BOER ENVOYS LEAVE.

WASHINGTON, March 19.—Messrs. Wolmar and Weasels, the Boer envoys, will sail for France tomorrow morning on the steamship La Gascoigne. Mr. Wolmar sailed tonight, in the course of an interview.

"Since we have been in this country it has been said that our alliance with the Irish has hurt our cause. On the eve of our return we must say that statement and declare that the alliance has been profitable to us both on the battlefield and by the light which is being waged for us by the Irish members in the English House of Parliament. First we have to thank the Dutch, then the Irish and then the Germans. We know also that the people of the United States are with us heart and soul, and we believe that a few words of sympathy from the United States Senate and House of Representatives would go a great way in helping us with the nations of the Old World."
