LONDON, Jan. 16.—King Edward opened Parliament today with a ceremonial in all essential respects similar to that of February last.

The King and Queen rode out from the courtyard in the Buckingham Palace coach, which was drawn by four horses.

"They were everywhere," said the King, "receiving demonstrations of the liveliest affection, and I am convinced their presence served to cement the bonds of mutual regard and loyalty by which the vigor of the empire is maintained."

Referring to Great Britain's relations with foreign countries, the King said: "My relations with the other powers continue to be most friendly."

Contrary to expectations, the King's reference to the war was not concluded, though the course of the operations have been favorable to our arms.

"I regret," said His Majesty, "that the war in South Africa is not yet concluded, though the course of the operations have been favorable to our arms."
