Anxious About Legationists. WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—The State Department has received through Minister Wu what purports to be an edict of the Chinese Government, and directed to the Government of the United States, inquiring as to the condition of people connected with the United States Legation at Peking, who went through the boxer siege, and expressing an interest in their welfare.

Safeguarding American Rights. PEKING, Feb. 12.—United States Minister Conger has obtained assurances safeguarding the rights of the American Hankow-Canton syndicate, which were controlled by similar concessions to Belgians. Prince Ching, president of the Foreign Office, says the concessions granted to Belgians by local officers are worthless unless ratified by the Government, which will not grant anything prejudicing American rights.

Government Again Overruled. BERLIN, Feb. 12.—The tariff committee again overruled the government to-day, and in spite of the opposition of the Ministerial members of the committee, adopted a radical motion abrogating all commercial duties on cattle, meat, corn and their products, with the exception of brewing malt, from April 1, following the date when the tariff law becomes effective.

Disturbances in Spain. MADRID, Feb. 12.—There have been renewed disturbances in several towns. At St. Sebastian, crowds of people stoned the police and the latter charged several times. A score of persons were wounded. In Barcelona the strikers and workers have had several conflicts. Shots were exchanged and a number of people were wounded.
