HOOD RIVER COUNTY PROSPEROUS.—L.
 E. Morse, a Hood River business man,
 who is in the city and is a guest at the
 Perkins, says that the section of the state
 in which he lives is enjoying a season of
 prosperity. Crops have been good and the
 prospects for a continuance of the good
 times are excellent. Mr. Morse says that
 there is considerable opposition to
 Congressman Moody's re-nomination in
 Wasco County, and that there is a
 belief that some strong Republican will be
 put up against him. Mr. Morse is a
 Democrat, and was formerly active in
 politics of that section of the state, but
 is tired of being with the minority con-
 tinually, and while he has not changed his
 faith he has ceased to take more than a
 passing interest in the campaign.

SUNDAY SCHOOL WORKERS MEET.—A
 well-attended and lively meeting of the
 officers of the Multnomah County Sunday
 School Association was held last night in
 the McKay building, for the purpose of
 planning an aggressive campaign for the
 winter. The object to be attained is the
 education of each Sunday school worker
 and the mutual acquaintance of them all.
 The officers of the Association will visit
 the next few weeks or months visit as
 many as possible of the 130 Sunday
 schools in the county, and on Monday
 evening, January 13, 1902, there will be
 held a conference of the officers of the
 schools of the city and vicinity. The
 place of that meeting will probably be
 the First Presbyterian Church.

"DOLLAR BILL" ST. CLAIR FIRED.—St.
 Clair, colored, better known in White-
 chapel as Dollar Bill, the proprietor of a
 saloon on Fourth street, was in the Mu-
 nicipal Court yesterday, charged with as-
 saulting G. C. Simpson, a livery driver.
 The evidence by Simpson was that he
 and St. Clair had a dispute over the
 payment of a horse's feed, and that
 St. Clair struck him in the face.
 St. Clair's remonstrated St. Clair told
 him that I would pay the bill if I had to,
 and when he declined to leave my place
 I shot him over the door. That was all.
 He didn't fall." St. Clair was fined \$5.

CHRISTMAS SHOPPERS ON TEN G.—The
 Christmas trade has commenced in down-
 right earnest. Never before have dealers
 gone to such lengths in making displays
 of holiday goods, and never before have
 such crowds been seen before shop win-
 dows. The stores are crowded all day
 long, and everybody has money and all
 are buyers on a more liberal scale than
 usual. Additional help has been em-
 ployed in many stores, and those who do
 not complete their purchases for the hol-
 idays this week will find a poor show for
 getting along next week.

MARRAS HAZED. QUINBY DEFERRED.—H. S.
 Goldman, a Third-street business man,
 was fined \$5 yesterday in the Municipal
 Court, charged with violating a city ordi-
 nance by permitting his employees to sweep
 dust from his store across the sidewalk.
 Policeman Franklin testified that he had
 repeatedly warned Goldman's assistants
 that the practice complained of should
 not be continued, but that he had never
 heard of the ordinance referred to, and
 had not seen the matter discussed in the
 newspapers.

DUCK HUNTERS HAD GOOD LUCK.—Duck
 hunters generally report a very good
 day's shooting on Sunday, notwith-
 standing that there was no wind enough
 to give the decoys a lifelike motion as
 they rode at their anchors. At Morgan's
 one of the best shots of the season was
 had. The party, being smaller than usual,
 shot well up to the limit. At Captain
 Riley's preserve, at Dead Willow, a fine
 shoot was also had, and a Eastern
 sportsman who participated was greatly
 delighted.

FIRST BREAK IN SCHOOL BOARD BY
 DEATH.—The committee appointed by the
 Board of School Directors to draft appro-
 priate resolutions of respect to the mem-
 ory of their late associate, D. P. Thomp-
 son, will have nothing to guide them in
 their work so far as the School Board is
 concerned. No member of the board has
 died within the memory of any of the
 members, and only one has resigned. This
 was Director L. Therkelsen, who on ac-
 count of a press of private business re-
 signed 19 years ago.

NO MORE SCARLET FEVER.—The epi-
 demic of scarlet fever, which has been
 raging in Peninsular Addition of late, has
 practically died out. The Health Depart-
 ment yesterday fumigated five houses in
 that district, and the principal of the
 school there was notified that he might
 now permit the children living in these
 houses to return to the school. This will
 be a great relief to children and parents,
 who have been debarred from going to
 school, church and other places.

SEVERE STORM IN MARQUAM.—Quite a num-
 ber of ships were disabled in the mar-
 quams yesterday, there being nothing in
 the game law providing for the protec-
 tion of these birds except between Feb-
 ruary 1 and September 1. They were of-
 fered at five for half a dollar, which is
 cheap for these birds. Usually they have
 all left this region before this time of
 year, but the "Winter" has been so mild
 they have overstayed their limit.
