# NEW YORK STOCK MARKET.

Stiffening of Prices. NEW YORK, April 24.—The important in-Suonce of the grain crop prospect upon the stock market was again demonstrated today. Tendency of Prices Is Upward, but Business Is Not Large. CLEVELAND, April 24.—The Iron Trade Re-

view, commenting on market conditions this week, says:

The tendency of prices is upward, but the volume of business done at the higher figures is not sufficient to give them great significance. In pig iron, current business is almost entirely in foundry grades, and while it is probable that one-fifth to one-fourth of the foundry iron

to be needed this year is yet to be bought, there is none of the excitement that accompanied the heavy buying in February. It is stated this week that the agreement to maintain a \$12 basis on No. 2 foundry is now ineffective, and that when the furnaces party to it resume selling it will be at figures to be determined by each company for itself. prices, generally \$156;15 50 at Birmingham for No. 2, while remaining out of the Central Western market. Meantime, producers and consumers are having trouble in plenty to maintain any regularity in the delivery of fron to foundries. Furnaces are quite behind on their contracts, and current business is largely from disappointed foundrymen, who are paying fancy prices to keep running.
