## BOOM IN HORSERACING

PLANS TO REVIVE TURF MEETS IN THE NORTHWEST.

M. D. Wisdom Predicts a Lively Circuit Next Season---Irvington Track Leased.

There will be some good horseracing throughout the Pacific Northwest next season, if present indications count for anything. The Pacific Northwest Racing Association is scheduled to meet in Seattle about January 1, and the programme for the coming season will then be arranged. Heretofore there have been many conflicts in the race and fair schedules, and racehorse men have been compelled to travel back and forth, retracing their steps several times in order to attend all the meets. It is understood that the new schedule will put matters to rights, and that the racehorse men will be able to make the entire circuit in one continuous trip, thus avoiding many unnecessary delays and expenses.

The leasing of the Irvington track by two well-known horsebreeders has awakened local interest in the sport, and it is quite likely that Portland will see some fast horses on the turf next year.

M. D. Wisdom, secretary of the State Board of Agriculture, is quite enthusiastic over racing prospects, and predicts some fast performances. Speaking of the situation yesterday, Mr. Wisdom said:  
"The Pacific Northwest is going to see a fine lot of races next summer. The association will make out a schedule that will be a very convenient one, and the horsemen will not have to retrace their steps as they have done heretofore. The whole circuit will be a first-class one, as the successful racing meets that were held in this part of the country last season will draw many fast horses from California and other neighboring states. I do not know what dates will be assigned to Portland, but I am sure the local meet will be successful in every way, for they will be a part of the general circuit, and there will be plenty of fast horses and good, clean sports. Mr. Simpson and Mr. Hallman, the gentlemen who have leased the Irvington track, are prominent horsebreeders, and are good, square men. You may depend upon it, there will be no 'crooked work' at the Irvington track with these men in charge. The trouble with the Irvington races heretofore lay in the fact that they had no substantial foundation on which to stand. If they become a part of the circuit, that will insure their success."

"The races at the state fair were very successful, and we intend to boom the proposition right ahead for next year. We are going to put up a \$1000 stake for a 2:11 pace. This will be the largest purse ever offered on the Pacific Coast, and ought to be a great drawing card in itself. These big purses are not such expensive luxuries as most people imagine, for there are always plenty of entrance fees for them, while our small purses go begging. We have 60 entries for the 2-year-old colt stake next year, and the contest will be a lively one. On the whole, the prospects for a successful racing season in 1902 are bright."

### BROUGHT SUIT FOR \$9000.

Moses Blumauer Claims Interest in Valuable Mining Land.

Moses Blumauer has filed suit in the State Circuit Court against Robert Hight for an accounting as to certain mining claims in the Dawson district, two of which on Fox Gulch and French Hill Hight is said to have sold for \$60,000. There are five claims altogether. Blumauer sets up an ownership to a one-fourth interest in them and one-fourth of the \$60,000. He avers that an agreement was entered into between him and Hight June 21, 1898, that the latter should proceed to Northwest territory and Alaska, and in all mining claims discovered or located by him a one-quarter interest was to be held in trust for Blumauer. Blumauer avers that as a settlement all he has received from Hight was shares of stock in the South Portland Real Estate Company of uncertain value, a note signed by Charles Hirstel, and \$50 cash.

### LIQUOR MEN MEET.

Annual Election of Officers—Complaints as to Gambling.

The Retail Liquor Dealers' Union elected the following officers at its regular meeting yesterday, for the ensuing year: President, Louis Dammasch; vice-president, Theodore Trautmann; secretary, H. Larson; treasurer, John Ecklin. Members of the union have made formal complaints to the officers of the organization in regard to what they consider partiality and favoritism on the part of the city authorities in closing some gambling resorts and permitting others to run, notably Blazier's on First street, where it is alleged many customers of other saloons are beaten out of their money. One member, who keeps a boarding-house in connection with his saloon, said many of his boarders, who are mostly workmen, and dependent on their weekly wages, were in the habit of gambling at these open resorts and losing their money they should have paid for board.

President Dammasch, in speaking on the matter, after the meeting, said: "I shall soon appoint a board of three trustees, whose duty will be to wait on the Mayor and Chief of Police and lay these complaints before them. Our association does not countenance gambling, and we have no business but the legit-
