

LOW LICENSE STAYS

Common Council Keeps \$400 Ordinance in Effect.

MAYOR'S VETO IS SUSTAINED

Vote Is Six to Four—Appropriation Made for Fire Engine, but Not for Fire Tower—Upper Washington to Be Improved.

The session of the Common Council yesterday was an unusually long one. The members were present when Mayor Rowe called the meeting to order except Masters, and he arrived some time after. The routine business of the meeting, including the annulling of the bonds transacted at the special meeting on February 10 and re-naming part of it, was disposed of expeditiously, and then the ordinance granting a \$25,000 franchise to the Pacific States Telephone & Telegraph Company was passed.

The Mayor returned without his approval of the ordinance increasing by 50 percent the license of saloonkeepers, restaurant-keepers and persons selling liquor in unbroken packages, as well as an ordinance making appropriation for the purchase of a fire engine and water tower, and an ordinance transferring \$1000 to the street and sewer interest fund, for the payment of interest on street and sewer warrants.

The question being, shall the ordinance be notwithstanding the veto of the Mayor, a vote was taken on each, and the vetoes were sustained by ayes 4, noes 2. Those voting to pass the ordinance were Messrs. Brown, Gilman, Holbrook and Neilson.

Mr. Brown, in explaining his vote, stated that he was not satisfied that the ordinance was illegal, nor that the ordinance increasing the liquor license was invalid in any sense.

Appropriation for Fire Engine.
The ordinance making an appropriation for the purchase of a fire engine and a water tower was presented in a new form, appropriating \$500 to provide for the purchase of a fire engine, and was passed upon suspension of the rules.

The appropriation for the water tower was omitted, an account of lack of funds, owing to the failure to increase the fee for liquor licenses, but the engine had been ordered, and payment for it had to be provided.

Later a list of some 120 saloonkeepers, whose application for licenses had been reported on favorably by the license committee, was on motion of Mr. Holbrook referred back to the committee. The reason given for this was that the saloonkeepers had set up a claim that by the approval of their applications for licenses the Council would have entered into a contract with them for a year, and therefore the charge for licenses could not be increased during the year. It was stated that the end of the attempt to increase the price of liquor license is not yet.

Street and Sewer Ordinances.
Ordinances declaring the proportionate share of the cost of constructing sewers on the following named streets and making appropriation for the cost thereof were passed:

Commercial street \$200.00
Mississippi street 60.00
East Twenty-first street, from East Stark to East Pine; Sacramento street, from East King to East Main; East Twenty-second, from East Stark to East Pine; Mississippi avenue, from Skidmore to Shaver street.

An ordinance to change and establish the grade of King street at a point 20 feet south of Main, in Johnson's Addition, at 213 feet above the base of city grades, was passed.

An ordinance appropriating \$337.15 to provide for the cost of opening, laying out and establishing Pennsylvania avenue from a point 100 feet north of Baldwin street to Willoughby street, was passed.

An ordinance declaring it a nuisance to maintain a steam laundry within the limits of block 121, Portland, was on motion of Mr. Mulkey, referred to the committee on health and police, with a petition from residents in the vicinity asking for the suppression of the laundry in question, which is situated at Second and Columbia streets.

NEW FRANCHISE GRANTED

Council Acts Favorably on Telephone Ordinance.

Company Makes Various Concessions

Will Pay Annual License Tax—Wires Underground.

An ordinance granting a 25 years' franchise to the Pacific States Telephone & Telegraph Company was passed by the City Council yesterday. The company made many concessions from the terms of its original proposed franchise. It agreed to pay the \$500 license tax, \$500 per year for the franchise, to maintain a first-class fire-alarm telephone system, and to place the wires underground within the fire limit. The vote was 5 ayes, 2 noes.

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NEW BUILDINGS STARTED

TEARING DOWN OLD STRUCTURES THE ORDER OF THE DAY.

Tenants Move Out of Failing Stores

at Third and Morrison—Extension to First National Bank.

Tearing down and building up and moving into new quarters is the order of the day in Portland at present. The tenants of the buildings on the property of the Failing estate, at Third and Morrison, where a new building is soon to be erected, are beginning to move out. Frank Koln, who has so long occupied the cigar store at the corner, has moved to quarters in the next block. The other tenants are under orders to be out by March 1, and will fit as soon as the new place is ready. It is said that the building will be moved before April 1, as the temporary store being erected for them at Fifth and Yamhill has been delayed by the cold snap, and will be completed as soon as the weather improves. A long protest from the Taxpayers' League against the passage of the ordinance was read and placed on file. Mr. Brown stated that he has given it out that the ordinance would not be brought up for action at this meeting, as the committee proposed by various members as the ordinance was read.

The provision that the wires should be put under ground within the existing fire limits, within a certain time, Branch and others insisted should be changed so that underground wires should follow any extension of the fire limits, and this provision was finally inserted.

It was also provided that the police department wires be accommodated in the underground conduits of the company, and the action repealing the present franchise was broadened to include all the franchises granted by Portland, East Portland or Albina, under which the company was operating or could operate.

Finally the committee rose, and the chairman stated that they were ready to report. The ordinance, with the amendments, and substituted sections inserted, was read, and the report was adopted, and it was moved that it be put on its final passage.

PAISLEY, Or., Feb. 14.—(To the Editor.)—Permit me to suggest that it would be of great advantage to Lake County and especially to the northern part of the county, if the twice a week mail service between Prineville and Silver Lake was changed to at least six times a week. Prineville has a daily mail from Shaniko. Silver Lake has a six times a week mail service from Paisley, so that by making the change suggested Lake County would have a much more direct communication with Portland.

Letters that leave Portland in the morning arrive in Prineville the next morning. By the change suggested they would reach Silver Lake in 24 hours more and Paisley in 48 hours.

As it is now we often receive letters of the same date from Portland and Chicago by the same mail, and the Oregonian always one day and frequently two days later reaching us than the San Francisco dailies of same date. Will you kindly call the attention of Portland business men to this fact, as we should like to secure their co-operation in getting this matter before the postal authorities.
