GEARY BILL AGAIN

Chinese Exclusion Bill Reported From Conference.

PASSES SENATE AND HOUSE

Measure Now Goes to the President for His Approval, Which Is Assured—Provision for Island Territory.

The Geary exclusion law is extended without any limitation as to time. Operation of the law in the Philippines is placed in the hands of the commission, and is to be extended, as far as applicable, to all American island territory.

WASHINGTON, April 28.—The conference on the Chinese exclusion bill reached a complete agreement on the bill today. Their report was submitted to the Senate and House this afternoon, and in each instance adopted without debate. The bill now goes to the President for his approval, which is assured by the firm stand he has taken for the measure.

The bill strikes out that portion of the Senate bill limiting the extension of all existing laws to the life of the present treaty, and re-enacts them so far as is not inconsistent with the treaty obligations until otherwise provided by law, and extends the laws to our island territory so far as applicable. It allows Chinese to enter for expatriation purposes and retains the provision regarding certification in the Philippines.

Senator Platt, of Connecticut, a member of the conference committee, by way of explanation in the Senate stated that no definite limitation should be placed upon the operation of the Geary law, as re-enacted, but that it should remain in force until otherwise provided by law. He explained that the operation of the law in the Philippines, including a registration of the Chinese in the islands, had been placed in the hands of the Philippine Commission, but the commission would have no authority to admit Chinese to the islands.

PUGET SOUND PARES BEST OF ALL

Navy-Yard Gets Largest Appropriation of Any in Country.

WASHINGTON, April 28.—The Puget Sound navy-yard fared better than any other navy-yard in the United States in the appropriations that are made in the naval bill reported to the House today. The yard got everything that was asked for it.

Representative Dayton, ranking Republican member of the committee, said today that the committee has been thoroughly convinced that one of the finest navy-yards in the world can be built economically at Bremerton. AMBUSHED BY FILIPINOS

Five Men of Constabulary Attacked and One Killed.

MANILA, April 28.—Five men of the constabulary have been ambushed at San Juan del Monte, near Manila. One of the party was killed and one injured. The Filipino band consisted of 30 Ladrones, well armed, most of them carrying Mauser rifles. A force of constabulary is scouring the neighborhood for the bandits.

WALLER UPHOLDS SMITH.

Severe Orders Necessary, or Samar Would Not Be Pacified Yet.

MANILA, April 28.—The trial by court-martial of General Jacob H. Smith, on the charge of conduct prejudicial to good order and discipline, was resumed here today. Major Littleton W. T. Waller, of the Marine Corps, testified to receiving from General Smith the orders to "kill and burn," and render Samar a howling wilderness," previously referred to in these dispatches. The natives of Samar, said Major Waller, were more treacherous and implacable than the tribesmen of the Soudan. Without General Smith's drastic measures the war there would not have ended yet. General Smith never intended killing women or children.

Corporal Fritchard, of the Ninth Infantry, who took part in the fight at Gandara, testified that he saw boys of 12 years of age fighting and slaying with bolos.

Under 15 years, one armed with a bolo, and the other with a dagger. Private Nicklo, of the Ninth Infantry, explained the dangers and difficulties of service in the island of Samar. Private Nanjot, of the Tenth Cavalry, told how Americans (native friendly to the Americans) were butchered there in cold blood.

Sergeant Brumby, of the Ninth Infantry, a survivor of the Balanigta massacre, described that disaster, including the mutilation of the American dead by the Samar natives.

On Way to Alcatraz for Life. ST. LOUIS, April 28.—Ernest Wilde, a British subject, occupies a cell in the guard house at Jefferson Barracks, awaiting transportation to the Federal prison on Alcatraz Island, in California Bay, to serve a 30-year sentence for treason to the United States. If he had not falsely sworn he was a citizen of the United States he could not have found his way into present predicament, for he would not have been accepted as a recruit for the United States Army in St. Louis, December 5, 1899, and shipped to the Philippines.

