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VOTE THANKS TO BAILEY

Federated Trades Accept His Resignation as Delegate.

At the weekly meeting of the Federated Trades Council, last night, A. A. Bailey tendered his resignation as a delegate from the Multnomah Typographical Union. Mr. Bailey, in his fourth term as recording secretary of the Council, recently resigned his position, and his resignation was accepted by a small vote. At the same time he resigned as a delegate, but the Council refused to accept his resignation. Mr. Bailey stated that he was a candidate for a political office then, and he made the same statement last night, that he could not run for office and remain a delegate to the Council. His resignation was tendered to him in appreciation of his services as secretary.

George Y. Harry, who was appointed to organize a state federation of labor, reported that he had met with a great deal of encouragement in the Dalles and Pendleton. A committee was appointed to wait upon the different unions, and to ask

them to elect delegates to the federation and to contribute to the expenses of the convention.

It was reported that the Council will continue to assist the Walters' Alliance financially, and that developments are expected soon.

The delegates from the Upholsterers' and Carpet Mechanics' Unions were seated. The bartenders and the glaziers reported that they had formed organizations.

TILT IN MUNICIPAL COURT

Judge J. F. Caples and Superintendent Gardner Clash.

There was an acrimonious tilt Thursday in the Municipal Court between Judge J. F. Caples and Superintendent Gardner, of the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society, when the case of D. M. Litzel was called, charged with abducting Jennie Stratus, 15 years old, a ward of the society.

MILK IS HIGH ENOUGH.

Portland Consumers Entitled to the Very Best for What They Pay.

VANCOUVER, Wash., April 2.—(To the Editor.)—In The Oregonian of March 6 Mr. Bailey, the Dairy Commissioner, is said to be about to begin a crusade against ill-kept dairies. Why such crusade has not been made before, when Mr. Bailey took charge of his office, seems strange to me. As dairies are never inspected, and as the majority of the milk sold in the city is more or less watered, Portland evidently needs somebody to take the interests of the consumers in hand. Mr. Bailey thinks that milkmen ought to be paid 12 1/2 to 15 cents per quart. That would mean \$5 to \$7.50 per 100 pounds of milk! At present milkmen get on the average \$1 for pure 4 per cent milk in creameries and cheese factories. As a good cow gives 600 pounds of milk

a year, at \$6 or \$7.20 the 100 pounds she would earn \$360!

Of course, producing milk for cities and distributing it is more expensive than is producing milk for creameries; but supposing the expense twice as large, pure healthy, clean milk can be sold at very good profit for 6 to 7 cents per quart.

Milk producers are doing very well by selling their milk to condensed milk factories at \$1.25 per 100 pounds, or a little over 2 1/2 cents per quart. Their barns

and cows are inspected every month by the milk inspector of the factories.

Why should Portland not get pure milk by paying twice as much, say \$2.88 to \$3.36 per 100 pounds, or 6 to 7 cents per quart? At such prices there is money for the milk producers. How quick things would better, if the city had her own milk inspector.
