RECEIVED ON EQUAL TERMS

Audience Granted by the Chinese
Emperor to the Foreign Ministers.

PEKING, Jan. 23.—The Ministers of the
foreign powers here have attained the
goal which has been their aim since the
recourse between China and the powers
began. They have been received as rep-
resentatives of sovereigns equal in rank to
the Chinese Emperor. The audiences yester-
day between the Emperor and the Min-
isters were held in the innermost large
hall of the Forbidden City. The Emperor
sat upon a dais behind a table. There
were four Princes at the back of his
chair, and a dozen officials on each side.
The Dowager Empress was concealed by a
screen, according to stories of the attend-
ants, and remained invisible. The audi-
ence chamber was furnished ornately, in
contrast to the dingy rooms which served
for these audiences under the old regime.
The secretaries translated the addresses of
the Ministers, copies of which were handed
to the Emperor. The replies were de-
livered by Prince Ching. The Emperor
was silent throughout the audience, and
remained stolid and impassive.

Formerly the Emperor replied to the
Ministers in Manchú, and the Prince in-
terpreted what he said. Today he ap-
peared as an autocrat, and the secre-
taries of the foreign Ministers, who were
present, report that he looked weaker,
less intellectual and milder than previous
to the siege.

China Repaid.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—Secretary Hay
today handed to Minister Wu a draft on
the United States Treasury for \$25,000, be-
lieving the value of the silver bullion cap-
tured by the American marines at Tien
Tsin.

ACUBAN DEMONSTRATION.

Appeal for Reciprocity Between the
United States and the Island.

HAVANA, Jan. 23.—Today was a holiday
in Havana. A large meeting in the
interest of reciprocity was held in the
Tacon Theater, at which Senors Montoro,
Sayas and Dolz were the speakers. After
the meeting a procession was formed,
which marched to the palace of the Gov-
ernor-General. Here a committee waited
upon Governor Wood and presented resolu-
tions to the effect that the people of
Cuba of all classes, Cuban economic so-
cieties, political parties and municipal-
ities, believe that the ruin and desolation
now threatening the island render useless
the efforts of the United States and Cuba
to establish a stable government and re-
construct the country. These resolutions
also suggest that the Cuban committee
now in Washington be recognized as the
representative of the entire island and
say it is a duty which the United States
owes Cuba to establish relations of re-
ciprocity with the island.

The American Club, which participated
in the manifestation, sent cablegrams to
President Roosevelt, the Speaker of the
House and the president of the Merchants'
Union of New York, urging the establish-
ment of reciprocity.

Killed in a Pistol Duel.

HUNTINGTON, W. Va., Jan. 23.—
Colonel Gilbert Bentley, a wealthy timber-
man of Big Sandy Valley, was shot to
death during a pistol duel with Riley
Ramsey. The men held an old grudge.
Ramsey has surrendered.

Victor Emmanuel Honor's Marconi.

THEY MUST EXPLAIN

Canal Commissioners Will Be
Asked Why They Changed.

MORGAN HOT ON THEIR TRAIL

Hearings on Cuban Reciprocity Dis-
cussing to Its Advocates—Ap-
propriation for Lewis and
Clark Centennial.

PRINCE HENRY'S TRAVELS

The Plan as Chosen by the Com-
mittee on Arrangements.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—Emperor Wil-
helm has approved of the committee on
arrangements for the reception of Prince
Henry, as far as they go. He has left to
the committee the details of the general
plan. In its present shape the plan looks

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—There is con-
siderable mystery about the delay in the
canal consideration at the present time,
but it is understood that Senator Morgan
is utilizing the time in preparing a re-
port upon the new phases of the situa-
tion as developed by the supplemental re-
port of the commission. It is also under-
stood that various members of the Canal
Commission are to be summoned before
the Senate committee on interoceanic
canals, and will be requested to produce
the documents and papers upon which it
founded its supplemental report, and show
why its views changed from Nicaragua to
Panama.

