

DAY AT THE WHITE HOUSE

HOW THE PRESIDENT AND HIS FAMILY CELEBRATED.

Large Gathering at the Family Dinner—Record-Breaker in Charitable Work in New York.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 25.—Washington has seldom celebrated Christmas more quietly than today. To the police regulations, there were no noisy demonstrations on the streets. The departments were all closed, the chief officials generally spending the day with their families.

The White House was closed to the public, and a large portion of the clerical force was excused for the day. The President put in much of the time in the residence part of the day, giving his principal attention to the children of the household, who were the recipients of many presents, both from their parents and from others. The smaller members generally hung their stockings up last night, and all four upon awakening at an early hour found Santa Claus had been as true as word, and had left liberal contributions. Later in the day all assembled in the family room, where the general exchange of presents occurred and a jolly hour was spent.

The President, Mrs. Roosevelt and the children of the household, Robert Pershing and Theodore, took luncheon with Commander and Mrs. Cowles, at the latter's residence on N street. The party remained at the house several hours, and then the male members, including two of the Roosevelt boys, joined by several other friends, among whom was Secretary Root, went for a horseback ride on the outskirts of the city.

Tonight there was quite a gathering at the family dinner, which included the Presidential household, Commander and Mrs. Cowles and other guests. After the dinner, the entire party adjourned to the East room, where the evening was spent, the guests being entertained with a medley of popular airs. The dinner was followed by a musical promenade and afterwards, in honor of the Christmas season, the evening was closed with a dance, in which about 20 couples finished Christmas night.

NEW YORK'S CHRISTMAS.

A Record-Breaker in the Way of Charitable Work.

NEW YORK, Dec. 25.—Public and private charity gave happiness to thousands of persons in this city today. In the outlying districts, where the wealthy have their country seats, the poor were better cared for and made happier than ever before. The feature of the day was the organized work of the Salvation Army, by means of a fund raised by that organization, 300 persons sat down this evening to a substantial dinner in Madison-Square Garden, while earlier in the day 300 baskets, each containing a complete dinner, were distributed at the garden. These baskets are estimated to have contained food for 20,000 persons. At the Bowery Mission, nearly 10,000 persons were fed and entertained. Various other organizations supplied all applicants with clothing and toys for the children. All the churches held special services, and with elaborate music, singing and prayer, despite a chill, drizzling rain, the day is believed to have been a record-breaker in the way of charitable work.

AMERICAN CHILDREN IN PARIS.

Attended a Christmas Celebration Given by Mr. and Mrs. De Young.

PARIS, Dec. 25.—The weather today was fine, and the boulevards were thronged all day long by armies of promenaders. American children in Paris were benefited by the kindness of Mr. and Mrs. De Young, who, on Sunday, December 23, gave a Christmas party at the Continental Hotel. An immense Christmas tree, laden with glittering toys, had been erected in one of the rooms. United States Ambassador Pershing, Mrs. Pershing and Consul-General Gowdy and Mrs. Gowdy were present at the distribution of gifts, and a constant stream of children left the hotel, each carrying a package of toys which Mr. and Mrs. De Young had brought specially from America.

Christmas in London.

LONDON, Dec. 25.—Christmas in London was fairly quiet, the heavy snow returned from Scotland. The King, with the Princess Victoria, attended service in the morning at the Chapel Royal, in St. James' Palace, and later in the day with the Duke and Duchess of Connaught at Clarence House. The Queen sent an enormous quantity of toys, with autograph cards, to the children's hospitals in London, and the royal family gave generous gifts to other hospitals. King Edward sent contributions to the dinners of all regiments of the household troops. Prince Alexander is making excellent progress toward recovery, but is not able to be out for several days.

Mrs. McKinley's Lonely Christmas.

CANTON, O., Dec. 25.—Mrs. McKinley spent Christmas day alone at her home. She was urged to join the McKinley family in their Christmas dinner at the old Sixton homestead, but declined to do so. She did not wish to be so forcibly reminded of previous Christmas dinners as she would be by such a gathering.

Mrs. McKinley's condition is as good or better than it has been since the tragedy. Relatives who see her often state that she shows gradual improvement. She remembered many of her friends with little Christmas presents today, and she received flowers and presents from all over the country.

