TRoubles of the De Cicio in Court.
 The troubles of the De Cicio family came up yesterday before Municipal Judge Cameron, when Mrs. Rosa De Cicio was accused of having threatened the life of her husband, A. De Cicio. The court awarded the custody of the De Cicio children to the father. The latter and his divorced wife have frequently been at law since. De Cicio testified yesterday that while he was standing talking to a friend at Fifth and Sherman streets Monday night Mrs. De Cicio came up, waving a piece of wood, and threatened to take his life. Mrs. De Cicio, in the highest Italian, denied the charge—through an interpreter. "If you will promise not to go near your husband I will let you go," said the judge. "She says she has no desire to go near her husband," remarked the interpreter. After adjusting her hat to her own satisfaction Mrs. De Cicio left the courtroom.

DEATH OF GEORGE A. STINGER.—George A. Stinger, a well-known volunteer fireman, who came to Portland in 1880, died yesterday morning at his home, 535 Couch street, from an attack of pneumonia. He was in his usual excellent health last evening, but he caught a sudden cold, which led to his death. Mr. Stinger was 61 years old, and he followed various vocations in this city until several years ago, when he retired from an active business life. He was living with his son, Charles W. Stinger, ticket agent for the Southern Pacific Company, and his daughter, Miss Frances L. Stinger, at 535 Couch street. Another married daughter, Mrs. J. H. Dundore, survives him. His wife died about three years ago. Mr. Stinger's funeral will take place at the Cathedral Friday morning at 10 o'clock.

ACCIDENT TO PETER TAYLOR.—Peter Taylor, a well-known pioneer citizen, who is 79 years of age, but still a rather active man, went down to Long Beach on Saturday morning to look after his summer residence. He arrived there last Saturday, and, finding that the roof of his house was leaking slightly, he got up on it to insert a shingle to stop the leak. In some way he slipped on the wet roof and fell to the ground, breaking one of his floating ribs, and being rather seriously bruised and shaken up. His son, Dr. W. Taylor, and his daughter as soon as informed of his mishap, went down to the beach and arrived home with him yesterday morning. Mr. Taylor is unable to sit up or turn over, but it is hoped that his condition is not dangerous.

TO ROOM 196 FAIR—ALBERT TOSTER, president of the National Editorial Association, and Will A. Steel, executive committee member of the association, arrived in Portland yesterday and began the arrangement of the routes over which the delegates from Alaska, British Columbia, Oregon, Washington, and Idaho will travel to Hot Springs, Ark., where the convention will be held on April 15. The delegates will leave here about April 8, and will pass one day in St. Louis, visiting the World's Fair. They will go armed with bugles and descriptive matter of the Lewis and Clark Fair, which will be held in Portland in 1905, and they will use no opportunity to advertise the industries of the Northwest.

WOMAN'S CLUB PROGRAMME.—A symposium on the progress of woman in the 19th century will be the attraction at the Woman's Club Friday, February 28. The programme is in charge of Mrs. L. B. Hidden. MAYOR APPROVES POLICE INVESTIGATION.—Mayor Beane yesterday approved a communication signed "Ten Indignant Taxpayers," criticizing very severely the conduct of the police force at the fire last Sunday. He says he supposed that everyone knew that he had no authority to do with the management of the Police Department and has absolutely no control over it. As a citizen he favored a thorough investigation of the alleged outrages, but had no authority to order one.

LONG-HEADED COW.—Albert Schneider, a dairyman of Clatsop county, has a fine 5-year-old cow named "Long Head," which he sold yesterday by Municipal Judge Cameron, charged with violating city ordinance 10,556 in allowing his cows to walk along an East side bicycle path. It was suggested at the previous hearing in this case that the knowing cows refused to walk on the roadway because the rough stones injured their feet.

ANOTHER DELAY IN LIBRARY OPENING.—Miss Mary Beane, director of the Portland Public Library, said yesterday it would be impossible for the library to be reopened by March 1, as was announced some time ago. The long reading tables will not be ready at that time, and some other work which is behind will make it necessary to again postpone the date until about a week after March 1.

