THE OREGONIAN'S HANDBOOK.—The sales of the handbook by The Oregonian over the counter of the business office on Thursday last exceeded the sales of this book on any single day since publication, with the exception of the day of issue. TONS OF OLD RUBBER.—The sight of truckloads of old rubber boots and shoes, in all about 40 tons, or three carloads, being hauled from Metzger's place on Front street to the depot caused many to smile and make remarks about the Oregon rains. Forty tons of old rubber boots and shoes, but they were all collected in a few months, and from only one of many similar shipments made by the same dealer, who, in the last six years, has shipped over 2,000,000 pounds of old rubber to the East. Among these were several carloads of old bicycle tires, which are kept by themselves and are of less value than old boots and shoes. Rubber hose and belting are not handled as they consist principally of cloth. The amount of old rubber collected and sold in this country last year was about 25,000,000 pounds. During the hard times of a few years past many people made a living by collecting old rubbers. They are ground up and melted and mixed with new gum, and doubtless many sent here come back again in the shape of new rubbers.

ACCUSED PROVED AN ALIBI.—John Bourry, of 229 First street, called at the police station last evening and told about being robbed by a man who he said was standing in a rear room with \$40 in gold in his hand when Charley Mays, a hack driver, snatched the money from him. Mays was produced at the station shortly after the complaint, and with him came two men, who averred they had been riding in his hack with Mays as driver all the afternoon, thus proving a complete alibi. The complainant had been apparently under the influence of liquor and had not fully recovered from it when he was telling his story to the police, so there is grave doubt as to his ability to prove his assertions. Mays was not arrested, but the police are looking into the matter with the object of finding out where Bourry was when the robbery occurred.

WILL PROBABLY REMAIN.—It does not look as though the trees around the plaza blocks would be cut down very soon, as the Park Commissioners are taking a great deal of pains to have the trees along the curb seeded down to lawn grass. There has been considerable objection raised to having the trees cut down, since the subject of removal was broached by the Park Commissioners at the Board of Public Works. The main objection to big shade trees is their removal, the expense of cement sidewalks and the straining of an occasional sewer main, but the friends of the trees aver that Portland's glory is her magnificent shade trees, so what the odds about an occasional sewer pipe or square of cement walk?

FOUGHT OVER THE MORNING PAPER.—D. Moore, who has charge of the furnishing goods department of a city clothing house, was defendant on a charge of assault and battery yesterday in the Municipal Court. A. B. Rummel, a salesman, appeared with a pair of black eyes as proof that he had been struck by Moore, who, he said, would not permit him to read the morning paper. The defendant averred that Rummel had called him over for a period of seven minutes after being ordered to lay down the paper, and in addition to this had struck him with a heavy box containing gloves, thus straining the gloves over the floor. Judge Cameron dismissed the case, evidently believing that Moore had acted in self-defense.

CREATION OF HOLD-UPS.—No hold-ups have been reported to the police since the last issue, when an account of one came from Williamette Heights, and the impression prevails in police circles that the thugs have left for more profitable pastures. The highway robberies perpetrated in Portland this Fall have not netted the outlaws very much cash, though several watches were taken from the various victims. Money is what highwaymen want, however, as watches and jewelry often lead to detection when the robber tries to dispose of them.

TILLAMOOK MAX MISSING.—R. Hill, a Tillamook farmer, is reported missing in this city. He left his home on the 23d for Portland, expecting to undergo an operation at the city hospital. He did not arrive at his destination, 67 East Burnside street, so Mrs. Minnie Nelson, of that address, reported the matter to the police. Hill is 37 years old, six feet tall, weighs about 150 pounds, has dark hair, sandy complexion, smooth shaven and thin face.

COINCIDENCE OF NAMES.—Lawyer Shepherd was engaged yesterday in a divorce suit for a client named Lee, and close beside him intently watching the proceedings sat Attorney Wolfe. The remark was made that it was a combination such as has been known to occasion trouble, but as Wolfe, differing from the other species of the same name, is very peaceably inclined, there was no reason for alarm.

