REPUBLICAN RESOLUTIONS.

Adopted by Harney County Delegates in Convention Assembled.

DURNS, Or., April 17.—The following resolutions were adopted by the Republican Harney County, in convention assembled, at this place:

To the Republican party of Harney County, in convention assembled:

We, your committee on platform and resolutions, beg leave to submit the following report:

We reaffirm our loyalty to the principles enunciated in the platform of the Republican National Convention of the year 1900.

We endorse the policy of expansion, in territory as well as in commerce, and approve of the holding of all American possessions, extending to the farthest corners of the globe, as a national and economic asset.

We are opposed to the enactment of a law providing for the leasing of National lands, in any form whatever, and denounce all such efforts as being seriously detrimental to the future settlement, growth and development of the country.

That we, as citizens of the great grazing area of Eastern Oregon, wish by this to convey to our Representative in Congress, Hon. M. A. Mowry, our appreciation of the good work done by him against the leasing of the public ranges; that we further wish to extend to him our thanks for his efforts for the securing of National aid for the reclamation of our great desert wastes; that the instructions of our County Central Committee to the delegates elected by them to the Congressional Convention, held in Portland, Oregon, were faithfully followed; that we are in favor of a just and economical administration of the affairs of our county.
