ANARCHIST MISSIONARY AT WORK.-The canvasser for a paper said to be the successor of the infamous Firebrand, that was suppressed in Portland by the Federal Court two or three years ago, has appeared at several points in the city. Yesterday the canvasser, an able-bodied young foreigner, who said he had been driven to anarchism as the only escape from suicide, attempted to sell his papers and spread his doctrines on Grant street. He lauded Emma Gold-man as a commendable, right-minded lady. His paper contained articles by Isaak, the Portland anarchist, and Emma Goldman, and there was a labored article tending to justify the act of Czolgosz in assas sinating the President, A special com-plaint of the canvasser was that he had wood for a man, but he had been paid only one-third as much as he thought he ought to have received, and he then resolved to spend his time in spreading the doctrine of anarchy. He said there were quite a number of anarchist sympathisers. in Portland, some of whom occupy high official position. He was persistent to the point of offensiveness, and usually house-

An especially valuable notice of The Oregonian Handbook is contained in the current issue of Print-Ink, a publication especially well known among newspapers and looked upon by them as an authorlty in matters pertaining to the journalistic world. Printers' Ink goes to all general advertisers, and has besides a large general circulation among representative business concerns in all parts of the United States. The notice follows:

The State of Oregon intends an exposition in 1905 to commemorate the ex of Lewis and Clark in 1805, and The Portland Oregonian has bessed a handsome little handbook of 64 pages, with the view of posting the other states upon Portland and Oregon generally. From the evidence brought formost of us need posting upon the whole matter. The stories of Gregon's lumber, fisheries, wheat, fruit, livestock, coal and mining, flour, shipping, irrigacommerce, climate, unclaimed lands and hopes would have filled many such bookiets, judged by this one. The Oregonian has told them in succinct newspaper fashion, however, mostly in peragraphs, illustrated with upwards of 50 tiny half-topes. There are plenty of impressive figures. For example, the Government statistician testifies that Portland was, in 1900, the fifth port in the United States in the export of wheat and flour. One hundred million dollars' worth of food products were sent out from the Columbia River Valley the past year. Vessels of from 6000 to 8000 tons now come and go between Port-land and the sea, and the average time consumed by a deep-draught vessel in making the run has been reduced from 88 hours to 8 hours since 1898. In 1897 the Southern Pacific hauled 3057 cars of produce out of the Willamette Valley, which is tributary to Portland; in 1990 the same road hauled out 11.355 cars. THE MONTH OF DECEMBER.

Average of Weather During Past 30 Years.

The following data for the month of December covering a period of 30 years have been compiled from the Weather Bureau records at Portland, Or.:

Temperature-Mean or normal temperature, 42 deg.; the warmest month was that of 1875, with an average of 48 deg.; the coldest month was that of 1884, with an average of 32 deg.; the highest temperature was 65 deg., on the 18th, 1886; the low-est temperature was 3 deg., on the 23d, 1879; average date on which first "killing" frost occurred in Autumn, November 15; average date on which first "killing" frost

occurred in Spring, March 17. 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

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
