There was enormous realizing in the stocks which led the advance in the attenson, especially million Pacific and St. Paul, which ruled below resterday's closing level practically all day, falling at one time 28 for St. Paul and I'd for Union Pacific. The heaviness of Northern Pacific preferred, which fell I'd on comparatively light transactions, taken in connection with the reaction in the two stocks previously named, might indicate doubt as to the Northern Pacific settlement, the more so as no authorized statement of the terms of the settlement or even of its actual consummation can be had from any source.

The conviction, however, remains strong in speculative electes that the agreement is in fact perfected, although nothing on the subject but acquiescent smiles or vague intimations can be had from insiders. The corroboration offered by the tape is considered conclusive also that Union Pacific and St. Paul are to benefit substantially by the agreement, just how in the case of the latter stock is not even intimated. The selling of these stocks, therefore, was accepted as due to mere realizing of speculative profits, while the market continued to sdvance with vigor at other points. The foreing to cover of the lear interest in some of the specialities recently under pressure was an important influence in the advance, conspicuously so in Amalgamated Copper, Sugar and People's Gas. Among the


