Gold Exports and Prospective Trust Litigation Were Beariah Factors. Litigation Were Beariah Factors.

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—The stock market today was under the continued influences and factors which depressed values resterday and discouraged specification for an advance. Probably the outward movement of gold was the most effectual of these factors, but the expressed determination of the executives of Northwesters States to use their influence to contest the operation of the Northern Securities Company was also an obvious influence, especially on the stocks of the transcontinental group. Union Pacific and St. Paul were especially affected. The argument that such oppo-

milion to the company was expected, owing to the status of the Northwessern Eisten, and that sminent legal counsel had co-operated to evade these prohibitions was not very convincing in quieting apprehension based on the assumption that the residents of those states are sarnestly opposed to the spirit and purpose of the new company, leaving only the question open as to their ability to prevent by faw its operation.

It is not improbable that the selling of Government bonds comes indirectly in part from the interests who have to remit in payment of foreign obligations. It is evident that the exchange market is cornered to a certain extent, and even the bilia against outgoing corten and grain which comes upon the market are contracted for in advance, leaving the hankers who are short of exchange still under the necessity of shipping gold to cover maturities. One feature of the Government bond redemptions that had not attracted attention is that the National banks apparenty consider the present price sufficiently attractive to prompt them to withdraw bonds on deposit with the Treasury to secure their circulation and offer the morks, but it also involves the retirement of circulation to the amount of the present month.

INVOLUNTARY BANKRUPTS.

Big Livestock Firm at Kansas City in Financial Difficulties.

KANSAS CITY, Nov. 19 .- Involuntary bankruptcy proceedings were instituted in the Federal Court late this afternoon against Tambiya & Tambiya, livestock commission merchants, trading at the Kansas City Stock Exchange. The petition states that the firm's liabilities are 1250,000. It is filed by the Liano Livestock Company and the Texas Cattle Raisers' Association. No assets are given, The petition sets forth that Tamblyn & Tamblyn are inspirent and sought to pre-Tambiyn are insolvent and sought to pre-fer certain of their creditors by giving their notes and other securities for different sums. These were placed in the hands of the interstate National Bank at thei ivestock yards. The list of creditors is large. The members of the company against which the proceedings were instituted are George S. Tambiyn and Robert L. Tambiyn, both of Kansas City.

The firm's troubles began about a month ago, when a large loan was negotiated on a big string of cattle in Colorado A Texas ent sums. These were placed in the

big string of cattle in Colorado, A Texas firm that had sold the estile claimed them on the ground that they had not been paid for. The banks supporting the first demanded greater security. Every available piece of security was given the given the banks which amount practically to an assignment, and efforts were made to carry on the business without closing the An effort was made to stave of the proceedings in court, in the hope of realizing enough from securities to pay the debts, realizing that if the cattle were forced on the market at the present time there might be heavy losses. A member of the firm said this afternoon that the firm would be reorganized in a few days with new capital.
