TAKEN TO THE FERTHOUSE.—Three persons afflicted with smallpox were discovered in the city yesterday, and were taken to the pesthouse. The patients who have been there for some time will be discharged in a few days. The rooms which the men were found in yesterday were promptly fumigated, and all persons about the place were vaccinated, so no more cases are likely to occur there. The idea of quarantining places which smallpox patients have visited has been abandoned by City Physician Zan, who, by energetic and prompt action in the matter of vaccination and thorough fumigation, had been very successful in preventing the spread of smallpox and other contagious diseases, and has kept the city free from such disease, except from cases which find their way in from time to time, and which are promptly looked after. Notwithstanding that quite a number of smallpox patients have arrived here during the past few months, there has been no spread of the disease, nor any alarm caused, and the city has been kept more free from contagious diseases than for a long time.

PERMANENT SECRETARY FOR BOARD OF TRADE.—The directors of the Board of Trade are seriously considering the employment of a suitable person who will devote all his time to acting as secretary. For the past year C. W. Miller has filled the position without compensation, though his stenographic skill has been allowed \$20 per month as assistant. The business of the board has now become so large as to require a staffer who will devote his time to the correspondence, to soliciting for members, collecting dues, etc. The correspondence of the board is an important item in itself, and extends to every state in the Union. With the growth of the state board, recently organized, the local board's duties will enlarge correspondingly, and the time of one man as secretary will be fully taken up. The matter will come up for discussion at the next regular meeting.

COLONEL PARKER GOT HIS COFFEE.—Frank J. Parker, the well-known newspaper man of Walla Walla, was riled up considerably in Portland a few days ago. He was about to enter a Western street restaurant to get a cup of coffee and piece of pie when a young man shoved a card into his hand saying, "Don't go in there; that's a scab house." Parker and noticed a man carrying a banner with the word "unfair" in front, but he did not realize what it was until the "barber" stopped him. "I'll eat wherever I darn please," he said, "and you ought to be in better business than trying to stop people from doing so. It's your kind of people that assassinated President McKinley, and if the police don't protect me from such IT, you got Gray's dairy output at the police station to complete of the matter."

AFTER ANNUAL DAIRY REPORTS.—Food and Dairy Commissioner Bailey has just finished sending out circulars to the various creameries and cheese manufacturers of the state, asking the managers to transmit their reports for the year 1901. There are 102 creameries and 82 cheese factories in Oregon, and, according to law, these must make a statement of their output at the close of each year. The law does not comprehend the small dairies, but only those turning out over 25 pounds of butter or cheese per week. A blank form is inclosed, in which the name of the manufacturer is to be inserted, the number of cows, pounds of milk purchased, number of pounds of butter and cheese sold. The object of the law is to find out the dairy output of the state for the year.

ELECTRIC LIGHTS FOR CHRISTMAS TREES.—Little electric lights, of one-candle power, each hung in the branches of a juvenile fir tree, attracted the attention of the throng at the Washington street electric supply store last evening. The little globes are not over an inch in diameter, and they seem brighter than candles, though the maker does not credit them with any more power. The supplying wire can be hitched to the ordinary light fixtures about the house, and so the children can have their tree illuminated for Santa Claus' coming without the danger of the branches taking fire and burning up the house while the inmates are asleep.

WASHINGTON MAN IN JAIL.—William G. Rhude, of Washington, was arrested here Thursday evening on complaint of United States Attorney Hall, charging him with cutting timber on Government land near the North Fork of the Gray's River. Not being able to furnish bonds in the sum of \$500, he was committed to the county jail till such time as the authorities of the State of Washington are ready to take him over there for trial.

PHI DELTA THETA CLUB FORMED.—At a dinner given at the Hotel Portland Monday night by Wallace McCamant to several members of the Phi Delta Theta fraternity a club was organized to meet informally whenever desirable. Mr. McCamant was elected president, and Lydell Baker secretary. The other members are Maurice Lombard, A. A. Wright, R. H. Wilbur, C. M. Idelman and S. C. Spencer. His DECENT LOOKS SAVED HIM.—William O'Brien was in the Municipal Court yesterday, charged with drunkenness, and was asked to bet set at liberty, as he did not wish to spend Christmas day in jail. "You look like a decent man," remarked the Judge, kindly. "You will be released this afternoon. But don't get drunk again. Don't spoil Christmas day."

