

LOOKS LIKE GODWIN

Democrats Likely to Name Him for Mayor.

PRIMARIES HELD AT SEATTLE

Godwin's Opponent Is Steve Bailey—Humes' Forces on Republican Side Confident Caucuses Were in Their Favor.

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 18.—The Democrats held their primaries in this city tonight. There was a large turnout, and there is every reason to predict that the majority of the delegates elected to the coming city convention will be for J. W. Godwin for Mayor. Many of the leading Democrats of the city are opposed to him, but they are satisfied that he has the organization and cannot be defeated for the nomination. Mr. Godwin's fight is being managed by Eugene W. Bailey, who is recognized as the best politician in his party in this city. Mr. Bailey's only opponent in the coming convention will be Steve Bailey, until recently proprietor of the Hotel Northern. He hopes with his money to capture the nomination, but Godwin has already disposed much money, and is prepared to spend more in order to keep his men in line.

HUMES' FORCES JUBILANT.

Confident They Controlled Two-Thirds of Republican Caucuses. SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 18.—The Humes forces won a signal victory in last night's Republican caucus, and unless something extraordinary happens, the Mayor will get a big majority of delegates to the city convention, to be chosen at the primaries tomorrow. The Humes campaign committee says it controlled two-thirds of the caucuses, and that it will have a like number, at least, of delegates to the convention. Controller Paul's friends are despondent today, and privately give up the nomination for Mayor to Humes. As a matter of fact, the Humes committee was surprised at his strength in the caucuses, as up to last night there was a general feeling that the fight would be a close one. The caucuses were spirited and well attended.

CALL FOR SETTLERS TO MEET.

Clark County People to Consider Railroad "Overlap" Case. VANCOUVER, Wash., Feb. 18.—A. G. Olson, president of the Clark County Settlers Union, has called a meeting of that organization at the courthouse in Vancouver, March 4. The meeting is called for the purpose of discussing the appeal, recently ordered by the president to be taken in the case of the United States against the Northern Pacific Railway Company, involving the company's right to lands in the "overlap" region, and for considering ways and means of furthering the interests of the railroad land settlers.

Killed in a Landslide.

EVERETT, Wash., Feb. 18.—Coroner Beckman, after an investigation, finds that the two Japanese section hands killed in the Coast Line landslide near K. M. Momo and J. Tokutsu. The coroner believes other members of the section party were drowned, but the debris is too deep to recover the bodies. P. Berard and John Thielman, of Everett, are in this city to build a large log and shingle mill. The firm recently acquired 150,000,000 feet of timber on the Straits of Furia. Everett Lodge, No. 43, R. P. O. E., has sent invitations to Portland, and every lodge in Washington, to attend the opening of the new temple, when a class of 175 will be initiated.

MEDALS GO TO BALL'S TEAM

Handicap Record Broken in Multnomah Bowling Contest. BALL's men did some high bowling last evening and captured the medals in the Multnomah Club's weekly bowling contest. The team broke the handicap record, making a total of 800 points with its allowance of 48. High scores were made by all the members of the team. Ball made 65, the highest single score of the contest. Abendroth made the high total of 220, with Sydney second with 215. Rauser's team was high on Monday night, making a total of 735. EMBEZZLED FOR YEARS

GREAT FALLS BANK CASHIER ARRESTED ON NEW CHARGE.

If He Secures Bail, He Will Be Taken in Custody on Still Another Charge.

GREAT FALLS, Mont., Feb. 18.—H. H. Matteson, who January 5 confessed to embezzling \$5,000 from the First National Bank while acting as cashier, is now known to have taken \$12,000, his operations extending over three years. The facts were made known at a meeting of the bank directors today. Another complaint was sworn out against Matteson, who is out on \$500 bail. He was taken before a Commissioner and his bail fixed at \$5,000. The new charge being that he embezzled \$5,000 October 20. Matteson was not found until last night. He could not furnish the new bond, and he will probably be taken to Helena tomorrow and lodged in jail.

ONE MORE PITCHER SIGNED.

New Player for Portland From Albany, N. Y.

Manager Vigneux, of the Portland baseball team, has signed a pitcher, George H. Witbeck, of Albany, N. Y. Witbeck comes highly recommended by "Doc" Peters, formerly president of the New York State League, and a personal friend of Vigneux's. He pitched for Union College, Schenectady, N. Y., in 1900 and 1901, and his team did not lose a game during the whole period. Last Summer Young Witbeck joined the Potsdam, N. Y., independent league team, and made a phenomenal record as a pitcher. When he returned to college he was disqualified from further participation in amateur contests, so decided to try conclusions with one of the larger professional leagues. He received handsome offers from Detroit, Kansas City, Syracuse and Rochester, but decided to sign with Portland, as he is anxious to see something of the "wild and woolly West."

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FOR CIVIC IMPROVEMENTS

EAST SIDE ASSOCIATION IN LINE WITH MOVEMENT.

C. M. Hyland Explains What the League Hopes to Accomplish—Mass Meeting Planned.

The regular meeting of the East Side Improvement Association was held last night in the room of the Young Men's Association, and was fairly well attended. W. L. Boise, vice-president, presided in the absence of W. D. Fenton. A communication was read from the secretary of the American League for Civic Improvements, asking the organization to affiliate with the league. G. M. Hyland, of the Lewis and Clark Oriental League, for Civic Improvement, was present by invitation, and gave a stirring address. He explained just what the Portland organization hopes to accomplish in the way of beautifying Portland. He said opposition had actually been encountered from a few, but that on the whole the effort was receiving encouragement from every direction. Committee, he said, were soon to be named which would take up the practical work. The speaker said he had just received from the headquarters of the American League 60 copies of a valuable publication that costs 15 cents a copy. From this literature it could be ascertained what is best to do. Among many things, Mr. Hyland mentioned as part of the work to be done the repair of sidewalks, walks and the encouragement of the use of concrete in their construction. Mr. Hyland said that the intention was to offer prizes for best back yards as well as front yards, and he hoped before the season is over to have every boy and girl in the city interested in floriculture. A mass meeting would be arranged to be held in the Marquam, when a public exposition of the whole subject would be given. Along these lines Mr. Hyland spoke with great force, and he was constantly applauded. Frank R. Gibson, president of the Portland League, was also present, and made a short talk, urging the association to do its part in the work that had been undertaken. He said the association with 200 members could be made a great force for good.