MORE BUILDING IMPROVEMENTS.—H. W. Purbert, who has done more toward building up and beautifying the city by the erection of business blocks than any other man, is now setting property-owners a good example by brightening up his buildings. The Worcester block has been painted and sanded a terra cotta or light red sandstone color, to match the stone entrance, which has greatly improved the appearance of the building. Painters are now at work on the Cambridge block, at the corner of Third and Morrison, painting and sanding it a light gray sandstone tint, which shows up the architectural finish of the building in good style. It is not improbable that several stories may be added to this handsome building in the near future, and an elevator and other modern improvements put in. Property on this corner is worth improving if any in the city, and it is probable that the Falling estate will build on the 150 feet front on the east side of Third, between Morrison and Yamhill, next season. The Fleischner heirs will also probably complete the building on the northeast corner of Morrison and Third next season by adding several stories to it. Such valuable property cannot safely be held down by a one-story building since real estate has such a strong upward tendency.

STALL CROOK OR SCAMMER?—A man who operates a "wheel of fortune" under a little awning in the Farmers' and Mechanics' Exchange, on Front street, was disgusted yesterday. A crowd of 20 or more "farmers and mechanics" had been attracted by his game, and stood watching the iron bar as it went around and around and stopped over the largest prizes, but no one struck a cent, and finally the whole gang walked off. A person seeing them leave in a body stopped to ask the proprietor if he had broken them all that they left in such a hurry. "Now, now," he replied, "they are only a lot of rubbers." He was then asked if his wheel did not come under the designation of a gambling device, and he replied that it was not intended for gambling, but for use at church fairs. A large crowd seemed to be acting as capper for promoter, and a shopkeeper nearby said the machine was so arranged that the operator could stop the indicator at any place he desired. This is not fair, but it proves that there is no gamble connected with betting on the game, for it is a dead springing proposition.

PASTOR SOLD FOR A CHURCH.—The ladies of the First Christian Church have adopted a somewhat novel plan for raising funds to aid in the erection of a new church building at Stark and Columbia streets. Every week a number of the women of the congregation make up a lot of extra superfluous bread, cakes, mince pies, etc., and on Saturdays the grocer at Seventh and Morrison Streets allows space in his store for the sale of these articles, and two women are detailed to attend to the sale of them, and in this way they raise the \$15,000 needed. The women of the church would like to have their friends and the public generally call at Seventh and Morrison Street and buy their wares. A male member of the church, who has existed on such bread, cakes and pies for about half a century, testifies to their excellence, and says the women of the First Christian Church cannot be beaten in the line of pastry cooks.

MANUFACTURERS' SMOKER.—The Manufacturers' Association held their annual meeting and smoker in Alkali Hall at 8 o'clock this evening. Reports from the officers will be received, and an election of eight directors to serve for three years will be held. After the business meeting refreshments will be served and only goods made at home will be consumed. The members have contributed several cases of wine, hams, beef, cheese, cigars and other eatables, and a general good time is expected. This has been a prosperous year for the members, so good feeling will be the order of the meeting. Several new factories have been promoted by the association, and others are in process of development. Their watchword, "patronize home industry," has not been neglected, and the future outlook for home factories looks bright.

FUR SKINS.—Fur-bearing animals are yearly growing less numerous on the coast, and such bundles of pelts as traders used to bring in a few years ago are no more seen here. Quite an assortment of Alaska furs was seen at a store on Front street yesterday. A bale of skins of the hair seal was the largest bundle of the lot. There were several bear skins of two or three varieties and other skins, a pair of sables or martens, and a lot of mink skins. The value of the lot was several hundred dollars, and the work of securing the skins was probably worth \$1000 dollars. A fine set of elk's antlers was near the lot put up in a crate for shipment to Chicago.

PARK COMMITTEE REPORTS.—The Charter Commission sub-committee on parks has prepared a report providing for the creation of a park commission, to have charge of all the parks and public places of the city. The report provides that such commission shall be appointed by the Mayor and shall serve without compensation. It also makes the Mayor or any member of the Common Council eligible to membership in the park commission, which is given power to do anything in connection with parks not inconsistent with the charter itself or any ordinance passed by the Common Council.

INCORPORATION.—Articles of Incorporation of the Sterling Coal Company were filed in the office of the County Clerk yesterday by Lorenzo G. Wilson, James R. Winston and George B. Wilson. Capital stock \$50,000. The objects announced are to mine for coal and to build and operate railroads, especially a railroad from Sterling, Wash., westerly to connect with the Northern Pacific Railway.