Christmas Eve at Potsdam.

NEW YORK, Dec. 25.—A Berlin dispatch to the London Times describes the Christmas eve celebration by Emperor William at the New Palace, Potsdam. The dispatch, as contained in the New York Times, continues:

"All the Kaiser's children were present, except Prince Adolphus, who is in the Mediterranean. Nine Christmas trees of graduated sizes were placed in the Muschelsaal, the largest being the Emperor's. At 5 o'clock an enormous cake of ginger bread was presented to the Kaiser by a detachment of the First Foot Guards."

The Poor of Cleveland Feasted.

CLEVELAND, Dec. 25.—The Salvation Army gave a Christmas dinner to 1000 people in this city today. Two thousand were served in Central Armory, and baskets of provisions were sent to the remaining 2000. At the armory, Colonel Myron T. Herrick made a brief address on the work of the Salvation Army.

Emperor William's Bounty.

BERLIN, Dec. 25.—Emperor William, while walking in the environs of Potsdam yesterday, tossed several three and four-mark pieces to poor-looking persons whom he passed. The Emperor's Christmas bounty is never limited, but this year he has doubled his usual subscriptions to charitable funds.

Pope Celebrated Midnight Mass.

ROME, Dec. 25.—The pope celebrated midnight mass at the Vatican last night and assisted at two other masses. The health of his holiness has improved and he will resume diplomatic audiences tomorrow.

THE CHRISTMAS HANDICAP

Rio Shannon Now the Principal Event at Oakland.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 25.—The Christmas handicap feature of the card at Oakland today resulted in a complete upset. Rio Shannon, a 15-to-1 shot, winning handily from Vesuvius and Watercure. A field of nine went to the post for the event, which was valued at \$3000. Watercure, Autolight and Janice, of the Green Morris stable, were coupled in the betting, being backed from 4 to 5 to 10 to 15. Autolight was bumped at the start and lost much ground, while Janice also got away poorly. Icele went to the front after passing the stand and led until the stretch, when he tired. Rio Shannon, with 36 pounds up and ridden by L. Jackson, took command and won by two lengths from Vesuvius, who beat Watercure a neck. After all his bad luck Autolight was a good fourth.

One of the largest crowds of the season witnessed the racing. Twenty-one books were on and betting was lively. Partridge had the speed of the field in the opening event and won from Royal Rogue by a head, while Flourish was third. Wyoming again displayed his gameness in the second race, for which he was favored. He took the lead in the stretch and standing a hard drive, beat Orleans a neck. Hungarian was third, a nose in front of King Delia. The hurdle handicap was marred by accidents in which the favorites suffered. THE WAR OF THE MAGNATES.

Spalding Answers the Statement of Freedman's Attorney.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 25.—Prior to his departure for London, the attorney, Harold A. G. Spalding gave out a statement in answer to the communication given out by Andrew Freedman's attorney regarding Mr. Spalding's announcement that he had resigned as president of the National League. Mr. Spalding expresses the belief that he has been legally and unanimously elected president of the National League, but that he has no opinion on the authority of his attorneys, John I. Rogers and Alfred W. Kiddie. Pending the decision of a competent court, he declines to act as president, but continues to act as president, complying, however, with the temporary restraining order. He announces his intention of meeting all charges fully and promptly, and that he will not be deterred from his position by the action of his attorneys. In his opinion, he says, Mr. Freedman's action is merely intended as a bluff to force the real issue and stampede the clubs responsible for Mr. Spalding's election. The statement closes with a sharp attack on Mr. Freedman and his methods as a baseball magnate.

Jeffries Goes to Kansas City.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Dec. 25.—James J. Jeffries and his brother gave a six-round boxing exhibition at Convention Hall, in this city tonight. The champion will give no more exhibitions before he reaches his native land, the Boston Athletic Association, Jack Beauchamp, of Chicago, and Jack Graham, of Indianapolis, boxed 10 rounds, the contest resulting in a draw.

A Knock-Out at Cincinnati.

CINCINNATI, Dec. 25.—Larry Temple, of New York, knocked out Eddie Kennedy, of Pittsburgh, in four rounds before the Abbey Athletic Club here tonight.

