

MILES HAS NO GO

Will Be Forced to Retire at an Early Date.

ROOT HAS HAD ENOUGH OF HIM

The Secretary, in Addition to the Burden of the Department, Has to Meet the General's Opposition.

WASHINGTON, April 13.—The issues are fairly joined between the Lieutenant-General and the Secretary of War. The troubles which began long ago under the Cleveland Administration have finally reached a stage that a compulsory retirement of General Miles at an early date is an open secret, and is not denied at the White House.

In explanation of President Roosevelt's position, one of his close friends has unquestionably speaks by authority, said: "The question is not a personal one between General Miles and Secretary Root. At present Secretary Root has on his shoulders the burden of the entire other member of the Administration. No man less strong could carry it all; and now, at the very time when he requires the most loyal and able assistance, a general who wishes well to the Army and the Nation, he has to spend much of his strength in meeting the opposition of the commanding General. If General Miles is retired, it will be simply because, after a patient trial, President Roosevelt feels that on the highest ethical grounds his retention would work grave and lasting injury to the country."

"If he should go out before General Brooke is retired, General Brooke, who is General Miles' senior, both in service and in age, and who did gallant and distinguished work in the Civil War, would undoubtedly be put in his place as Lieutenant-General, as it is known that the Administration has been very desirous of recognizing General Brooke's long and able service. General Brooke, during the Civil War, rendered equally meritorious service with General Miles. General Brooke was the first to obtain a promotion to a general's rank in the Army. He retained his advantage, ending the war as General Miles' senior. After peace came General Miles was promoted over General Brooke's head."

THE WARSAW CONSULAR.

Dr. Campbell Gives Up the Fight and Comes Home.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 13.—Consul Campbell has gone to the United States, declaring that he intends to place his resignation in the hands of Secretary of State. This action is the result of long and painful misunderstandings, which have lasted six months.

On the death of Joseph Rawitz, for many years American agent at Warsaw, his nephew Vladislav Rawitz, the surviving brother of the Rawitz banking-house, signified his desire to succeed to the Warsaw Consularship. W. R. Holloway, the United States Consul at St. Petersburg, with the assent of Charlemagne Tower, the American Ambassador to Russia, recommended that Vladislav Rawitz be given this post, saying that the office had been excellently managed by Joseph Rawitz, and that the Rawitzes enjoyed an excellent reputation.

Jeremiah Curtin, ex-Secretary of the United States Embassy here, caused the first complication by requesting that Herr Wolff, the publisher of Sienkiewicz's works, be appointed Consul at Warsaw. H. H. D. Pierce, the Third Assistant Secretary of State, wrote Mr. Holloway and asked him if he insisted on his recommendation. Mr. Holloway did insist upon the appointment of Vladislav Rawitz, and Mr. Tower undertook discreetly to sound the Russian Government regarding the acceptability of that gentleman. This inquiry, by some mistake, caused the issuance of an executor for Rawitz. As the Consular position at Warsaw is highly esteemed, Rawitz immediately received congratulatory visits from the local officers and the other consuls. At this stage of the proceedings Rawitz became greatly embarrassed, as etiquette required that his first visit be paid by Governor-General, and this was impossible without American papers.

William M. Osborn, United States Consul-General at London, intervened by recommending the appointment of Mr. Campbell, an American citizen in London, who formerly lived in Warsaw. Rawitz became very much perturbed by newspaper statements that Campbell had been appointed on the ground of his American citizenship. He made energetic but ineffectual attempts to get Mr. Holloway and Mr. Tower further to support his cause.

In the meantime a storm had gathered over Campbell's head. The Consul clerk at Warsaw, voicing the alleged widespread objection of the inhabitants of the city to the American, wrote General Holloway that Campbell could not anticipate an executor, as his real name was Finkelstein and he was born in Lemberg. The Consul clerk further charged that Campbell had given different birthplaces in his applications for passport, and that local society was against him because of his elopement with an heiress of Warsaw. Campbell came here and ridiculed these charges, asserting that he was a Christian, that he was born in Montreal, Canada; that he was a naturalized American citizen, and formerly a dentist in Chicago. He declared that his mother-in-law was responsible for the charges against him, which she brought about the desire of withholding 100,000 rubles due his wife from the paternal estate. Consul-General Holloway was affixed to this matter, when he was informed that Campbell had abandoned the fight.