FOUNDLING A BEEZ SAW.—While working yesterday at one of the mills of the Albion Lumber Company, L. E. Hollis was painfully injured by one of the fingers of his right hand coming in contact with a buzz saw in motion. Hollis, who lives at the Everett Lodging-House, was taken to the Good Samaritan Hospital, where it was found necessary to amputate the injured finger.

PROMOTION OF W. HEARN.—The promotion of W. Hearn, manager of the Postal Telegraph Company in this city, to the management of the San Francisco office of the same company, is looked upon as the deserved recognition of the services of a man who has been a telegraph operator since his 14th birthday. Mr. Hearn's father was a telegraph operator on the Grand Trunk line in Vermont, and it was in the office of his father that he learned the keys. At the age of 18 he was an operator, but he did not enter the telegraph service until he was 24, when he accepted a position with the Canadian Pacific at Winnipeg. As was the custom of operators in the '80s, he traveled a good deal, and he had stations in Chicago, Memphis, Vicksburg, New Orleans and other places on the Western Union route. In 1890 he took a position with the Postal Telegraph Company, and he came to Portland as night chief operator. He was made day chief soon after, and in April, 1897, he was appointed manager. He has now under his charge two telegraph offices. When he assumes the management of the San Francisco office he will have the direction of 15 branches. He will resign the Portland office to his successor, A. A. Sand, who is well known in Portland, on March 1, and will leave for San Francisco about a week later.

PLANS FOR A. O. U. W. CONVENTION.—The League of Honor of the A. O. U. W., which has in charge the arrangements for the entertainment of the delegates to the convention of the supreme lodge of the order, which will be held in Portland in June, visited Pacific Lodge last night. Past Grand Master Werlein made a brief speech, explaining the importance of the convention to the order and to the city. He said that the delegates would be a great deal of encouragement in its work, and all the lodges in the city were united in the effort to make the convention one long to be remembered by both the citizens and the delegates. Mr. Werlein's remarks were received with applause. Next Tuesday evening the league will visit Eureka lodge, which is located in Astoria.

SUGAR GOES AT ANY PRICE.—Sugar at any price is the result of the war now raging between Pacific Coast jobbers and the refiners. In Portland the retail dealer is buying sugar at prices between \$4.50 and \$4.90 per hundred. Inasmuch, however, as the war does not extend to retailers, consumers get little benefit from the fight. "The retailers are the ones who make the money," said a dealer yesterday. But many retailers need all the money they can make. They got "pinched" by the last drop of 15 cents in a way that fills local jobbers with grief. They had been buying direct from San Francisco, and had laid up considerable supply. Now there is competition among them to get their money out.

ZIONISTS MEET TONIGHT.—The officers of the Portland Zionist Society have received a number of inquiries as to whether or not the annual meeting of that society to be held this evening is for members only, and whether the organization is a sectarian one. They desire it to be distinctly understood in the first place that the society is non-sectarian, and that all of its meetings are open to the public, especially the one to be held in the vestry of the Temple Beth Israel this evening at 8 o'clock, for which an interesting programme has been arranged and to which the public is welcome. FARMERS HOLD POTATOES.—Since the recent drop in potato prices farmers have not been selling so freely. They are evidently waiting for the market to recover. Some farmers think dealers shipped great quantities of potatoes to San Francisco for the special purpose of lowering prices. In the past 10 days 22,000 sacks have gone from here to the Bay City, and 8,000 more will go tonight. The California market could not withstand such a shock without giving way. Prices in the local market are about 10 cents per 100 lower than they were. Growers receive prices ranging from \$1 to \$1.25.

TO SCALE MOUNT ADAMS.

Mazama Decide on Scene of Summer's Outing.

