HERE'S A CHANCE FOR BACHELORS - Mayor Howe yesterday received a letter from an Eastern publication in which he was at once deeply interested. VAGRANCY CASES IN MUNICIPAL COURT. - Vagrancy cases took up a part of Municipal Judge Cameron's time yesterday afternoon. In all there were seven on the transcript. He was found guilty and was held in the grand jury in the sum of \$500. Frank Kelly and J. E. Wright, who were arrested Thursday for stealing a pair of trousers from the store of I. Morris, were tried, and Wright was acquitted. Kelly, who was found to be the actual thief, was sentenced to six months in the county jail.

LETTER-BOX SMASHED BY HOODLUMS - The letter-box at the corner of Shaver street and Michigan avenue has been damaged, and Postmaster Crossman has had it brought to the office. The celluloid box placed on the front of the letter-box was smashed and mail collected from the box was scattered out and the hinge broken off the flap which closes the slot through which letters are inserted and the box scratched and battered. These injuries could not have been the result of accident, but have been wantonly inflicted by hoodlums. The box is not likely to be restored for the present, and if the hoodlums who are guilty of this offense can be found they will be taught that it is a serious thing to molest the Government's letter-boxes, as there is a penalty of \$500 fine or one year's imprisonment for tampering with letter-boxes or their locks. The Government does not contemplate putting up letter-boxes to be smashed by hoodlums, and in localities where the residents for some such deluge they are likely to go without the convenience of letter-boxes. BOX AT THIRD AND MORRISON - The work of excavating for the basement and foundations of the building to be erected at Third and Morrison by the Falling rate was commenced yesterday in earnest. Five teams were employed and 30 wagons with 10 men to load one set of wagons while the others were going to be unloaded. A team was also employed in plowing up the earth to be excavated and a donkey engine is stationed on Morrison street to haul the loaded wagons to the street. The shovellers, if they work fast enough, get a little leisure occasionally, but they must keep the wagons loaded so that the teams do not have to wait. The excavated earth is hauled across the Morrison-street bridge to make a fill at East Water and East Morrison. Each team hauls about 20 loads of two cubic yards each per day. There are 6000 yards of earth to be removed, so any mathematician, if he desires, can soon figure out how many loads there will be to haul altogether, and how long it will take.