Stead's pamphlet on "The Americanization of the World," admits that Gladstone's prophecy that the United States would replace Britain as the premier nation has been on the whole realized; but it declares it to be utterly impossible that Great Britain, as Mr. Stead extravagantly suggests, should enter an American Union, except after a series of disasters rendering separate existence impossible. OFFERS RELIC TO GOVERNMENT

Portland Man Wants to Sell the Order Book of General St. Clair.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 25.—Senator Mitchell has in his keeping for the time being a document that is of more than passing interest from a historical standpoint. It is the original manuscript copy of the "order book" of General Arthur St. Clair, who was Governor of the Northwest Territory and commander of its military forces during the Administration of Presidents Washington and Adams. This quaint old book, now discolored, is inscribed with the faded handwriting of General St. Clair, and covers the military transactions of his troops from 1793 to 1795. The book is the property of John T. Dolan, of Portland, it having come to him by inheritance through his mother, a direct descendant of the General. Senator Mitchell

For the rest, it confesses the enormous influence which the United States wields over British colonies, and that a majority of Irishmen would vote for federation with the United States. The article further says it would be interesting to see what might happen if the United States should drop its protectionist policy and should allow to Jamaica, Canada, or even Australia, the immense bribe of admission on reciprocal terms to its vast, ever-extending markets.

LYNCHING OF ITALIANS.

Effort to Secure a Federal Remedy for Such Affairs.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 25.—The Italian Government has been renewing its efforts of late with the authorities in Washington to have Federal statutes so extended as to protect foreigners in cases arising within the jurisdiction of the United States, thus giving a Federal remedy for lynchings and like affairs directed against Italians, such as have occurred in Louisiana, Colorado and Mississippi. It is the exchange of views in this connection which recently brought on the discussion in the Italian Senate, when Baron Fava interpolated the Italian Premier as to the progress of an adjustment.

Concessions to Russia.

BERLIN, Dec. 25.—The government, yielding to Russian uncompromising attitude regarding the tariff bill, will propose, when the committee having the matter in charge meets, that the minimum duties be reduced to 10 per cent, and that the duties be put in through the influence of the Agrarians, who desired to fix a limit under which concessions could not be made in the commercial treaty negotiations. The Russians leave the Ministry free to meet the views of Russia respecting grain and hay. Thus far it has not made any representations concerning the duties, being advised to wait until it was seen in what form the measure would be apt to pass.

New Burger Corps Formed.

PHOENIX, Dec. 25.—The National National Scouts, has aroused great interest among the surrendered burglars. In view of numerous meetings and applications, General Lord Kitchener has decided to create a corps of burglar wings to operate in the Southern and Eastern Transvaal, under prominent Boer leaders elected by the burglars themselves. Our Friend in the War With Spain.

LONDON, Dec. 25.—The Times this morning publishes an editorial article on the pretensions of Continental newspapers that it was Russia, not England, that prevented Russian intervention in the Hispano-American War. The Times (which the moment has arrived for the production of documentary evidence regarding the attitude of Great Britain on that occasion, "in order to nip in the bud the growth of an ingenious legend of a kind from which we have suffered before now.")

New Irish Land Bill.

LONDON, Dec. 25.—The Daily News gives it as a rumor that the government is preparing an Irish land bill, providing an equivalent to compulsory purchase. It is believed that the measure provides that the tenant may buy at 10 per cent the land sold at 30 years' purchase, the state providing the payment of the three years' difference.

Rhodes' English Estate.

LONDON, Dec. 25.—According to a dispatch from Cairo to the Daily Telegraph, Cecil Rhodes does not contemplate a permanent residence at Dalham Hall, nor the establishment of a large estate there. It is said, purchased the estate so that he might have an agreeable residence on his occasional visits to England.

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Day of Homing Pigeons Is Over.

NEW YORK, Dec. 25.—Homing pigeons are to give way to wireless telegraphy at the Brooklyn Navy-Yard. The pigeons are to be sold, and the department will commence at once a series of experiments with wireless telegraphy as a means of communication between warships.

LEE AND GARVIN GUILTY

CONVICTED AT HELENA OF STEALING INDIANS' CATTLE.

End of a Sensational Trial of Two Weeks' Duration—Unknown Men Fire Into Saloons.

