In No Hurry for Dividends.

The depositors of the Portland Savings Bank do not exhibit much eagerness to secure the final dividend declared by Receiver Nixon, as only about one-third of them have called for their share. The bank has a considerable number of depositors who have also failed to call for their share of preceding dividends. The business must be wound up some time, and Receiver Nixon expects to file his final report in the middle of November, and depositors who have not called for their dividends by that time are very likely to be put to some inconvenience in getting their money. It is what disposition will be made of the money not called for, the court has not yet decided. It may be that after holding a reasonable time, the court will order it distributed among the depositors who have called for their dividends. At all events, depositors who have not yet called for their dividends will do well to attend to the matter at once and save themselves trouble.

It becomes dark very early in the fall, and bicycles without lamps will be very dangerous on the sidewalks in the evening. The law allows bicycles to be ridden on the sidewalk and the law also requires that they should carry lamps. PORTER TWO DETECTIVES.

APPROACH OF STREET FIGHT.

The police were informed yesterday that a woman, name unknown, was beaten and kicked in the fight which took place Monday night near the entrance to the Marquam theater, in which H. D. Dwyer, Evans and Lawrence Weaver participated. But after considerable search was made, the police reported that they could not discover the second man who is said to have been in the fight. The fight took place on Morrison street. It was stated at the police station that Weaver was the only man who fought with Evans, and that Weaver was the man who was taken away in the patrol wagon. Weaver admitted taking the \$10 belonging to Charles Roberts, the saloonkeeper, and he gave up the money after trying to hide it from the police station. The various parties in the disturbance stated they had no charges to make against each other.

SMALL DELINQUENT TAX ROLL.

The delinquent tax roll for the year 1900, amounted to \$285,000. Of this amount there has been paid over the counter in the tax-collecting department since the books were opened for the year \$100,000. This leaves \$185,000 to be collected, and is the smallest list of delinquent taxes published for many years. PROTECTING THE JETTY.

Captain Langstaff has contracted with Hale Kern to deliver some 20,000 tons of rock at Fort Stevens. This is to be used to protect the piling driven along the runway to the jetty, and extending to the mouth of the Columbia. In many places the piles are likely to be damaged by the action of the waves during the storms of winter, and a lot of this rock placed around the base of the piles will protect them. Hale Kern has already commenced the delivery of the rock from their quarry near Fisher's landing.

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AN ARTISTIC RECITAL

OVATION GIVEN MRS. BEATRICE BARLOW-DIERKE.

Portland Music-Lovers Showered Applause and Flowers Upon Oregon's Talented Pianist.

That Beatrice Barlow-Dierke is an artist of exceptional gifts was proved beyond a doubt at the White Temple last night. Her recital was the occasion of an ovation from Portland music-lovers. Applause and flowers sufficient for three ordinary recitals were showered upon her. The compliment was well deserved, for Oregon may well be congratulated upon the possession of a young artist who is sure, in the years to come, to shed lustre upon the name of the state.

The programme was an arduous one, making heavy demands upon the pianist. Once, in the midst of the difficult Schubert-Tausig "Marche Militaire," the electric lights went out; but not a break occurred, not a note from the complex and involved chord-masses was dropped, not

a flutter of self-consciousness, vanity or nervousness marred the smoothness of delivery. Perfectly modest and serene under the storm of plaudits, with her mind bent only upon the proper interpretation of the great compositions on the programme, she proved herself the well-trained artist who has her emotions under perfect control, and is mistress of every difficulty that presents itself.

Her extraordinary technique has been so often commended upon that praise seems superfluous. It has gained much in clearness; there are no blurred effects such as might easily mar the effect of the most brilliant bravura passages. "Isle's Death" (Wagner-Liszt) was technically the most difficult number on the programme. A perfect fusillade of splendid chord progressions was thrown off at rapid tempo, with such fire and abandon as to remind one, for the moment, of Von Bulow. The passionate intensity of her rendering of this great creation of Wagner's genius—such as a study of dramatic passion hardly has its counterpart in the whole range of musical composition—was a convincing proof that there is no lack of temperament in the player.

Alexander Lladov's "Musical Box," one of the most interesting novelties of the evening, was technically very difficult, owing to the unusual twists of the hand required on the part of the pianist. This had been specially fingered for her by Rosenthal on his visit to this city about two years ago. Her delicate rendering of this charming number was a delightful bit of work. It is light and fairy-like in character, and the sudden slowing of the tempo toward the end of the music box "runs down," was the perfection of realism.

So much for technique. As for interpretation, she is a true artist. The selection of the Beethoven sonata, No. 28, the well-known "Appassionata," which opened the programme, was the great number of the evening. There has been great development on this point since Beatrice Dierke was last heard in public. The compelling power of the heavy parts and the impressive beauty of her delivery of the more delicate passages made this number the great triumph of the evening. Schumann's "Warum" was also a successful demonstration of her remarkable development in interpretative power. Alexander Glasenow's "La Nuit" proved to be a delightful novelty.

Mrs. Dierke's song, "Unter Bluhenden Mandelbaumen," brought the Portland composer fresh honor. Paul Westinger's rendering of it, as well as of the Franz Schumann and Loebe songs, was an important and delightful feature of the evening.

East Side Young Woman Collides With a Delivery Wagon.
