GRAIN MARKETS.

Chicago Wheat Pits Have the Dullest Day for Some Time.

CHICAGO, Feb. 5.—Wheat lay almost lifeless today—the dullest market it has experienced for a long time. Routine news was in indifferent, and on the whole the pit lacked any nature to redeem it from lethargy. May at last broke the monotony of yesterday's close. There was almost no speculation. Cables were slightly lower, but improved with the day. May opened 1/2 higher, at 77 1/2, and sold up to 78 1/2. On the corn break May slowly declined to 77 1/2, but reacted on covering, the main reaction in corn and the improving wheat. May closed a trifle weak, 76 1/2 lower.

Corn, while not so dull as wheat, was a weak and quiet market. Sentiment was generally bearish, regardless of bullish news from the west. Corn closed barely weak, 1/2 lower, at 43 1/2.

Oats were profoundly dull. May closed 1/2 lower, at 44c.

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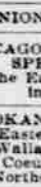
