

GEORGE M. ORTON RESIGNS

H. E. GURR IS ELECTED PRESIDENT OF FEDERATED TRADES.

Ex-President's Position on Legislative Ticket Causes Him to Withdraw From Labor Council.

At the regular weekly meeting of the Federated Trades Council, last night, George M. Orton tendered his resignation as president of that body and as delegate from the Printing Pressmen's Union. As a reason for resigning the presidency, Mr. Orton stated that he was a candidate for a political office, and that the constitution prohibited him, as a member of the council, from running for an elective office. The resignation was accepted and Vice-President H. E. Gurr was elected to succeed Mr. Orton. Vincent McCullough was elected to fill the position vacated by Mr. Gurr.

Mr. Orton was only recently elected to the presidency for the second time. He has lived in Portland for a number of years and has always been prominently identified with labor movements. The Republican County Convention nominated him as one of the Representatives from Multnomah County, and his resignation was due to his acceptance of the nomination. Rumors having been circulated that his resignation had been accepted for on account of his entrance into the campaign, members of the council said that no such request had been made. Unauthorized persons might have spoken about it, but the council had taken no such action. Mr. Orton's resignation was tendered without a hint from the council and was accepted in the frank and open spirit with which it was given.

A. A. Bailey, who, after his nomination for Representative, resigned the secretaryship of the council, read a printed report that the council had endorsed the candidacy of himself, Mr. Orton and J. S. Hutchinson. Mr. Bailey said the report was entirely false. It was well known that the council would not take any part in politics, and under its constitution its officers could not become candidates for office. Mr. Bailey also said that the rumor that he had been asked to resign the secretaryship on account of having accepted a political nomination was false. His resignation had been tendered voluntarily because under the constitution he thought it was his duty to offer it.

After the meeting several members said that the council was not inclined to accept Mr. Bailey's resignation. Its acceptance required a two-thirds vote. The vote was: For the resignation, 20; against, 20. Mr. Bailey's resignation as a delegate from the Typographical Union was, the members said, laid aside.

The matter of organizing a State Federation of Labor was brought up and the first Monday in May was selected as the date for holding a convention in Portland. George Y. Harry, of the Sheet Metalworkers' Union, was elected organizer, and his duty will be to visit the outside cities and effect organization of the various crafts.

The Kicking Game.
The return match of association football between the Portland and a strong eleven of sailors selected from the officers and crews of British ships now in the harbor, takes place this afternoon at 3:30 o'clock, on the grounds of the Bishop Scott Academy. There will be no charge for admission, and all interested are invited. Municipal Judge Cameron will play right fullback for the Portlanders. The sailors hope to win this time, and will have a stronger combination than they exhibited at last week's game.

Mining Companies Consolidate.

Old-Time Scottish Dominies.

London Chronicle.

The length, breadth, depth and thoroughness of the Scottish sermon of the 18th century were vividly portrayed by Dr. Watson, better known as Ian MacLaren, at the Royal Institution yesterday. A subject, as he remarked, was thoroughly thrashed out in those days. One text furnished a minister with eight ser-

mons; another spread his comments and explanations upon a passage of eight verses over a period of nine months, while a third commenced a course of addresses to his congregation on the Epistle of St. James in 1786 and a whole generation had passed away before it was completed in 1822. Even the endurance of Scottish congregations seems sometimes to have been unequal to these great trials and an order had to be issued that the people should not entertain their neigh-

bors with discourses while the minister was holding forth. It must have been easy to slip into herey in those days. The declaration of a stern Cameronian of the middle of the century, which has fortunately been preserved, indicates the ready pitfalls for the feet. "I leave my protest," said he, "against all sectarian errors, heresies and blasphemies, particularly against Arrianism, Erastianism, Socinianism, Quakerism, Deism, Bourgeoisism, Familism,

Sequitism, Anabaptism, Millenarianism, Pelagianism, Campbellianism, Whitfieldism, Latitudinarianism and Independency, and all other sects and sorts that maintain any error, heresy or blasphemy that is contrary to the word of God, particularly the toleration granted by the sectarian usurper, Oliver Cromwell, the anti-Christian toleration granted by the popish Duke of York and the present continued toleration granted by that wicked Jacobite, the pretended Queen Anne."