A fully attended meeting of the Mazama Council was held last night, and after brief talks by the members, the mountaineers decided to make Mount Adams the scene of their next explorations. According to the programme as agreed upon, the party will leave Portland July 15 and will travel over the Columbia River and White Salmon route. The itinerary of the trip is as follows: White Salmon, July 15; Trout Lake, where the permanent camp will be established, 15th; ice caves, 17th; lava caves, 18th; camp, 19th and 20th; to timber line, 21st; ascent, 22d; back to Trout Lake, 23d; camp, 24th; White Salmon, 25th; home in Portland, 26th.

A committee consisting of Messrs. O'Neill, Hawkins, and Capron, was appointed to draft circulars relative to the outing.

A resolution was adopted authorizing the admission to membership of all persons who shall pay a fee of \$5. By enrollment in the Mazama, all persons who desire to take advantage of the outing will secure all the privileges of the society, such as reduced railroad fares, etc. Any information regarding the outing may be obtained from the corresponding secretary, A. DRAW \$3 EVEN ON SUNDAY

HOW COUNTY COMMISSIONERS GET IN FULL "PER DIEM."

They Draw Pay for Every Day in the Month, Whether They Sit or Not.

At the last session of the Oregon Legislature a law was enacted fixing the compensation of the County Commissioners of this county at \$3 a day. The intention of the framers of the measure was that the amount specified should be paid each Commissioner for each day consumed in the transaction of county business. Section 4 of an act to provide for a separate board for the transaction of county business in the County of Multnomah says:

That said County Commissioners and their successors in office shall meet with the County Judge for the transaction of county business, at the call of the County Judge, and that said County Commissioners, and their successors in office, shall receive \$3 per diem in full for their services.

It has pleased County Commissioners

to derive from the short-credit system, but did not think it should be enforced until made general in all business by legislation.

RETAIL GROCERS' POW-WOW.

Time of Warring on the Wholesale Credit System Not Yet Fixed.

Retail grocers held a pow-wow Monday night at the corner of Second and Third streets. The discussion in prospect the grievances that will be theirs after the new short-credit regulations into effect next month. In a response to their request that the new system be deferred until it can be enacted into legislation, the wholesalers said that they did not see their way clear to accede.

The response of the wholesalers cited that the possibility of legislation was too remote for consideration; that they were no assurance that such legislation would pass the Legislature, the Governor or the courts; that the new system is required by modern business, and is in force in all large cities; that such capital is required to carry on the wholesale business, under the present arrangement; that the present time is the best wherein to start the new system, owing to the general prosperity; and that the retailers and everybody, in a few months, will find it highly to their advantage.

Meeting This Afternoon to Start the Plans for Further Canvassing—Duties of Committee.

Hon. H. W. Corbett, president of the Lewis and Clark Centennial, has selected the following persons to act as a committee of ways and means:

The purpose of the appointment of the committee at this time is to have a body to take charge of the details of soliciting and collecting subscriptions for the additional capital stock recently authorized by the Lewis and Clark stockholders. That such work falls within the duty of this standing committee of the board appears from the following section of the by-laws prescribing its duties:

The committee on ways and means shall consist of seven (7) members, and it shall be charged with the duty of raising funds necessary for the corporate purposes of the company, including the soliciting and collecting of subscriptions to the capital stock, and the selling of tickets of admission to the thing upon the rates at which concessions and privileges shall be disposed of, and all other matters relative to the collection of amounts due or to become due to the company, and shall have power, subject to the approval of the board or the executive committee, to establish and appoint agents and individuals for the collection of funds for account of the company, and to require such persons to give bonds for the faithful performance of their duty.

Chairman Fenton has set 4 o'clock this afternoon as the time for first meeting of this committee at 326 Washington street. The general sentiment of the board and of this committee is that the work of completing the stock subscriptions shall proceed at once, and it is expected that the committee will immediately frame plans and see that they are carried into effect.

Call for Republican
State Convention

A convention of the Republican party of the State of Oregon is hereby called to meet in Portland, Or., Wednesday, April 2, 1902, at 10 o'clock A. M., for the purpose of nominating candidates for state and district offices (except Representatives in Congress), and to transact such other business as may properly come before the convention. The convention will consist of 348 delegates, apportioned among the several counties of the state as follows, to-wit:

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
