, after which he receives a good rubbing by his trainer. After a short rest he enters a hearty meal, consisting of rare roast beef, potatoes, soft-boiled eggs, dry toast and a cup of strong green tea. At 3:30 P. M. he goes to work in the gymnasium at the Mikado Hotel. A large crowd gathers every day to see him punch the bag for 10 rounds, skip the rope 500 times, box six rounds with Jost, and use the dumbbells for 15 minutes, all of which he does without the least sign of exhaustion. Frequently the remark is heard that there is no occasion for surprise that such a man has twice been champion of the world.

Portland is in the pink of condition, and fit to put up a stiff fight. He puts in most of his time practicing some new punches with his husky sparring partner, Tom Riley, who says they are effective and takes a long spin on the road every morning, which he says is a great strength-builder.

The board has also adopted a resolution to advertise \$100,000 of the county's bonds for sale November 15. The issue will be refunding bonds and at present the bonds outstanding are drawing 8 1/2 per cent interest. A private offer from the present holders has been made at 4 1/2 per cent, but the board thinks it can do better than this. The bonds will run 20 years, with an option of paying them at the end of 10 years.

The Commissioners have devoted most of the time this session to attending to routine business, and one of the most important road matter has been acted on. This is the Wilson road, which leads from the Hannaford valley into the Hannaford coal mines, 19 miles east of Centralia. Negotiations are pending for the construction of a spur to these mines from Centralia, the O. R. & N. having, it is claimed, secured an interest in the property.

Two more hop sales have been made here. Charles Livesly bought Frank Donahoe's 79 bales at 24 cents and 79 bales from John Carbe at 24 cents. Ten cents and 104 cents has been offered here this week for some choice lots, but owners of the best crops are inclined to hold until returns can be had on samples which have been sent to London.

RESERVOIR GAVE WAY

NARROW ESCAPE OF TWO SCORE PEOPLE IN OHIO TOWN.

Ten Million Gallons of Water Poured Down Hill, Causing Much Damage to Property.

EAST LIVERPOOL, O., Oct. 13.—A city reservoir, containing 10,000,000 gallons of water, burst today and caused \$100,000 damages. No lives were lost, but two score of people had narrow escapes. The reservoir was located 500 feet above the pumping station on the highest hill in the city. It was only completed a few days ago and water was turned into it for the first time this morning. The basin was filled to its utmost capacity and resulted in the walls giving suddenly.

A number of houses are located on the hillside between the reservoir and the city proper. And when the walls collapsed the water shot down the incline with a mighty roar. The noise warned the occupants of the endangered houses, who rushed to places of safety in time to save themselves. A party of children were playing in a road directly in the path of the torrent and though caught by a portion of the rushing water were rescued. A gang of laborers who were laying pipes in a ditch near the wall which gave way miraculously escaped death.

Dozens of large trees were torn from their roots and carried down the hillside with lightning rapidity, being jammed with terrific force against the walls of the Barker Pottery Company's plant. The main building of this plant, with several smaller structures, was badly wrecked. Two large kilns and sheds were dashed to pieces and \$25,000 worth of wares ruined.

The tracks of the Cleveland & Pittsburgh Railroad were covered with thousands of tons of debris and traffic is blocked. The street-car lines, running parallel with the railroad, suffered severely and traffic on a half mile of the track has been abandoned. The pumping station in the direct path of the flood was filled with wreckage and the engines so badly damaged that they cannot be used. Several houses were moved from their foundations.

"Sports" and Farmers.

North Yamhill Record. We note that Portland "sports" are discussing the game laws with a view to so amending them as to better "protect" the game. These gentlemen, it appears, have met with poor success and claim that farmers have pretty well exterminated the birds during the close season. Just what to do is the question that is now bothering them.

It is doubtless a fact that many birds have been killed out of season; and it will continue to be the same just as long as a few men in the city continue to prepare and lobby through the Legislature laws that do not have the sanction of the farming community. Of course, it is unfortunate that there are laws on our statutes that will be indiscriminately violated and cannot be enforced; but it has always been that way not having public sanction are virtually ineffective.

The farmers do not like the present game laws, and are in a position to violate with comparative safety if they see fit to do so. It is questionable if the farmers want any game laws at all, and it is quite possible that if there were no such laws there would be more birds. The same fellows who have primarily caused the enactment of laws forbidding hunting deer with dogs, go to the uplands and with their trained dogs slaughter the birds without mercy. Now let them stop bird-hunting with dogs and observe the effect.

MOVING A SAWMILL.

Mealy Plant Will Be Located Near Clatskanie.

CHBHALIS, Oct. 13.—L. H. Miller, who recently purchased the sawmill property of the Mealy Lumber Company, of this

city, has announced that he will at once remove the mill to a site near Clatskanie, three miles west of Chehalis. The mill will be placed in the midst of a fine body of timber. Mr. Miller has 12,000,000 feet of timber purchased or bargained for at the new location, and there is 50,000,000 feet or more back of it. The mill's capacity will be increased to 50,000 daily. Two miles of steel rail narrow-gauge logging road will be built. The new site is near the Chehalis-South Bend Railroad.

Smelter Finished.

The Quartzburg smelter is completed, says the Blue Mountain Eagle. The plant consists of one 30-ton water jacket, cupola and 90-horsepower boiler, 23-horsepower engine, pump tanks, condenser with a 30-foot by 20-inch stack, No. 4 improved blower, Blake's rock breaker of 40 tons capacity. All the machinery is set on solid rock foundations, laid in Portland cement and brick and stone work. The buildings are large, strong and well constructed. The plant has in addition to the necessary machinery, a good, roomy assembly hall, a blacksmith shop, boarding house and bunkhouses and all the necessary advantages for operating successfully and cheap. In all 25 six-horse teams were employed in hauling the plant into camp. Over 40,000 feet of lumber and 7000 feet of logs, five tons of lime, one ton of cement, 200 perch of stone, 20 yards of sand, 20 bags of nails and about one ton of bolt iron were used in the construction, which shows the plant is planted in Quartzburg to stay. The company will make a run on about 1000 tons at first, and then may wait until early Spring to start again.

The plant has in addition to the necessary machinery, a good, roomy assembly hall, a blacksmith shop, boarding house and bunkhouses and all the necessary advantages for operating successfully and cheap. In all 25 six-horse teams were employed in hauling the plant into camp. Over 40,000 feet of lumber and 7000 feet of logs, five tons of lime, one ton of cement, 200 perch of stone, 20 yards of sand, 20 bags of nails and about one ton of bolt iron were used in the construction, which shows the plant is planted in Quartzburg to stay.
