FESTAL SEASON AT HAND—Evidence of
 the near approach of the festive season of
 Thanksgiving and Christmas are seen in
 the elaborate displays of game and poultry
 being made by the various markets.

Turkeys, chickens, ducks and geese seem
 anxious to have themselves put on exhibition,
 and the elaborate decorations of a
 dozen saddles of mutton have been placed
 in the highest style of the butcher's art, have
 attracted much attention. People stop to
 look at the displays of meats, poultry
 and water fowl, and will linger still longer
 today when these displays are brightened
 up by the gorgeous plumage of Mongolian
 pheasants and other upland game birds.

None of the market men expect to
 sell many of these birds until to-
 day. There will probably be plenty of
 such birds on sale today, as some of the
 dealers say they will receive birds from
 scores of men in all parts of the coun-
 try. Others, however, have an idea that
 pheasants will not be numerous, as it is
 so late in the season and the coveys have
 been pretty well thinned out. It may be
 possible for those who desire to have one
 feast on pheasant, but the land and the
 game there is primarily and particularly
 for the sportsman.

GAMBLERS MUST SHUT UP SHOP—As a
 result of several conferences between Dis-
 trict Attorney Chamberlain and Chief of
 Police McLaughlin, within the past few
 days, it has been decided again that gam-
 bling must cease, and that gamblers will
 not be permitted to run on the sly. Mr.
 Chamberlain says a man lost \$500 in a
 game in a seven-street house Tuesday
 night, and that he has been trying to
 have the loser bring suit through his wife
 against the house. Regarding the ma-
 chines in cigar stands, the District At-
 torney states that he has no objection to
 the operation of the machines given him the
 element of chance does not exist, and they
 cannot therefore be considered gambling
 devices. Upon this subject, however, the
 chief said: "I am informed that the slot
 in these machines is plugged up, and no
 money is deposited in them. The cus-
 tomer gives of his money, and is per-

 This certainly eliminates the element
 of chance, and the customer receives a
 cigar for each nickel he gives the pro-
 prietor. If the description which I have
 received is correct, then I am of the
 opinion, the apparatus is not a gambling
 device."

HARD LUCK OF A CHINESEMAN—It is
 practically impossible for Chinese to get into
 this country now, and it is almost im-
 possible for those who are here to get away.
 If they desire to come back, Low Bing
 Gong, for 20 years a member of the well-
 known Chinese firm of Wing Mow Long
 & Co., is desirous of going on a visit to
 his native land with his wife, Ah Too. He
 undertook to have the necessary testi-
 monies and photographs perpetuated to
 enable them to return. He had the pa-
 pers all drawn up, expecting to leave in
 the next steamer, but on presenting them
 to Collector of Customs Patterson, found
 that he had missed his aim by a mile or
 two. He found that he had omitted to
 state what position he filled in the Wing
 Mow Long Company's store, whether he
 was bookkeeper, salesman or laborer. He
 must also arrange to return to the same
 place from which he sailed, and finds that
 he cannot leave until 30 days after his pa-
 pers are filed. He will make another try
 to get away.

SMALLPOX SCARE OVER—One of the
 two men who, on their arrival here from
 Oak Point, Wash., a short time ago, were
 found to be afflicted with smallpox, and
 sent to the hospital, yesterday, fully re-
 covered. He had been vaccinated, and
 so had only a mild form of the
 disease. The other, who had not been
 vaccinated, had a severe case of the dis-
 ease, and will not be permitted to leave
 the hospital until he is well. There have
 been no cases of the disease at the logging
 camp, near Oak Point, where they spent a few days be-
 fore coming here. Dr. Benson, proprietor
 of the camp, had all his men vaccinated
 and their quarters fumigated, and as none
 of them have shown any symptoms of
 smallpox, and the danger period is past,
 the scare in this vicinity is over.

LOGGING BUSINESS GOOD—Logging men
 look upon the situation in their business
 as very promising at present. There are
 more orders in hand than for some time
 past, and prices are good. The logging

 contract were objectionable to the restau-
 rant men, and were finally withdrawn by
 the waiters, but the advance in wages was
 left standing.

Tuesday evening last about 20 restaurant
 men met a committee of the union at
 Kruse's grillrooms and had a consultation.
 This place was chosen as the rooms are
 run by an incorporation, each employe
 holding stock, so in one sense all were
 proprietors, and no advance of wages or
 other concession was being asked. Beyond
 parleying, however, no agreement was
 reached, and the matter of wages and re-
 cognition of the union was still left in
 abeyance.

The restaurant-keepers deny that any
 organization against the craft exists, but the
 waiters feel confident that there is a
 union of employers for the purpose of
 resisting their demands. The restaurant
 men spoke to last evening would not ad-
 mit the union, but they were not
 organized, a leading restaurateur said,
 "we would be putting ourselves in the
 position of the union, which threatens to
 ruin our trade if we do not accede to their
 demands, and have placed cards in their
 windows acknowledging the fact. The

 Pa., December 8. Mr. Morgan is well-
 known in Portland as a ready and elo-
 quent speaker, and his earnest work in
 connection with the continued exclusion
 of Asiatic laborers has gained him many
 friends among the laboring people. In his
 speech last evening Mr. Morgan dwelt on
 the importance of re-enacting the Chinese
 exclusion act, which expires May 5, 1902.
 He spoke in strong terms in favor of the
 continued restriction of Chinese, and also
 of including Japanese laborers in the act,
 which he hoped would be re-enacted by
 Congress this winter.

A BOYCOTT BY WAITERS?

THEIR TROUBLES NOT SETTLED,
AND STRIKE MAY RESULT.

They insist on Their Demands, and
 Want to Force the Issue—Res-
 taurants Stand Pat.

The differences between the waiters' and
 the restaurant men are by no means
 settled yet, and there are talks
 of boycotting several restaurants in the
 city for not acceding to the demands of the
 union employes. About three weeks
 ago a committee of three from the union
 waited on the restaurant men with a blank
 contract to be filled out, in which the
 signer was obligated to pay men waiters
 \$10 a week, and women \$7. A clause in
 the agreement gave the representatives of
 the union the privilege of visiting all re-
 staurants of the restaurants, and another
 clause provided that the waiters' union
 should furnish all help in the dining-room,
 while nonunion help could not be retained
 more than seven days without permission.