Wilde had been in active service on Luzon Island only about one month when he disappeared from the camp of Company B, of the Twelfth Infantry, at Paniquit, 20 miles from Manila. For 20 days he remained absent. Then he turned up in Tarlac and surrendered. He said he had been captured by the insurgents, and with much difficulty had escaped. With him was a soldier named Kenney, from the Fourth Cavalry, who told the same story. Instead of taking Wilde's word and permitting him to join his command, the commanding officer at Tarlac ordered him before a general court-martial, charging him with desertion and specifying that he had quit camp to join and fight with the Philippine insurgents. On this charge and specification Wilde was convicted.

Samar Insurrection Ends.

MANILA, April 28.—The surrender of the insurgents of the island of Samar, headed by General Guevarra, who succeeded General Lukban in that island, has been officially effected, though some Southern ports are yet to be heard from. It is believed, however, that the insurrection in Samar is ended.

CUMMINGS IS WORSE.

Double Pneumonia Develops, but His Physicians Are Still Hopeful.

BALTIMORE, April 28.—The seriousness of the condition of Congressman Cummings of New York, who is a patient at the Church Home and Infirmary in this city, was increased today by the development of double pneumonia. Mr. Cummings is slightly delirious at times, but is still able to take nourishment and rests well. The attending physicians have by no means lost hope of his recovery. The latest complication, however, has given his illness a very serious aspect.

ARCHBISHOP CORRIGAN IMPROVES.

Physicians Report That Pneumonia Is Thoroughly Broken.

NEW YORK, April 28.—The condition of Archbishop Corrigan has greatly improved, and he is expected to be discharged today. His physicians report that the pneumonia is thoroughly broken, and the only danger now lies in the patient's weakened condition, owing to his long and severe illness. His condition tonight, when Dr. Leyds left the archbishop's residence, was so far improved that it was considered unnecessary to issue the customary nightly bulletin.

Queen Wilhelmina Improving.

THE HAGUE, April 28.—The bulletin posted at Court Leo this morning announced that Queen Wilhelmina passed a quiet night; that her mornings were now feverless, and that her evening temperature was decreasing. Resident of Castle Loos say the Queen has so far improved in health as to be able to leave her bed today for a few moments, and that the Queen's mother is quite satisfied with the progress made.

Rev. Joseph Parker Seriously Ill.

LONDON, April 28.—The Rev. Joseph Parker, minister of the City Temple, is seriously ill.

PASSENGER STEAMER LOST

Three Members of Crew Washed From Boat and Drowned.

SANDUSKY, O., April 28.—The fishing steamer *Louise*, which arrived here yesterday, brought the survivors and the first details of the wreck of the passenger steamer *Gribbe*, of Cleveland, which went to pieces on Point Pelee Saturday. Three of the crew were drowned. Their names are:

LEVI FULLER, sailor, Port Hope, Mich.

COLLEGE BEN DIXON, sailor, Port Hope, Mich.

WILLIAM ROACH, mate, Cleveland. Those who saved themselves were Captain Thomas Wilson, Fred Campbell and William Barber, of Cleveland.

Six miles from Detroit a squall took away the vessel's canvas. The drowned men were washed from the boat by the heavy seas, and the survivors had a perilous experience before they reached shore.

GROSS BREACH OF FAITH

McCrea on Insurgents' Tactics at Surrender of Bocas del Toro.

WASHINGTON, April 28.—The Navy Department has received a report from Commander McCrea, of the *Maclachlan*, concerning the events preceding the surrender of Bocas del Toro to the insurgent forces and the capture by the Colombian Government troops. It makes no mention of the reported killing by the insurgents of an American on one of the United Fruit company's launches. The story makes it appear that in using the fruit company's launches to attack Bocas del Toro the insurgent commander was guilty of a gross breach of faith, as he had expressly agreed, if the launch were allowed to remain with him until he had placed his men on the mainland, that he would not use them to attack the enemy.

TO BREAK BEEF TRUST.

Attorney-General of Missouri Begins a Proceeding.

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., April 28.—Attorney-General Crow began a proceeding in the Supreme Court today which is intended to break up the so-called beef trust. He applied for, and received, a writ of injunction from the Supreme Court, an order directing various officials of the big packing companies doing business in Missouri to appear before the Supreme Court on May 6, and answer such interrogations as may be asked touching the question of a combination, and the regulation of the prices of dressed beef and meats in Missouri. This proceeding is brought under the law of 1899, which is the same as the New York State law held constitutional.