OUR TRADE WITH CANADA.

Larger Than Our Commerce With the Whole of South America.

WASHINGTON, April 13.—The United States enjoys more of Canadian commerce than the rest of the world put together. Attention is directed to this fact in this portion of "Commercial Relations of 1901" (now in press), which deals with United States trade with Canada, an extract of which was given out for publication by Mr. Emery, Chief of the Bureau of Foreign Commerce, today. It is pointed out that so closely allied are trade conditions in this country and Canada that prosperity or depression in the United States immediately finds echo in the trade of our Northern neighbor. In 1877, Great Britain lost to us her lead in the matter of goods sent into the Dominion, and from that year forward, with but a slight interval, this country has steadily lengthened the gap. It is not so widely recognized as it should be, says the report, that Canada is the best customer we have, excepting only Great Britain and Germany. Consul-General Bittinger, at Montreal, in a report on the subject, says: "The United States does more business with Canada than with the whole of South America; as much as with Central America, Mexico and the West Indies together, and nearly as much as with Africa, Asia and Oceania. Our present tariff policy toward Canada causes the building up of great manufacturing interests to compete with our own. If we seek trade in other countries, we must not deny them the opportunity to sell some of their products to us. Canada wants to send to the United States her lumber, wool, pulp, hay, barley and minerals. The United States consumes more lumber and paper than any other nation in the world, and she should be glad to admit lumber and wool pulp free. If the United States would take off the duty on Canadian coal (which could profitably be sold only to a very limited extent along our Eastern Coast) our coal would be admitted into Canada free and our sales of coal in the Dominion would be double what they are at present." Canada's total importations for consumption in the last fiscal year amounted to \$11,238,000. Imports from the United States reached the splendid figure of \$11,465,000, an increase of some \$60,000 over the preceding year.

MEXICAN KIDNAPERS.

Stole Boys and Shipped Them to Yucatan to Work on Plantations.

MEXICO CITY, Mexico, April 13.—The police of this city have broken up a gang of kidnapers who have been enticing young boys to a house in this city, where they were kept until they were shipped to Yucatan to work on the Henequen plantations. Complaints have been coming into police headquarters of missing boys. The police, on following up clues, found a house on the outskirts of the city where the boys were enticed. They were kept under guard day and night and insufficiently fed and smid foul surroundings. The boys were then shipped to Yucatan, where they were sold to work on the Henequen plantations. Subsequently the guards confessed that they were employed by iglesias to entrap boys and confine them in the house until a convenient opportunity arose for taking them to Yucatan. Iglesias is still at large.

SCHUR FAMILY RELEASED.