HELENA, Mont., Dec. 25.—The jury in the United States Court in the case of Robert E. Lee and Samuel Garvin, charged with stealing 700 cattle from Indians on the Crow Reservation, returned a verdict this afternoon, finding both defendants guilty, after a trial lasting two weeks. Motion for a new trial was made, Judge Knowles went to Butte tonight, and no further proceedings in the case will be had until his return January 6.

RACE WAR IN HARLEM.

Skirmish Between Whites and Blacks Started by Two Boys.

NEW YORK, Dec. 25.—A race skirmish between whites and blacks in Harlem today developed serious proportions and kept the police busy for a time. The negroes, 160 strong, were armed with revolvers and clubs, while equally as many whites used stones and weapons. The negroes had the advantage, but were driven back into their tenements by the police after they had charged on the whites with stones and razors. Fifteen negroes were arrested. Four whites, including a policeman, were badly shot or cut.

The rioting began when some white boys stoned two colored girls, whereupon a dozen negroes seized the white boys and beat them. The boys, when released, told their story to white men in the vicinity, and an organized attack was made on the negroes, who were driven back to their tenements under a shower of stones. The confusion increased when the white men began to bombard the tenements with stones and other missiles, and the negroes fired from their windows into the crowd. The whites, surprised by the shooting and seeing men fall wounded, turned and ran, followed by the negroes, who used knives and clubs freely.

TURNED THE GUN ON HIMSELF.

Suicide of a Disappointed Lover at Chicago.

CHICAGO, Dec. 25.—Charles B. Martin, a manufacturer in the McVicker Theater building, is a well-known police officer, and his death is expected from a bullet wound which has penetrated the abdomen and lungs. The shooting occurred in the office of Angel & Co., 312 to 316 Chamberlain Building, the residence of Miss Bernice Michaus, who had a few minutes before rejected a Christmas offering from Martin.

It is alleged by persons who were in the office at the time of the shooting that Martin had at first threatened to shoot Miss Michaus, and that she had screamed, and that then he turned the gun upon himself, and fired. The police are hoping to get a statement from Martin before his death. Martin is delirious and constantly repeats that the shooting was an accident.

Poured Shot into a Saloon.

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 25.—Unknown men fired about 20 shots into a saloon at the corner of Broadway and Carr streets, early this morning. Two men were wounded, nearly all of the furniture was smashed, and the saloon was badly damaged by the bullets. The injured are: J. W. Smith, shot in the right temple and right wrist, condition serious; and John J. Ryan, shot in the right arm and the right leg.

Murdered by Poultry Thieves.

HUDSON, N. Y., Dec. 25.—Peter A. Hall, a well-known farmer in Columbia County, while alone in his house last night, was shot to death by three unknown men. The men were afterward seen driving toward Catskill Station. Eleven shots were fired at Hall's body. The farmers have lately been annoyed by poultry thieves, and it is thought the murder was done by some one of them.

Riot at the Presidio.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 25.—During a row in a saloon near the Presidio this evening, William Rose, of the Coast Artillery, was stabbed by an unknown soldier. A riot followed. Stones and bricks were thrown and two shots were fired. About 100 soldiers, it is estimated, gathered. The provost guard and police had to be called out to restore order. Fifty-nine soldiers were put in the guardhouse and 15 others taken to the police station. Rose was not badly hurt.

Trail of Bloodshed at Shreveport.

SHREVEPORT, La., Dec. 25.—Christmas day had its trail of bloodshed and fire in Shreveport. There were three killings, all being negroes, and a fire which destroyed property valued at \$75,000. The three killings reported were those of Jack Ryan, colored, who was shot by an unknown man; H. H. Ewell, shot and killed by Charles Bell, and an unknown negro, whose body was found in Wilson alley with an ugly bullet wound in the right side. No arrests were made.

A Denver Mystery.

DENVER, Dec. 25.—The body of Flora McDonald, a waitress, 26 years of age, was found this morning in the city park lake. There were marks on her throat which indicate that she was murdered. The police, however, have concluded that Miss McDonald committed suicide, as there is no evidence to support the theory of murder beyond the few marks on the face and neck.

Quarrel Over a Lead Sled.
