ONE PLACE THAT SHOULD BE CLEANED UP.—On the rear end of the lot at the northwest corner of Salmon and Second streets, across the street from the rear end of the Taylor street M. E. church, is the most dilapidated building and most disgraceful collection of decaying lumber, rubbish and filth to be found in any lot in the City of Portland. It has been there for years. Formerly there was a vacant space on the west side of this old shack, which even the Chinese would not occupy, and some time ago a lean-to shed was built in this space. This filthy den, until a short time ago, tenanted by a Chinese courtesan, but she was foully murdered about two weeks ago, and the place has been vacant and there has been a fire in it since. Just why the city authorities have not exercised their prerogative and discharged their duty by having this pestilence-breeding and disgusting mass declared a nuisance and ordered its removal is difficult to imagine. No one in the city would hesitate for a moment in declaring it a nuisance, and the worst kind of a nuisance, an offense and an eyesore to all who pass it, as many must in going to church or to the A. O. U. W. Hall. As near as can be ascertained, the lot in the front of which is a Chinese building, with what appears to be a saloon of some kind on the ground floor, has for years belonged to two parties—two-thirds to B. E. Bravinder, of Spokane, and one-third to Rebecca E. Bravinder, whose whereabouts are not known. Bravinder's interest was purchased by Dr. W. L. Wood, of this city, not long ago. He is said to be traveling in Arizona, or some other "health resort," for the benefit of his health, and he will do well to stay at least that far away from his property until it is cleaned up. In any well-regulated city, where officials were alert in the discharge of their duty, such a filthy, disgusting, disease-breeding plague spot would not be tolerated for a moment.

WHERE IS L. A. JACKSON?—The Oregonian has received a letter from L. A. Jackson, of Chico, Cal., asking for news of L. A. Jackson, who was formerly employed in Portland as a photographer. It was ascertained yesterday that Jackson left Portland two years ago in company with another photographer for Walla Walla. Since that time nothing further has been heard from him, and his parents feel the greatest anxiety about his disappearance. The young man is about 23 years old, has blue eyes, brown hair, is six feet tall, and of a slight build. Any news of his whereabouts will be gladly received by his father.

OLD WATER MAIN TAPPED.—Third-street pavement, on the west side of the street, near Stark, was broken open yesterday by employees of the water committee in order to make a connection with the old main there for running the new elevator in the McKay block. The main was laid over 20 years ago by the old McKay company, and is only about two feet below the surface. It was, therefore, impossible to use the new tapping machine with which such connections are made without turning the water off. The water, therefore, had to be turned off and the pipe cut, which was done at a late hour last night.

TWO BOYS RUN AWAY.—Two boys ran away from the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society of Oregon a few days ago. When last heard of they were on their way toward the Dalles. Their descriptions are as follows: Fred Hall, 14, very bright, thin and pale-faced; had on a brown coat, blue cap, striped overalls with bib, brown shoes, light shirt. James Rogers, aged 11, small for his age; had on a gray cap, checked shirt and blue overalls. MORE ABOUT RICHARDSON BUILDING.—Captain W. S. Powell, built in Judge Fraser's court, states that in 1853 he erected the frame building at the northeast corner of Third and Salmon streets which is being torn down to make room for T. M. Richardson's brick structure. Captain Powell says he had a contract from the Portland Mill Company, comprised of W. P. Abrams, John George and Bunnell, and was paid \$5 per day for his work. The first tenant of the building was a man named Markley, who was a carpenter.

REPAIRS FOR ENGINE-HOUSE NO. 2.—The house of Hose and Chemical Engine Company, No. 2, at First and Jefferson streets, is receiving much-needed repairs in the form of new joists and floor and new stalls for the horses. The old floor had become so decayed that there was grave danger of the horses breaking through every time they were taken out. The horses and apparatus have all been removed to a building near by, while the repairs are being made, so that there will be no interference with the service.

LINCOLN CONTRACT LET.—The Board of Public Works has awarded a contract for linoleum and carpeting for covering the main office of the City Auditor, his private office, two stables, a hallway and stenographers' room to H. C. Breeden & Co. The cost amounts to \$345.20. These rooms have needed some improvement in this line for some time and as they are nearly all to be covered with linoleum, it is expected that they will not need any more carpets for a long time.

EDITORIAL DELEGATION LEAVES.—A large delegation, consisting of delegates from Oregon, Washington and Alaska, left last night for Hot Springs, Ark., where they will attend the meeting of the National Editorial Association, to be held April 15 to 18. Both the Western Union and the Postal Telegraph companies have granted them the privilege of sending free messages over their wires, and the delegates will send in frequent reports.

TO BEGIN WORK ON FOURTH STREET.—It is now promised that work will be commenced on the improvement of Fourth street by the middle of next week, wind and weather permitting. Man proposes, but at this season the weather disposes. The contractors for the work, the Carboneum Wood-Preserving Company, has a plan for treating blocks fitted up at Jones' sawmill, and a large number of blocks have already been treated. As the worst places in the pavement of Fourth street are in the vicinity of Alder street, it is proposed to commence work there and pave the two blocks between Morrison and Washington streets for a starter. It is promised that these blocks will be paved with a swiftness that will surprise all beholders. The concrete foundation in the block is in good condition, except in a few places where holes have been worn in it, and these will, of course, be repaired. The contractors will lay a large number of barrels of asphalt on the sidewalk at the corner of Front and Morrison streets, which is to be used for flooding the pavement when it is laid, so as to fill up every crevice and make the whole impervious to water. The right of way of the Southern Pacific Company on Fourth street has been put in good order lately, and the new grooved six-inch rails required to be laid before the wood block

LOW FARES FOR SCHOOL CHILDREN.—The Portland Railway Company already has in effect a school children's rate nearly as low as that recently requested by the Portland Board of Trade. For more than four years it has been selling school children's tickets at the rate of 23 for 1, practically a cents each. These are good on school days up to about 5 P. M., when the cars begin to be crowded with other travel. This affords ample opportunity for children to go to and return from school on the low-rate tickets. Superintendent Fuller says this rate is down to the actual cost of carrying passengers on the street-car of Portland, and the parents of school children appear to be satisfied with it.

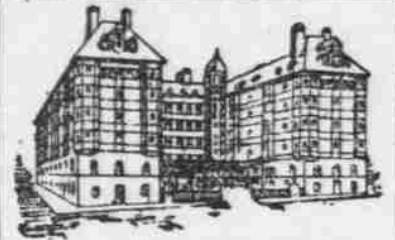
