An unofficial meeting of the board was held today and the matter discussed. Chapman declared he could not get assistance from the office force at the County Jail, and expressed a desire when employing an expert to dispense with any help from the office, and have the work done entirely by an outside party. The matter will be taken up at the 23rd meeting of the board, and an expert employed. There are so many rumors of irregularities that the board declares it will go to the bottom of all charges. Violated Revenue Laws. ABERDEEN, Wash., April 22.—J. D. Rubenstein, of this city, and Guyby, of Colfax, each fined \$50 yesterday by Deputy Collector of Internal Revenue Max Mettscham, for violation of the revenue laws. BIDS ON CITY LIGHTING PLANT. Vancouver Postpones Action on the Matter Until Next Monday. VANCOUVER, Wash., April 22.—At the meeting of the City Council last night bids were received for the purchase of the city electric light plant. Action in the matter was postponed until next Monday evening. Two bids were submitted. J. N. Gray, president of the Portland, Vancouver and Yakima Railway Company, offered \$11,000 for the plant, and agreed to furnish 50 or more 100-candle power street arc lights during the period of 25 years, the term of franchise proposed to be granted by the city, at the rate of \$4.75 each, and to furnish free to the city some 25-candle power street arc lights for each arc light used. J. R. Harvey, the present lessee of the plant, offered to pay the city \$10,000 for the plant, and asked for an exclusive franchise for 19 years. He offered to furnish 50 or more arc lights for streets of 100-candle power, at the rate of \$2 per year, and 100 incandescent lights free to the city, provided 25 arc lights be put in the new plant. He also offered to be granted one year's time in which to vacate the premises now leased.

Brakeman Meets Death at Work. PASADENA, Wash., April 22.—Watson McDowell, freight brakeman on the Northern Pacific, fell under a moving train here today, and both of his legs and one arm were severed. He was placed in the hospital, and started to the hospital at Spokane, but died before Spangle was reached. McDowell was on the ladder on a box car when the screws holding the ladder gave way, and he was thrown under the train. He left a widow, but no children. His parents and a sister live in Oakesdale, where the body was taken. McDowell was 27 years old, and had been raised near Oakesdale.

Writ of Habeas Corpus Denied. Judge A. L. Miller yesterday denied the application for a writ of habeas corpus in the case of Jeff Keyser, the Vancouver-Amboy mail carrier, who was last week sent to jail by a Justice of the Peace to serve out a fine of \$25 and \$30 costs. The ground upon which the writ was applied for was that the Justice exceeded his authority in assessing a fine, which, with the costs, would require a man to spend more than 23 days in jail. The court took the ground that a writ of habeas corpus would not apply until the limit provided by statute had been served.

Prosecuting Attorney in Trouble. SPOKANE, Wash., April 22.—A special from Colville, Wash., to the Chronicle states that the grand jury of Stevens County has returned two indictments against J. E. M. Bailey, Prosecuting Attorney of the county, charging him with perjury and illegal collection of fees. It is charged that Bailey used a railroad pass to get to Colville, and that he charged them to the county, then sold or gave them away. It is also charged that he collected \$5 in excess of lawful fees in a criminal case and pocketed the money.

ON HER WAY TO THE ARCTIC. Bear Will Serve Government on Many Missions. SEATTLE, Wash., April 22.—The United States revenue cutter Bear arrived in port this morning from San Francisco on her voyage to Arlie waters, where she will serve the Government on many missions until late next Fall. The Bear will first carry a special Government agent to inspect educational conditions among the Indians, and look after the affairs generally of the natives in Alaska. The cutter will then go to Fox Islands, where a large tract has been leased by private individuals for the industry of propagating blue foxes for their pelts. After an inspection is made of the islands, the vessel will make toward the Siberian coast, there to secure a herd of 400 reindeer. These will be taken to St. Lawrence Island to serve as food and clothing for the natives there during the bitter winters. After landing the reindeer Captain Tuttle will wait for waters in the neighborhood of Point Barrow, to aid the whaling fleet if necessary. When the last boats are leaving
