REPAIRING FOURTH STREET.—The preliminary work connected with the proposed improvement of Fourth street is being hurried up as fast as possible, and the estimated cost of the work is \$100,000. It will be presented to the Council at their next meeting. If all goes well operations will be commenced some day. It is plainly evident that there was something radically wrong with the wood blocks used for the present decayed pavement, or with the method adopted in laying them, and it is the desire and intention of the contractors for the new pavement to avoid such mistakes, as they have contracted to keep the pavement in order for 10 years. The blocks are to be treated with carbolineum, but much more pains will be taken in selecting the blocks. These are now being sawn from the butt cuts of live timber, and the center of the logs, where the annual rings are less than an inch, will be rejected. Some are of opinion that the timber from which the blocks are cut should be seasoned in the water, say, eight months before being cut. There are a great many different theories in regard to the cause of the present pavement decaying in such a short time. Some attribute it to the fact that the blocks were laid without any space between them, while others scout the idea, and say that the blocks were made from poor timber, and that no care was exercised in their selection. The timber for the blocks for the new pavement will be carefully selected, and all blocks not up to the requirements will be rejected; and, after the blocks are treated with the preservative, they will be laid with slats between them; then if they do not last, something else will be tried.

TURKEY REMNANTS AVAILABLE.—Markets were kept open till nearly noon yesterday, for the benefit of isolated customers who might desire to secure a turkey for dinner. The turkeys displayed, however, looked like the traditional "last run of shad," but every dealer had a coop or two of good turkeys in his back yard from which customers who were particular were supplied. After the markets closed persons who wanted turkeys repaired to the shooting galleries where "turkey shoots" were going on. ROSES FLOURISH LUXURIANTLY.—It is rather late in the season to expect really fine roses to bloom in the open air, but still in many places rather fine specimens of a number of late varieties are to be seen. During the months of October and the first half of November, there were many roses in bloom, and William H. Barnhart, one of the most successful amateur rose growers in the city, says that many varieties were much finer than at any time during the summer. The first heavy rains of the winter seriously injured the buds, but Mr. Barnhart's Sofranos stood the storm better than any of the others. A magnificent Rainbow garden has produced large numbers of beautiful flowers since the storm, and a huge bush of the Reine Marie Henriette a few blocks distant has kept up a constant succession of rather fine blooms. Unless there should be sharp frosts the Sofranos, Papa Gontiers, Rainbow and several other species will continue to produce good blossoms until Christmas.

SEVEN CLUB EXHIBIT TONIGHT.—The Seventh Annual Exhibition of the Portland Sketch Club that opens this afternoon in the art rooms of the Library building, will be open this evening and tomorrow evening, as well as on afternoons for the remainder of the week. The work in composition promises to be unusually interesting, and will show the influence of Mr. Du Mond, the well-known Eastern artist who started the club in this line of work. This is the first time such work has been included in a public exhibition.

BOOM AT NEW VALDES.
Terminus of the All-American Route to the Yukon.
 Phil Blumauer, who has spent most of his time since the Fall of 1900 at Valdes, Alaska, is in the city to spend the holidays with his friends. The town of old Valdes, which has a population of about 100 in the summer and 400 in the winter, is situated at the head of Valdes Bay, and some four miles back of the town is the celebrated Valdes Glacier. Extending from the city to the bay and running through and by the town are several rivers and beds, most of the time, but carrying rapid streams in the summer, when the snow melts the glacier.

Lately a site for a town, to be called New Valdes, has been laid out on the south shore of the bay, several miles from the old town, and free from the nuisance of the glacier. The site is at the starting point of the all-American route from Seattle to the coast through the Copper River Valley to Eagle City, on the Yukon, at the boundary line, 85 miles south of Dawson, distance 375 miles. The cost of the \$100,000 has been spent in opening a good trail for 200 miles of the distance. On this trail a large amount of grading has been done, and permanent bridges have been built—sufficient to accommodate travel with teams and wagons. It is now desired to connect this trail with a wagon road, and extend it through to Eagle and open up the entire Copper River Valley. A Government telegraph line will be completed from New Valdes to Eagle in about four months, and it is expected that a railroad will be built over this route in the near future. Lots are now being sold in New Valdes, and a boom in property there is expected before long.

HAD A PORTLAND CAREER.

Charles Roller, Arrested in Newark, Was Francis Tilden When Here.

Charles Roller, of Newark, N. J., who surrendered himself to the Newark police authorities Tuesday, to answer a charge of passing alleged bogus checks, is believed to have had a career in this city, where he was known as Francis Tilden, of New York. Roller was recently arrested at Los Angeles, Cal., because of his check operations, and when released on bail he promptly disappeared. Through the efforts of his bondsmen, he was prevailed upon to surrender himself at Newark, Tuesday.

Early last September the Portland police officials received a circular from George Virtue, Sheriff of Essex County, New Jersey, asking them to try to find Charles L. Roller, wanted in New Jersey on 14 indictments for forgery. The description of the man wanted was: Age, about 27, boyish in appearance, supposed to be a speculator by occupation, 5 feet 4 inches tall, weighing 120 pounds, prominent nose, thick lips, pleasing address, fond of horse racing and the stock market, and visiting gambling-houses.

Detectives Snow and Kerrigan found a young man in a Morrison-street boarding-house, last day night, whose description answered to that of Roller, but this young man said his name was Francis Tilden. He was taken to the police station but he insisted that a mistake had been made, and at his request a well-known lawyer was sent to call upon him. He was promptly identified him as Mr. Tilden.

den. This lawyer stated that he had met the man through a business friend, and was positive that he had met Tilden in this city last February. As the information the police had was that the alleged forgeries took place at Newark, last March, the police thought they had the wrong man and they allowed Mr. Tilden to go, with apologies.

A letter has just been received by the police officials from Public Prosecutor Chandler W. Rider, Essex County, New Jersey, dated Newark, November 21, in which Mr. Rider asks the police to search for and arrest Charles L. Roller. "I am informed that he has been in your city," the letter goes on to say, "and was arrested last day night, but was discharged as he asserted he was Francis Tilden, of New York, a relative of Samuel J. Tilden, of that place. I have information stating that he had lived at

Her "Maidenhood," No. 125, shows a girlish face framed in a mass of loose-hanging hair, the lighting of the modest, beautifully modeled face and throat being unusually successful. It will be observed that the shadow side of the face is as distinct and well-defined as the side of which the full light falls. It is an excellent example of what is called "flat-lighting." Mrs. Read's "Mater Dolorosa," No. 124, shows a head bowed in resignation, and a remarkable softness of the septa tones. Both these pictures are of large size. Her picture of a young woman behind prison bars has some strong points, but the bars have something of a stage-property air—are not substantial enough in fact to keep a healthy young woman from enjoying freedom—and there is a lack of art in allowing the lines of the woman's elbow to clash with the lines of the bar as they do.
