TEAM ON THEIR WAY TO WASHINGTON.
TON AND IDAHO.

Coch Smith Insists That Referee
Charged Decision Saturday—Multnomah Men Indignant.

The University of Oregon football team, accompanied by Coach W. W. Smith and Manager C. A. Redmond, are in the city on the way to Idaho and Eastern Washington, where the team has several games scheduled. The collection arrived last evening and are registered at the Imperial. They will spend today in the city, leaving on the 6 P. M. train for Moscow, where they will meet the University of Idaho tomorrow.

The team, as a whole, is in good form, although some of the men have not worn off the soreness received in the game of last Saturday. Multnomah was injured in the game with the Indians, is in good shape again and will play in the Idaho game tomorrow. I do not make the charge against the whole team, for most of its members are nice fellows. Fullback Dolph told a crowd of Oregon students that he had plenty of ground on which to question the drop-kick decision, as it was doubtful. I was proud of the way the Oregon men played ball, especially the linemen. The team is in fairly good shape for the coming games and I am sure the boys will give a good account of themselves. We play the University of Idaho on the 6th, at Moscow; the Washington Agricultural College on the 8th, at Pullman; and Whitman College on the 10th, at Walla Walla. We will stop off at Pendleton on the 13th and meet the Pendleton Academy in a practice game."

One of the Multnomah players, when seen last evening, was heard about the game at Eugene. He declined to make any formal statement, but was of the opinion that Captain McDowell was perfectly fair in his decisions and that Professor Burden gave the Multnomah men somewhat the worst of it. The Multnomah men are all indignant because of the charges against Captain McDowell, and the Oregon men are equally indignant over the charges against Professor Burden. The whole affair is most unfortunate and the teams should profit by this experience and select as officials for their future games men who are not connected with the university or the club.

Deputy United States Marshal Allen, who returned from the Winnebago reservation last Saturday, says that the deaths to date resulting from smallpox numbered 10. It has been 10 days since an Indian died and it is the opinion of the reservation doctor that the disease is under control.

DOCK ARGUMENT STAGE

SCHLEY COURT OF INQUIRY HAS HEARD THE LAST WITNESS.

Hanna Opened the Argument for the Government—Lawyers Likely to Conclude Thursday.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—The Schley court of inquiry reached the argument stage at the beginning of the afternoon session today. The morning sitting was devoted to the testimony of the witnesses and Captain Schley in making corrections of their testimony which had been given previously, and the introduction by Judge-Advocate Lemly of numerous documents bearing upon different phases of the inquiry. These documents included Captain Goodrich's report concerning cable-cutting made on April 2, 1898; the report made by Philip H. Thomas, Texas; Captain Higginson, of the Massachusetts; Captain McCalla, of the Marblehead; and Captain Cotton, of the Harvard; Commodore Schley's report of May 30; Captain Wise's report of the operations of the Yale off Santiago; the log of the Spanish ship Cristobal Colon; Admiral Sampson's order to Captain Foster of the Scorpion; all the reports of the commanding officers of the battle of July 3; Commodore Schley's letter to the Senate; one of Captain Schley's letters, and also a letter of the Secretary of the Navy for the Senate as printed in executive documents.

Admiral Schley did not make any matter of addition to his previous testimony, but devoted himself largely to the clearing up of ambiguous points in his evidence. An effort was made to introduce two new witnesses who were expected to give testimony in Admiral Schley's behalf concerning the controversy as to what information Captain Schley communicated to Admiral Schley when he arrived at Santiago in May, 1898. One of these witnesses was Frank B. Richards, and the other George Lynch, both of New York, and both newspaper correspondents who were on duty in the city of Havana during the war with Spain. Mr. Lynch was on the press boat Somers N. Smith, and Mr. Richards on the Premier. They were to have been called by the government, but the court decided, however, not to hear them.

The opening speech of the argument in the case was made on behalf of the Government by E. P. Hanna, assistant to the Judge-Advocate. He began his presentation of the case of the few minutes. The court convened at 2 o'clock, and when the court adjourned two hours later, he had not covered more than half of the ground covered in the controversy. Mr. Hanna will follow by Chief Justice Parker on behalf of Admiral Schley. Schley the First Witness.

The first witness to take the stand today was Captain Schley, who was recalled for the purpose of correcting his former testimony. "Had you not, as a matter of fact, made up your mind at that time to go to Key West?"

"I had not."

Admiral Schley then referred to his conversation with Admiral Sampson regarding the construction of the new boarding the fortifications as follows:

"I ought to mention that I recall the fact that he and I were talking about the guns that were to be mounted on the coast. I asked him whether he knew if they were Honoria or Krupp guns.