BOUGHT INFORMATION AND GOT IT.—Both the Chamber of Commerce and the Board of Trade are in constant receipt of inquiries from the East regarding the opportunities for home-building and investments in Oregon. These inquiries are always answered by return mail, and such printed information as may be at hand is transmitted to the writer. Secretary Reed of the Chamber of Commerce received a short letter from Massachusetts yesterday, which was answered by a roll of printed matter weighing 30 ounces. It was a typical letter of inquiry, and ran thus: "Dear sir: Can you inform me where I can get information in regard to Oregon and its resources? I can get plenty of information about Washington, but literature about Oregon is scarce. I met a native of Salem, near Portland, the other day, and he said, 'Whatever you get about Washington will have been and more of it.' If a person is not able to farm, are there business openings, and how are they to be found?"

WAY TAYLOR GOT THE LAMEN.—"Sassy" John Taylor appeared before Municipal Judge Cameron yesterday, charged with drunkenness. Taylor admitted that he had only recently been released from jail, and denied that he had been drunk. "Why," said he, "I only had three drinks when the policeman arrested me. Let me go and spend my Christmas with the gang, and then I'll leave the place and never return to it." "Thirty days in jail," said the Judge. "One day for each drink you make," he more. "Forty-five days in jail," retorted the Judge. "Oh, rats! Can't you soak me for 90 days?" came from Taylor. "Ninety days in jail. That's the limit," said the Judge. "I know it," said Taylor. He was then led away, making sulphurous remarks.

NO HENRY ABOUT PARKKEEPER.—There are plenty of men willing to take the place of Charles M. Myers as keeper of the City Park, and each of the Park Commissioners has been asked to use his influence in behalf of several friends. There will be no selection, however, until the next regular meeting of the board, which will be held Friday of next week. In the meantime Fred Krupke, an old employee, will have charge. The salary of Parkkeeper is \$7 per month, and a house is furnished, rent free, for the family. None of the commissioners have signified the kind of a man they will agree on, but it is thought the new parkkeeper will be selected with view to his experience as a landscape gardener.

MAIL-CARRIER FOR MOUNT TABOR.—Postmaster Crossman has been authorized to establish a postoffice station at Mount Tabor, to be known as the Tabor Station. A carrier will be stationed there and the residents in that section will hereafter enjoy all the advantages of the free delivery system. As no provision has been made for supplying the carrier with a horse, he will have to make his deliveries of mail on foot until July 1, 1902, when he will evolve into a mounted carrier, as was the intention from the start. Mr. Crossman has put in applications for authority to establish stations at Woodlawn, University Park and Fulton, and hopes to be granted this authority before long.

POPCORN STATISTICS.—"Popcorn seems like light, fluffy stuff," said a Front-street dealer yesterday, "but you would be surprised at the weight of what is sold here in Portland during the holidays. I estimate that seven tons changed hands, and all in a very quiet sort of way. The corn creates contentment and amusement for the children around many an evening fire, and makes inexpensive hangings for Christmas trees. It retails at about 8 cents a pound, unpopped, and makes very buoyant ballast when you are about to start on a sea voyage—makes you sort of independent of the life preservers that may or may not be hanging up in your stateroom."

AT TEMPLE BETH ISRAEL.—A Zionist celebration will be held in honor of the fifth Zionist congress, which assembled this week at Basle, Switzerland, on Sunday evening, December 29, 1901, at 8 o'clock, at Temple Beth Israel. Dr. S. Cohen will deliver a lecture on "Palestine, Old and New," with stereoscopic views, to be given by Rev. Dr. Stephen S. Wise. A number of violinists have been secured. DINNER NEED A KNIFE.—William Fagan, about 25 years old, was charged with being a vagrant yesterday, at the Municipal Court. "I arrested Fagan last night at Sixth and Morrison streets, and his garage was so bad that I had to place him in the patrol box until the wagon arrived. During the time he was in the box he cut the police telephone wires," said Police Chief Coleman. "How could I cut the wires, when I didn't have a knife?" demanded Fagan. "Well, the wires were all right when we put you in the box, and they were cut when we took you out," stated Coleman. Fagan was sentenced to 15 days' imprisonment.

