POISONED HEAD ACHE POWDERS Cold-Blooded Murder in a Michigan

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., March 7 .- De velopments in the investigation into the death of Mrs. Ada Kiump, the young wife of William Kiump, of Lowell, point to one of the most cold-blooded murders Michiof the most cold-blooded murders Michigan has ever known. After a diligent inquiry into the circumstances of the case Sheriff Chapman took William Klump into custody and ledged him in jail here. The officers express the belief that the dendly powders sent through the mails were sub stituted for the harmless headache pow-ders which the envelopes had originally contained, and that they were sent to several physicians in the village for the purpose of throwing the blame upon the manufacturers of the headache remedy. and thus diverting suspicion from the sender of the poison.

The officers who have investigated the case state that Klump was infatuated with another woman, a widow, whom it is alleged he had agreed to marry before he met and won the love of the pretty 16-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Watson, of Lowell, Klump had been married twice. His first wife lives in Lowell, and it is alleged that the other woman was the direct cause of his separation from her also. The Sheriff and his deputies are trying to locate Hattle Whitfield. She at one time lived in this city, and it is said that Klump visited her home. Offi-cers went to the house of her parents in Vergennes Township today, but did not find her there, nor could they learn where

she had gone. Klump was interviewed at the jail to-night. He is about 25 years of age. He declares he is entirely innocent of the crime on which he is arrested.