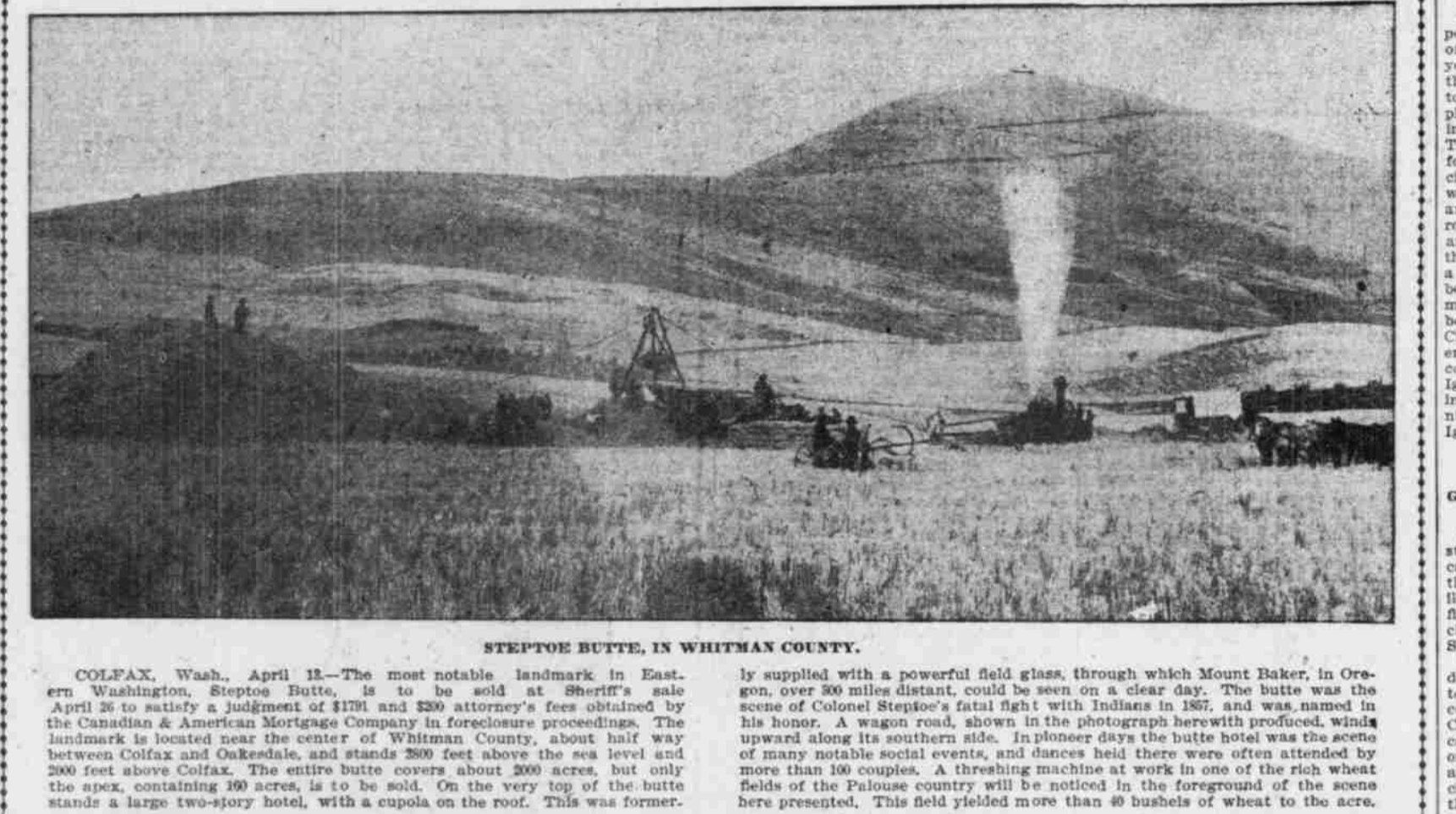
Galleians Were Accused of Murdering One of Their Number.

NEW YORK, April 13.—Dr. M. Neustader, of this city, today received a cablegram from Vienna giving notice of the release from prison of the Schur family, 10 members of which have been confined near there for some time, on the charge of having murdered Schur. The story of the charge, as told by the doctor, is that the young man supposed to have been murdered, today received a Christian convert and to marry a Christian girl, notwithstanding that he came from a well-known Jewish family of Domrow, Galicia. His parents, to avoid the consequences of the inevitable change of faith, sent him to a brother in this country, and after his disappearance were accused by the Christian peasants of the neighborhood of having murdered him. They were arrested and taken to jail in chains. News of this reached the brother here, and a committee was selected to arrange to send the young man back in order to prove his innocence. The committee, of which the doctor was chairman, raised enough money to carry out its purpose, and announces that young Schur has already left this country in care of an American.

FAMOUS WASHINGTON LANDMARK TO BE SOLD BY SHERIFF



STEPPIEN BUTTE, IN WHITMAN COUNTY.

