

COST OF PUBLIC SCHOOLS

NEARLY \$1,000,000 EXPENDED IN OREGON LAST YEAR.

Multnomah County Heads the List on the Score of Reductions Over 1900.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 22.—The total expenditures for public education in Oregon in the last school year amounted to nearly \$1,000,000. The expenditures for what are called common schools and high schools aggregated \$1,461,000, and to this should be added about \$800,000 expended for the support of educational institutions of higher grade, or open only to persons of certain classes, as blind, deaf, etc. The expenditures for the year ending in March, 1901, show a decrease of \$177,000, as compared with the previous year. The following comparative table shows the expenditures by counties for the two school years ending in 1900 and 1901:

The most marked decrease in expenditures is in Multnomah County, where the falling off was \$167,000, or a little over 27 per cent. A comparison of the reports from that county for the two years shows that the greater part of this reduction was under the head of miscellaneous expenses.

The total expenditures for common and high schools in Oregon for the year ending in March, 1901, was \$1,259,125 35.

As the enrollment in the public schools of Oregon is about 50,000, it will be seen that the expense per capita is about \$25 per year. All the reports of county superintendents are now on file in the office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, and after some few corrections the final report will be published. The superintendent will compile the statistics of the schools of the state, so that more accurate and complete figures may be presented.

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Little Change in Their Number in the Last Ten Years.

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
