France's Shipping Subsidy Act. New York Times.

The most interesting fact in conne with the operation of the act of 1893 is that the principal increase in the useful tonnage of France has been in foreign built steamers, which received no bounty With this fact in mind, it is not surpris-ing that M. Millerand finds courage to say that the old subsidy law "has had an effect contrary to that which was intend-ed," and that it was "an outrage upon common sense." Six years hence the Min-ister of Commerce then in office will prob-ably have reason to say much the same of the new law. The reasons for the decline of French shipping are deeper seated than can be reached by bounties and subsidies. England is looking for important advantages from the changes in the French system of encouragement for maritime enterprises, and how both Great Britain and France are to profit by it is not quite clear. Probably the satisfaction in England is due to the expectation that fewer French ships will be built and more British ships bought, and that neither those built nor bought will be sailed profitably under the French flag.

The Czar has just sanctioned a remarkable engineering project, the raising of the water of the Sea of Azof 14 feet 8 inches, by buildthe wall immense sea gates are to be made for the passage of ships. There will also be outlets for the superfluous water. The cost will be about £5,000,000, the interest on which will be paid by ships trading to the ports af
