THILPSONS MEET.—At the annual convention of the Pacific Coast Billposters' Association held in this city, the following officers were elected: President, W. H. Lee, of Santa Rosa, Cal.; vice-president, J. T. Williams, of Portland; secretary, A. Spaulding, of Boise, Idaho; treasurer, W. Casswell, of Sacramento, Cal. The delegates elected to the National convention were: A. Spaulding, of Boise, and Walter Foster, of Seattle. It was decided to hold the next annual convention in San Francisco. Reports received by the association showed the membership to be about 75 out of a total of 200 billposters in the district, which comprises Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, California, Arizona and New Mexico. In Oregon there are about 20 billposters, nearly all of whom are members of the association. Washington also has a number of billposters and the representatives gave their full share of attention to the entertainment of the delegates from other states. The Californians were made to feel thoroughly at home, and they were in hopes of holding another convention in Portland.

MARTIN DIDN'T RESEMBLE.—A stevedore's row was investigated yesterday by Municipal Judge Cameron, when Michael Martin was accused of having assaulted James Troy last Saturday night with the butt end of a revolver. December 18, at Second and Ash streets. Troy testified that he and Martin had been employed by Brown & McCabe up to about the end of last year, and that Martin was discharged because of his drinking and by reason of his having neglected to hand in the men's time checks. "Martin had it for me because he lost his position. He was under the influence of liquor at the time and struck me twice with the revolver," went on Troy. Martin testified: "I was drinking at the time, and do not know whether I had a gun or not. I have no recollection of striking Troy, nor anyone else." A. Walter Wolf, Martin's counsel, argued that his client would not harm anybody. The case was continued.

COUNCILMAN MULKEY HOME.—Councilman F. W. Mulkey occupied his seat in the Council yesterday for the first time in three months. He has been on an extended Eastern trip under leave of absence. He spent the greater part of the time he was gone in New York City; but he visited Boston, Washington, Charleston and other important cities on his way to New Orleans, and came home by the Southern route, visiting Los Angeles and San Francisco. He is looking remarkably well after his long trip, and settled down to business quite contentedly. He has formed a good opinion of asphalt streets during his travels, and would favor asphalt for the improvement of Fourth street and the upper end of Washington street, but the Council has decided on wood blocks treated with the carbolic acid solution for both jobs.

RECEPTION TO NEW MEMBERS.—Since the last of October 75 persons have united with the Taylor-Street Methodist Episcopal Church. Next Friday night a public reception will be tendered these new members at the church lecture room. All members of the church and regular attendants upon its services are invited to be present. The new members will speak on the "Life and Character of Washington." Special music, suitable for a patriotic service, will be furnished by the choir.

NEW CHARTER TO BE PRINTED.—Sander-son Reed, of the Charter Board, is preparing a copy of the instrument for the printer. The purpose is to have the charter in pamphlet form, issued in three or four weeks, so that all citizens may have a copy to study it before the primary elections. All the sections of the instrument will be remembered. As much of the charter as was not amended in revision will be left in its former type, and only a part will have to be reset. Ten thousand copies of the charter will be printed.

QUICK TRIP FROM DAWSON.—Yesterday The Oregonian received a letter from the agent in Dawson, Yukon Territory, dated January 10, 1902. It had come through to Portland in 18 days. From Dawson to White Horse the letter was transported by stage over the ice of the Yukon; from White Horse to Skagway over the White Pass Railway line; from Skagway to Seattle by steamer; from Seattle to Portland by rail. This mail in transportation has been brought about in four years.

NEW FACE IN COURT.—With his face scarred and blacked, from the effects of his having fallen off the sidewalk while he was under the influence of liquor, George Watson appeared yesterday before Municipal Judge Cameron, charged with drunkenness, and to whom a guilty verdict had been rendered in the court before. "I haven't been in the court before," observed Watson. "Not with your present face. The fine will be \$2," observed the Judge quickly.

ON A CHARGE OF FORGERY.—The case against J. W. Bragg, charged with forgery, will be heard in the Municipal Court Monday. The complaint was issued by Municipal Judge Cameron, charging Bragg with forging the name of John M. McKay, who forged his name, November 5, to an order purporting to be a time check issued by Smith, Howard & Mason, and made payable to McKay's order, for \$27.40.

SAN FRANCISCO POST SOLD.

Mr. Harriman Getting Out of the Newspaper Business.

It is reported from San Francisco that the Southern Pacific Company has disposed of the Evening Post, the oldest and most influential newspaper in the city. The purchase price is \$100,000. The company has been a losing venture financially for the railroad, costing the corporation over \$400,000 a year.

Among San Francisco politicians the sale of the paper is regarded as another victory for General Manager William H. Mills. The two last wanted to retain the paper as a railroad organ, and for a long time defeated all efforts to purchase it. French Industrial Schools.

CHICAGO, Feb. 18.—M. Lazare Weiller, Baron d'Estou, Constant, Baron de Lagotellerie and Vicomte Farmon, members of the commission to look up after the French industrial schools in the United States, again have visited President Harper, of the Chicago University. They discussed with him the conditions upon which the French Government on the plan of locating two of the proposed schools, one of economics and one of engineering, in this city. It was stated after the conference that the matter would be closed until the French commissioners had seen John D. Rockefeller. They left late last night for New York for that purpose.

American in a Mexican Jail.

DALLAS, Tex., Feb. 18.—A special to the News from Eagle Pass says: George Harper, in charge of a commission to look up after the extension of the Mexican International Railroad, now under construction, is in jail there, charged with shooting a Mexican laborer. He has been in the jail for 72 hours, but is now allowed to see his lawyers. The killing is alleged to have been justifiable, but details are meager. He is a son of the Rev. J. T. Harper, a Methodist minister, now living in San Antonio, and is well known in Southwestern Texas.

Chicago Egg Famine.

CHICAGO, Feb. 18.—Eggs are being brought to Chicago from California to supply local establishments. Eggs have reached 33¢, the highest since 1890, when they sold at 30¢ per dozen. There were 3000 cases in, but this was less than 50 per cent of the receipts of the same day last year. Dealers, in discussing high prices told about sales being made for a number of days in 1873 at 50 cents a dozen. A snow storm then blocked the railroads and checked receipts.