The determination of Morgan to push
the Nicaragua scheme regardless of the
recent report on the Panama route is
making some of those advocates of the
Panama scheme, with more zeal than
sense, talk of deposing Morgan from the
chairmanship of the committee. Nothing
of this kind will be undertaken, because
no matter what Morgan does, the Senate
will not offer an insult of that kind to a
man of his standing.

There is considerable talk about con-
cessions from both Colombia and Nicara-
gua, but it is asserted by the State De-
partment that neither government can
grant an absolute sovereignty, as their
constitutions prohibit them from alienat-
ing territory. If the United States is to
assume control of either route, it will be
in the form of leasing, and, while this
Government will have absolute control of
the right of way in either country, the
sovereignty will technically rest with
either Nicaragua or Colombia, as the case
may be.

Cubans Make a Poor Showing.

The advocates of Cuban reciprocity are
very much depressed. The hearings in the
House have been decidedly discouraging
to them. Even the Cubans themselves
made a poor showing. A majority of the
ways and means committee cannot be
counted in favor of even a limited re-
ciprocity, although only one Democrat
voted against it. The Republican Admin-
istration seems unable to control the Re-
publican majority of the committee. Many
leading Senators still declare that a mea-
sure of relief for Cuba will be passed at
this session, but Senator Allison, who in-
dorses this sentiment, says that it must
originate in the House, which probably
means that if the House does not act the
Senate cannot. This is no doubt true,
because reduction of the tariff on goods
coming from Cuba would be a revenue
measure, and must originate in the House.
The Cubans are making a great mistake
by continuing to threaten brigandage and
disturbances unless concessions on sugar
and tobacco are made by the United
States.

An Object-Lesson.

As an illustration of the necessity for
more stringent laws restricting Chinese
immigration, Commissioner Powderly to-
day took before the Senate committee two
Chinese men, one of whom he brought il-
legally in this country. One, Chan Leung,
is believed to have entered at Portland
with papers he had fraudulently purchased
for \$20 from a merchant, and the other,
Lee Sang, similarly entered at Tacoma.
Both will probably be returned to China.

Appropriation for 1905 Fair.

The Evening Times, under large head-
lines, calls attention to the proposed
Lewis and Clark Centennial at Portland,
and says that there is a prospect that
Congress will be asked for a good-sized
appropriation this winter. It speaks of
the famous expedition to Oregon, which
this exposition intends to commemorate,
and says that the organizers do not con-
sider it as in any way competing with the
St. Louis Fair.

Movements of the Delegation.

There is no present intention on the
part of any member of the Oregon dele-
gation to return to Oregon and take an
active part in the coming campaign, al-
though later developments may change
this plan. Each member was today asked
if he intends returning to Oregon before
the close of this session of Congress.

COMES LADEN WITH PRESENTS.

Prince Henry Will Bring Costly Gifts
for His American Entertainers.

BERLIN, Jan. 23.—Prince Henry of
Prussia, selected at the court jeweler's this
morning about 50 presents for Americans
with whom he will be especially in con-
tact during his visit to the United States.
The presents include several gold and sil-
ver boxes, set with diamonds, enameled
on the lids; beautiful silver cups; with
"Hohenzollern" enameled on them; gold
and silver cigarette-cases, on which His
Majesty's autograph is traced in small
diamonds, and small compasses, incased
in gold and silver boxes, with "Hohen-
zollern" enameled on them, besides larger
and more valuable gifts. Official secrecy
is maintained as to what the Emperor
and Prince Henry will present to the
President, Rear-Admiral Robley D. Evans
and Miss Alice Roosevelt, though it is
well known that His Majesty will send
Miss Roosevelt a jeweled bracelet and
Prince Henry will probably offer the
President a fine hunting gun, with inter-
changeable shot and rifle barrels, and its
accompanying equipment.

Tongue's Assay Office Bill.

At the next meeting of the House com-
mittee on coinage, weights and measures,
hearings will be given on Representative
Tongue's bill to establish an assay office
at Portland, and on Representative Cus-
hman's bill to establish a mint at Tacoma.
