It is confidently believed that Governor McBride will be the un-compromising foe of professional corruptionists and Legislative lobbyists. It has become apparent to everyone, if were not generally known before, that the Governor will never stop during his term of office in his effort to kill off the professional lobbyists and drive them from the capital.

OLYMPIA, Jan. 15.—The Westland Publishing Company, which, under contract, is supplying most of the school books in use in the schools of the state, has won what is considered. what is considered by attorneys a victory of considerable importance, in its efforts to restrain the Olympia School Beard from eliminating various Westland books from the course of study to the advan-tage of other books. The point in ques-tion arose in a suit in the Superior Court of Thurston County, but it will have a great bearing on similar suits already instituted and about to be filed in other places. The answer of the School Board to the complaint of the Westland Company set up that the contracts made by the state board last year were not, as to schedule prices on certain books, within the provisions of the faw making such contracts, and that the books adopted were not suitable for the schools. 

SPOKANE, Jan. 15 .- Colonel W. M. Ridpath, who has announced his candidacy for Congress, is a well-known citizen and politician of this city. He was born in Indiana about 55 years ago, and received his education at Greencastle (now Depauw) University. He practiced law at Greencastle for a number of years, after gallant service for his country in the War of the Rebellion. He became prominent in politics, and was elected to the Indiana Legislature, of which he was Speaker in 1881. John L. Wilson was a member at the same session. Colonel Ridpath moved to Spokane about 15 years ago, and was abortly afterward made Prosecuting Attorney of Spokane County. Colonel Ridpath engaged in mining, and made a great fortune in the famous Le Rol gold mine. He was a Silver Republican in 1896 but soon refurned to the Republican party. His candidacy is not necessarily antagonistic to Representative Jones', though, if he should be nominated, it is not likely that Jones would be. All three Congressmen in Washington are elected at-large.

ALASKA IS TO HAVE ONE OF THE LONGEST IN THE WORLD.

It Will Start on the Beach Near Juneau-Famous Treadwell Claims Are to Be Tapped.

PORT TOWNSEND, Jan. 15 .- Latest ad. vices from Dawson were received today on the steamer Cottage City by Charles Berryman, who left the Klondike capital in the latter part of December, Berry-man says there is a stampede on from Dawson to Henderson Creek, near Stew-art River, the scene of the latest gold strike. Gold was known to exist on this creek some time ago, and many claims were located, but later abandoned. But fecent work has shown that the creek is rich and it is violding to be compared. rich, and it is yielding \$1 80 to the pan an claims cannot be purchased at anything short of fabulous prices. Berryman reports that several thousand men are on the creek. He says the gold belt extends a distance of 10 miles, and owners of claims refuse to consider propositions to purchase even interests in any of their

Preparatory work has been commenced on one of the largest and longest mining tunnels in the world, near Juneau, Alas-The tunnel will be about 8000 feet and will be started on the beach south of Juneau and run into a mountain to tap a large number of claims in the Sliver Bow Basin, formerly owned by Charles D. Lane, who sold them to the Alaska Exploration Company, The Treadwell mine claims will be tapped by an upraise of about 800 feet. A large mili will be built on the beach where it can be operated the year round. It is expected that new veins will be tapped in running the tunnel, as the mountain through which it is to be driven is almost solid quartz. The tunnel and mill will cost in the nelshborhood of £2,000,009 and active work will be commenced March 1.