COLEFAX, Wash., April 13.—The most notable landmark in Eastern Washington, Stepien Butte, is to be sold to Sheriff's sale April 26 to satisfy a judgment of \$170 and \$30 attorney's fees obtained by the Canadian American Mortgage Company in foreclosure proceedings. The landmark is located near the center of Whitman County, about half way between Colfax and Oakesdale, and stands 300 feet above the sea level and 200 feet above Colfax. The entire butte covers about 200 acres, but only the apex, containing 60 acres, is to be sold. On the very top of the butte stands a large two-story hotel, with a cupola on the roof. This was former-

ly supplied with a powerful field glass, through which Mount Baker in Oregon over 300 miles distant, could be seen on a clear day. The butte was the scene of Colonel Stepien's fatal fight with Indians in 1857, and was named in his honor. A wagon road, shown in the photograph here with produced, winds upward along its southern side. In pioneer days the butte hotel was the scene of many notable social events, and dances held there were often attended by more than 100 people. A threshing machine at work in one of the rich wheat fields of the Palouse country will be noticed in the foreground of the scene here presented. This field yielded more than 40 bushels of wheat to the acre.

for amending the schedules of the Dingley tariff law. It is known in advance that all such amendments will be held to be not germane to the bill, whose title provides for reciprocity with Cuba, and that only amendments raising or lowering the amount of the proposed concession will be held to be in order. Appeals will be taken from the rulings of the chair on the general tariff amendments, but it is certain that with possibly one exception the appeals will be unsuccessful. That exception may be the amendment to take the differential off refined sugar. It is admitted on both sides of the chamber that the real fight will come on that amendment.

A number of Republicans who are opposing the bill have announced that they will vote to curtail the chair on that proposition, and the Democrats expect to be able to cast a solid vote for it. The weakness of the position of the friends of this proposition is that the test will not come directly on the amendment, but on the ruling of the chair. If a motion to recommit with instruction to report back the bill to the committee is held, it will be held not to be in order, under the general theory of parliamentary law that the House cannot instruct the committee to do what itself cannot do. The Republican side of the chamber is expected to vote on the motion to go into committee of the whole, in the neighborhood of 40. Added to the Democratic vote, this would give the bill a majority of 10. But the Republican leaders profess confidence in their belief that not enough of the Republican recalcitrants will vote to the length of voting to curtail the chair to make with the Democrats a majority of 10. The Democrats themselves will hesitate to adopt this method of getting a vote on a proposition, which they contend is plainly not germane. If the danger involved in the amendment to abolish the differential is passed, the bill will have plain sailing on the floor, and a majority of the Democrats will vote for it.

GENERALS BEING CHANGED

Revolutionists Retreating into the Interior.

WILLEMSTAD, Island of Curacao, April 13.—President Castro, of Venezuela, is making continual changes among the Generals, whom he sends out to conduct the campaign against the revolutionists. General Esado, who was deserted by his troops and routed by the enemy near Carupano, is in disgrace. General Escalante, ex-Governor of Curacao, who has recently been in command of the government forces at Carupano, is returning to Curacao. He will be replaced by General Castillo. Castillo left Caracas yesterday for Carupano with two guns and 60 men, to reinforce the 1200 government soldiers already there. The revolutionists under Monagas are retreating in the direction of Clarines, thus obliging the government troops to enter the interior of the country. There is no change in the situation at Barcelona, Carupano and Cumana, and the expected engagements at these places have not yet occurred.

Restoration of Tien Tsin

Conditions Laid Down by the Allied Commanders.

LONDON, April 13.—The Pekin correspondent of the Times says that at a meeting of the allied commanders held in Tien Tsin Saturday it was unanimously resolved to maintain the provisional government of Tien Tsin until the forts are destroyed, or until July 1, and then only to restore the administration of the city to China on the acceptance by her of certain conditions guaranteeing international interests, such as promising not to fortify, not to rebuild the forts, etc.
