GAY LIFE OF TUESDAY COMMENCE.

The weather for Tuesday weeks has not been such as one would select for making a pleasure trip to the mountains, but there is such an amount of business being done in timber lands that the woods are full of timber cruisers, who do not mind being wet through and through day after day. One of these cruisers was seen buying an outfit of a pair of boots. The first requisite is a stout canvas hat, a sack or knapsack, fitted with stout leather straps to go over each shoulder. This sack is about two feet square and holds about everything a cruiser actually needs, and about all he can carry. It is the most important article of the outfit is a compass. It is not large but must be a good one, and is taken great care of. A few yards of canvas to make a little lean-to tent, and a pair of blankets, not too heavy, supply shelter and bedding. An ax and sheath to hold it are indispensable. A folding reflector or Dutch oven, about a foot square, serves for cooking bread. A nest of oval-shaped tin buckets answers for tea and coffee pots and for hot water boilers and for drinking cups, if necessary. A knife, fork and spoon, complete the list of culinary utensils. A small package of flour, a tin of baking powder, some bacon and beans, coffee, salt, and pepper form the list of food for a trip. All these things except the ax must be stowed in the knapsack, and with this on his back the cruiser tramps all day through the roughest country imaginable, where every bush or plant touched sheds a shower of Bull Run water, and he is soaked from morning to night. When evening comes on he builds a good fire and puts up his little lean-to tent as close to it as possible, and proceeds to make bread and cook his dinner, and with the aid of some strong, hot coffee and the fire to get warmed up so that he can go to sleep. Gay life—but the pay is good.

FOURTH STREET IMPROVEMENT COMING.

The improvement of Fourth street with a pavement of treated wood blocks is like Christmas—coming, but not come yet. The work has been so long delayed that the street is getting into an awful condition in many places. The Baggage Transfer Company, at the corner of Fourth and Stark, has abandoned the use of their Fourth street entrances on account of the dilapidated pavement in front, and has placed along the curb before this entrance one of the new pavement blocks, hauling theatrical scenery, on which is placed a sign bearing the following inscription very legibly painted: "Too cruel for horses to back in here, the Stark street entrance." The necessary preliminaries in the way of advertising, etc., required by law, must be about all complied with by this time, and the commencement of work on the new pavement may be looked for as soon as the weather settles. The contractors for the work say they have everything in readiness for pushing the work, which will be completed by treating the blocks are all in order, and a lot of the blocks have been cut, and treated. They will please everybody by starting the work at the earliest possible moment, as the public have waited for this improvement till patience has ceased to be a virtue.

BULL RUN WATER AND ALBINA.

The connections between the water mains of the city's system and the Albina water were made some time ago, and the people of Albina have since that time been supplied with Bull Run water, with the exception of a few residences in high places, who cannot be reached by the gravity system. As it has not been practicable, on account of the weather, to make the connections between the city mains and the pumping station, the Albina water, a high service system, consumers on this system are still being supplied with the same water they were using before the city bought the Albina plant. As the water is of fair quality, with the exception that it is not so soft as Bull Run water, and as it is known that the Bull Run water mains will be connected with the pump station and the gravity system as soon as the weather settles, there have been but few complaints in regard to the matter.

SUDDEN DEATH OF JOSEPH ATKINSON.

Joseph Atkinson, a well-known resident on a ranch along the Columbia Slough, died suddenly early yesterday morning, under instructions from his friends, his body was afterwards taken to Holman's undertaking parlors. Atkinson, "battered" with another man, and recently he had been sick with heart disease, liver complaint, and asthma, but his condition did not think that the sick man's end was near until yesterday morning, when Atkinson took a sudden turn for the worse. Dr. E. W. Roster was sent for, but in the meantime Atkinson had passed away. The coroner will inquire into the matter this morning.

ALL POSSIBLE WAS DONE.—The family of Mr. and Mrs. D. Miller desire to have it stated for their friends and acquaintances to be done was done for their 4-year-old boy who died Saturday. It was not discovered that little Nathan was sick until several hours before his death. Prompt action was taken to get a physician, but none could be reached by telephone. Finally Dr. Tilzer was found, but when he arrived at the residence the little fellow was past medical aid. The recent misfortune of the family in the loss of two children have excited much sympathy.

SMALLPOX PATIENT ISOLATED.—A man who said his name was James McKay, 40 years old, and that he had worked on a farm hand along the Columbia Slough, called at the police station yesterday to say that he was sick. He was at once placed outside the building, as the police were afraid that he might be suffering from smallpox. Dr. Stoen was sent for, and he considered the man's symptoms so serious that he ordered McKay's instant removal to the city hospital.

MAKE A FINE LANDSCAPE.

Levi W. Myers' Suggestion for the Lewis and Clark Fair.

PORTLAND, March 9.—(To the Editor.)—I offer my suggestion to the directors of the Lewis and Clark Centennial celebration. It seems to me the grounds should be located as early this Spring as possible. The celebration is not so long to prepare as it is to hold. It is one of the most attractive features of the celebration, and as it takes time to bring a landscape up to its highest point of excellence. It takes years to grow ornamental shrubbery and vines and hedges, and even roses require time. The opening of the celebration is only a little more than three years ahead, and all the time intervening is none too long to prepare the best results. It has been wisely decided not to strain a point to make this a showing of the industries of the whole world, nor is it to be a starter in the race for the most elaborate and expensive. These have been done and overdone at other world's fairs, and there is a surfeit of them. What is wanted here in 1906 is something of a different kind, something typical of this Coast and of its products and possibilities, and the landscape is the one available advantage, and can be made one of the most attractive features of the whole affair. The climate is so favorable in moisture and temperature, and growth so continuous the year round, that a landscape can be produced here that it is a starter in the race for the most elaborate and expensive. These have been done and overdone at other world's fairs, and there is a surfeit of them. What is wanted here in 1906 is something of a different kind, something typical of this Coast and of its products and possibilities, and the landscape is the one available advantage, and can be made one of the most attractive features of the whole affair. 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