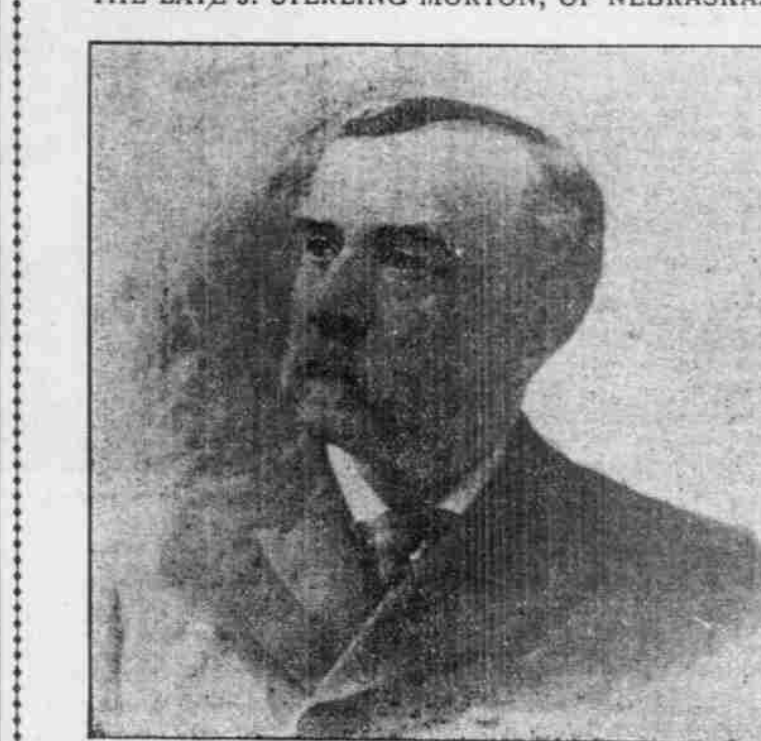
Seven People Killed and Forty Injured.

EX-SECRETARY OF AGRICULTURE, WHO DIED SUNDAY.

The accompanying photograph of the late J. Sterling Morton, lent to the Oregonian through the courtesy of W. G. Steel, was taken while he held office in ex-President Cleveland's Cabinet as Secretary of Agriculture. Mr. Morton was born April 22, 1831, in New York. He was educated in Michigan and in 1856 took up his residence in Nebraska. He was a practical farmer, as well as a forceful speaker and writer. He was the first editor and founder of the *Nebraska City News*. He was at one time acting Governor of Nebraska, served in the State Legislature, was appointed Secretary of Agriculture by President Cleveland in 1893. He was the founder of Arbor day, president of the Nebraska Horticultural Society, and president of the American Forestry Association.

Many Sheep Killed by Storm.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., April 28.—Reports received here from various sections of the state indicate that the storm of last week killed 12,000 or 13,000 sheep, the losses running from 2 to 30 per cent. The heaviest loss occurred in Natrona County, where shearing had commenced early. The loss there is estimated at 2000 head.

SCHLEY AT MEMPHIS.

Magnificent Silver Service Presented to the Admiral.

MEMPHIS, April 28.—The first day of the visit to Memphis of Admiral and Mrs. Schley opened with lowering clouds and occasional showers. The parade was postponed until tomorrow. After luncheon the Admiral and his wife were driven to the Auditorium, where a magnificent silver service was presented to Admiral Schley on behalf of 18,000 subscribers to a fund for that purpose. The movement to present a testimonial to the Admiral was begun by the Commercial Appeal about a year ago, and contributions were made in small amounts from Arkansas, Alabama, Tennessee and Mississippi. Ex-Senator Thomas B. Turley made the presentation speech.

At 9 o'clock tonight a banquet of 300 covers was spread in the Gayoso Hotel in honor of Admiral Schley. Admiral Schley and Governor McMillan spoke. Mrs. Schley was entertained tonight by the Daughters of the American Revolution.

IN FAVOR OF PEACE.

Botha, With Other Commanders, Meets With Two Commanders.

