

FIERCE SNOW STORM

New York's Worst Blizzard Since 1888.

MOST SEVERE IN METROPOLIS

Cold Wave Extends to Sixteen Counties—High Winds Along With It—Traffic Almost Suspended—Worst in Over.

NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—New York City has borne the brunt of the fiercest snow storm that has struck this section of the country since the great blizzard of 1888.

Communication between Manhattan and Brooklyn was subject to long delay. The ferry-boats with difficulty made trips across the ice-choked rivers and the work of tug boats, lighters and shipping generally was almost at a standstill.

Tonight, the local weather bureau reports that the worst of the snowfall, which began to abate in the afternoon, is probably over. The fall up to 3 o'clock in the afternoon was 2.3 inches.

General Blockade in Brooklyn. The blockade was even more general than that of Manhattan, and little progress was made by the street-cleaning department beyond opening crosswalks on the principal streets.

Washington, Feb. 17.—The severe storm which started on the Florida coast Friday night and raged along the coast to Cape Cod, New England, and to the coast of New Jersey, according to the weather bureau reports.

Foot of Snow in New England. BOSTON, Feb. 17.—After an unbroken stretch of clear weather dating back to Wednesday New England was today deluged with a foot of wet snow and swept by a gale.

Connecticut in It, Too. NEW HAVEN, Conn., Feb. 17.—The most severe snow storm of the season began in Connecticut at 8 A. M. Railroad traffic was in every respect greater than in the great blizzard of 1888.

4000 Men Clearing Streets. Four thousand men were set to work to clear the streets of Manhattan early in the afternoon. Of these, half were engaged in opening crosswalks, while 2000 men and 200 trucks were employed to work all night clearing the main streets.

Country Roads Closed. NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—Eighteen inches of snow fell in Oswego, N. Y., today, and drifts six feet high are common tonight. Trolley service was abandoned by noon. Country roads are closed.

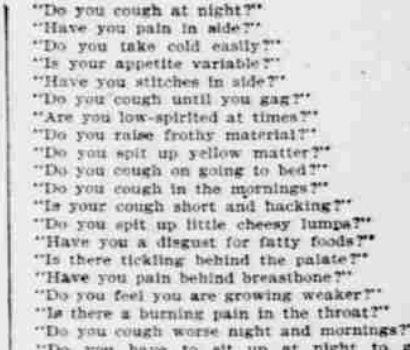

Today the 40 strikers—the oldest is not yet 15 years old—told the rector, Rev. Dr. Franklin Moore, with the rector's son as spokesman, that the organist and chorister instituted a plan of fines that takes from them all remuneration for their services and leaves them in debt to the church at the end of each month.

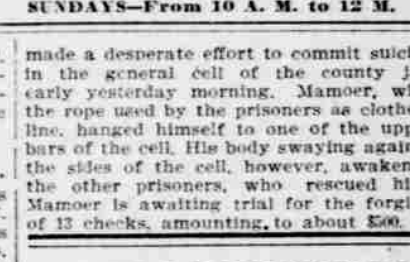