FUNGATED.—One of the children at the Florence Crittenton Home died on Thursday of diphtheria. Yesterday the Deputy Health Commissioner, Benj. A. B. B. City Physician Zan treated all the nurses and children with anti-toxin, so no spread of the disease is apprehended.

CONCERNING PURE MILK

STATE LAW IS NOT STRINGENT ENOUGH.

Commissioner Bailey Explains That Its Provisions Permit the Sale of "Blue" Milk.

J. W. Bailey, State Dairy and Food Commissioner, yesterday gave out a statement relative to the inspection of milk by his office. For some weeks there has been a complaint on the part of milk consumers in Portland that they were not being served with the pure article. This complaint has been more general since the dairymen combined and increased the retail price of their product. Many of the consumers take the position that if they are to be charged a higher price for milk they should be served with a pure article, and not with "blue milk." Mr. Bailey said:

"The law of this state says that if milk contains 3 per cent of butter fat it is pure milk. This office cannot force dairymen to sell a pure quality. As a matter of fact, 3 per cent milk is not the best milk in the world, but so long as dairymen comply with that provision of the law, I cannot force them to supply a pure grade.

"I have constantly endeavored to make the milkmen comply with this law, insufficient though it is. I made inspections as often as possible up to the time I went East, and when I did leave here I instructed my deputy to do so. I did not authorize him to institute prosecutions, but he tells me as a matter of fact there was no reason why he should have done so; all the milk that he inspected during my absence complied with this 3 per cent law.

"I feel that this office has been duly diligent in enforcing the pure-food law. We have arrested oleomargarine dealers and other violators of the law, and have sought to keep a check upon dealers in all illegal milk. If any milk consumer of Portland feels that he is not being served with pure milk he has only to send me a sample of the milk he is using, and if I find it defective, after analysis, I will forthwith cause the arrest of the dealer. This is all I can do."

MR. FOLEY TALKS OF ITALY

Chapman School Pupils Hear an Interesting Address.

William Foley delivered a lecture yesterday afternoon, before the pupils of Chapman School, on "Italy," which he said was the center of Christendom, the mistress of the arts and sciences and the depository of sacred learning. The slopes of the wonderful mountain ranges are covered with vast forests of chestnuts, and the foothills are clothed with vineyards, which furnish wines in vast quantities. The scenery is picturesque, undulating and mountainous, and the scenery must be seen to be appreciated.

Of course, the prevailing language in Italy is the Italian, yet the French language is heard in every place of importance throughout the kingdom. There are generally two ways of traveling in Italy, one by railway and the other by post. Both methods were explained in detail. The railway is divided into compartments, each of which generally contains from four to 15 persons. When the traveler enters the car, it is usually well-barred from the outside by an officer of the railway company, so that it is frequently very difficult to secure access or ingress to or from the car without the assistance of the guard. Genoa was described as a beautiful and quaint old city. It is the birthplace of that intrepid and glorious navigator, Christopher Columbus, and it was here that Daniel O'Connell, the great Irish patriot, laid down his life for his oppressed country. The world-renowned "Campo Santo," or cemetery, was described, and the cemetery is situated in a delightful valley, a short distance from the city, and the picturesque hills form a vast and delightful amphitheater. Millions have been spent in this beautiful city of the dead, which embodies all that is grand and beautiful in art and sculpture. Here many of the great families of Italy sleep in dull cold marble, leaving their purple to be worn by others. Affected scenes battle description and bring tears to the eyes of the strongest and most obdurate visitor.

Such scenes demonstrate to us the uncertainty of this life and the necessity of employing our time profitably. They remind us of the death scene of Sir Walter Scott, whose monument Mr. Foley gazed on with interest while visiting Edinburgh. "Be a good man," murmured the great Scotch poet and novelist on his deathbed, to his son-in-law, Mr. Lockhart, "and you will find your reward when you come to be here." The mansion of Columbus and the hotel in which Daniel O'Connell died were described, as well as the catacombs, the Coliseum, St. Peter's Church and the Vatican were described.