LONDON, April 28.—Wiring from Pretoria under the date of Sunday, April 27, the correspondent of the Daily Telegraph says General Botha, with other Boer leaders, attended the meetings of the Utrecht and Vryheid commandos last week, and that strong opinions in favor of peace were expressed. The tactician of the Utrecht and Vryheid districts, concludes the correspondent, will expire tomorrow. The War Office has made public the following dispatch from Lord Kitchener at Pretoria:

"Since April 21, 25 Boers have been killed, 78 have been taken prisoners, and

25 have surrendered. There has been desultory fighting in various sections of the Transvaal and the Orange River Colony. The garrison at O'okiep (Cape Colony) successfully held out until it was relieved by the columns."

VICTORY FOR SHAFER.

Amalgamated Association Convention Adopts Wage Scale.

WHEELING, W. Va., April 28.—The wage committee presented its report to the Amalgamated Association convention this morning. During the discussion of this report the opponents of the new policy of signing scales expressed their disapproval of the officers' action. There seems to be little doubt, however, but that the report will be endorsed by the convention. It will be shown the scales were signed by the regularly authorized committees, and that the mill owners were fully informed that the ratification of the scales depended on action by the convention. One reason for the advance signing of the scales is that it removes possibility of strife between the Union and the manufacturers for at least another year.

BOLD, BAD ROBBERS

Break Into Village Bank and Steal Money.

CASHIER ABSENT AT DINNER

They Thought They Had to Hurry, and Therefore Missed a Large Amount of Cash—Loss About \$1500—Two Arrested.

There were evidently three robbers, two of whom stood guard. Only the inner door of the vault was closed, and this was easily broken open. The loss to the bank is about \$1500. Although the act was committed in broad daylight, and the front of the vault was in plain view of the street, the robbery was not discovered until the cashier returned from his dinner.

BROWNSVILLE, April 28.—The vault of the Bank of Brownsville was robbed today at 12:30 o'clock, while Cashier J. H. Glass was at dinner. The exact amount stolen can not be given at this hour because of the fact that the books have not been posted. President W. P. Elmore places the amount at about \$1500.

The robbery was a very daring piece of work, done apparently by at least three persons. Indications are that one robber stood guard at the front of the building and one at the rear, while the third entered through a rear window and door and gained access to the vault. As was the usual custom, Cashier Glass did not close the vault proper, which is burglar-proof, and closed and locked only the inner door. The robber attacked these doors with a small piece of steel. He easily broke the lock and gained access to the money. In his hurry the robber failed to get a large amount of cash. He took only what he could grab and fled. It was nearly 1 o'clock when Mr. Glass opened the bank and made the discovery of the robbery. The police were immediately notified, and soon had taken into custody W. O. Tyler and Thomas Venum. The bank officials later swore out warrants against them, and they are held for examination before the District Attorney tomorrow.

The two men under arrest are well known here, and have spent nearly all their lives in Brownsville. The police have several other characters under surveillance, who are believed to have assisted in the robbery.

The streets near the bank were almost deserted at the time of the robbery. Several people were in adjacent places of business, but heard no disturbance. The daring robbery was not generally known for some time. The space in front of the vault was practically in plain view of the streets.

ANOTHER REVOLUTION.

Santo Domingo Again Has Trouble Within Its Border.

PORT AU PRINCE, Hayti, April 28.—Another revolution has broken out in Santo Domingo. Telegraphic communication between that republic and Hayti is entirely suspended.

Advices received here from Porto Plata, a seaport on the north coast of Santo Domingo, say a Santiago is the center of the revolutionary disturbance, which is directed by Vice-President Horacio Vasquez. It is believed here that the revolution will probably be suppressed by the Dominican government forces.

On Trial for Forgery Rhodes' Name.

CAPE TOWN, April 28.—The trial of Prince Rupert Rhodes, on the charge of forgery in connection with notes purported to have been endorsed by the late Cecil Rhodes, but which he repudiated, began in the Supreme Court here today before the Chief Justice. The Princess pleaded not guilty. There are 24 counts in the indictment. Though Rhodes and Schultz, the two principal witnesses, have died since the case was first filed, their evidence in the form of affidavits denouncing the signatures on the notes as forgeries, holds good.