LEONARD'S CHRISTMAS CALL-DOWN.—Archibald F. Leonard, the efficient and obliging stenographer of the Police Department, was yesterday the guest of Chief McLaughlin's room yesterday, and he found awaiting him the Chief and all the city detectives. "You're in for it now, Archie," said one of the detectives, gravely. Leonard wondered what he had done amiss during the past year, but Chief McLaughlin shed light on the interview by presenting the astonished Archie with a handsome diamond ring as a mark of friendship from the Chief and detectives. Mr. Leonard managed to make a neat little speech of thanks.

SUFFERING WITH INFECTIOUS DISEASES.—Mrs. C. O. Page, E. Edelman and his 12-year-old son were all sent to the County Hospital yesterday by City Physician Zan, suffering from an infectious disease. The Edelmans were removed from a villa house in the vicinity of Front and Jefferson streets, and Mrs. Page was removed from a house on Clay street, near First. There are now six patients at the pesthouse suffering from this infectious disease. Pearl Clancy, a chorus girl from Seattle, is one of the number, and is rapidly recovering from her illness.

BOY INJURED BY FALL.—While working in a Washington-street store M. E. Gorman, 15 years old, son of J. J. Gorman, president of the Pacific Commission Company, fell down the elevator shaft used for hoisting freight. Two of his ribs and one of his arms were broken, and he was severely injured about the face. Dr. Whiting was called, and the injured boy was taken to the Good Samaritan Hospital, where he was resting last night as comfortably as could be expected under the circumstances. Gorman fell about eight feet.

WHERE IS THE LADYBIRD?—Andrew Johnson was before Municipal Judge Cameron yesterday, charged with the larceny of a ladybird, the property of D. M. Hingman, 21 North Fourth street. The evidence was that Johnson visited Hingman's stable November 22, hired a horse and buggy, paid in advance, and that the horse afterward walked up to the stable minus a ladybird. Johnson insisted that when the horse and buggy reached the stable the ladybird was in the buggy. The case was continued.

TEAMDRIVERS DO WELL

MAKE \$100 CHRISTMAS GIFT TO LEWIS AND CLARK FUND.

Portlanders in the East Will Devote a Year to Exploiting the Great 1905 Centennial.

The local lodge of the Teamdrivers' International Union yesterday filed a subscription of \$100 for the Lewis and Clark Fund. Considering the fact that this is a young union in Portland, and that its path has not been altogether peaceful, this is deemed a liberal subscription, and is organized labor shall do as well all along the line. It will give an important lift toward the \$500,000 desired for the capital of the Lewis and Clark corporation. J. H. Baylor, who has been spending a number of months in the East, has written A. A. Kaddery, who was on one of the soliciting committees, offering to spread news of the Lewis and Clark celebration in sections of the East where he may visit before returning to Oregon. He also writes the executive committee that he will spend most of his time for a year to come in Michigan and Ohio, and offers to advertise the Fair in that region. Writing from Adrian, Mich., he says:

"I find the people here anxious to know more about Portland and the Pacific Coast."

Interest in the Lewis and Clark celebration is general in the East, and is bringing to the Pacific Northwest many inquiries for information from localities and persons that have not heretofore cared to inquire about this country. Every mail bears these letters of inquiry. One of them came to the Oregonian yesterday from a banker at Needham, Mass., who said plenty of information about the State of Washington was available there, but he had been unable to find out much about Portland and Oregon. He wished to be informed of both states, therefore applied for any descriptive and statistical matter that would give an idea of conditions prevailing here.

FUNERAL OF C. M. MYERS

Last Tribute Paid to Portland's Late Parkkeeper.

The funeral of the late parkkeeper, Charles M. Myers, was held yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock, from the Calvary Presbyterian Church, where the services were held. The casket was preceded by Mayor Rowe, the Park Commissioners, and a number of the other city officials. The Park Commissioners acted as the honorary pallbearers, and the active pallbearers were the employees under Mr. Myers in the city park. The floral offerings were numerous and beautiful. A large number of bouquets and floral pieces surrounded the casket. The largest piece was the "gate ajar" sent by the Park Commissioners. The services were conducted by Rev. W. S. Gilbert, who read the Scriptures and offered prayer. Miss Brown and Miss Lamberson sang two duets, "Jesus, Lover of My Soul" and "Abide With Me." Mr. Gilbert chose as the text of his sermon John xiv:19: "Because I live, ye shall live also." The interment took place at Lone Fir cemetery.
