

BUSHMAN IS OUT

Labor Man Will Not Run on Simon Ticket.

WAS A LEGISLATIVE CANDIDATE

Vacancies Created by His Withdrawal and That of Professor Krohn Not Yet Filled—W. N. Jones Succeeds Courtney, Regular.

J. A. Bushman, put up as a candidate for State Representative by the Simonites as a bid for the labor vote, has withdrawn from the ticket. No attempt has been made to replace him or Robert Krohn, who resigned his candidacy Saturday, as the Simon leaders are waiting for further resignations. The vacancy on the regular Republican Legislative ticket created by the resignation of A. A. Courtney was filled yesterday by the County Central Committee, which named W. N. Jones for the place. Mr. Jones is a well-known business man, and will make a strong run.

J. A. Bushman, president of the Millmen's Union, and put by the Simonites on their Legislative ticket as a bid for labor votes, is the latest man to swell the rapidly growing ranks of deserters from the ticket. Mr. Bushman withdrew yesterday, and the Simonists are waiting for more resignations before setting in the matter of filling vacancies. The situation was discussed in deep gloom at the meeting of the Simon steering committee last night, and it was decided that it would be more important to keep what men are left on the ticket in their places than to put up others to give fresh trouble by refusing to serve. Professor Robert Krohn, of the public school, learned Saturday that he would be just as well situated off the ticket as on it, as far as chances for election were concerned, and quietly withdrew. Other candidates for the Legislature are very much dissatisfied, but herculean efforts to keep them in line are being put forth, and the Simon leaders believe that they will succeed in so doing. They will await further developments, however, before taking any steps to put up more men, as they believe the job can be done as a whole better than in piecemeal.

The Citizens' managing committee held a meeting in the county headquarters in the Worcester block last evening, and spent two hours discussing the plan of campaign in this city and county. There was a full attendance of the committee. After the meeting adjourned it was stated that no attempt had been made to fill the Legislative vacancies, and that no action in that direction would likely be taken within the next few days. J. A. Blackburn was selected as a candidate for Road Supervisor in road district No. 1. The executive committee of the Republican State Central Committee held an hour's session last evening. W. N. Jones, a civil engineer by occupation and a heavy property-owner in this state, was selected to succeed A. A. Courtney on the Legislative ticket. Mr. Jones has resided in Portland about 12 years, and is well and favorably known in business circles. He is now in California on business, but it is known that he will accept the nomination.

Zimmerman was named for Councilman in the Seventh Ward, to fill the vacancy left by the County Convention. Mr. Zimmerman is a successful business man in this city, where he has a large meat packing establishment. He is also heavily interested in mines in Lane County.

D. V. Hart, of the Eleventh Ward, was chosen as the Republican candidate for City Road Supervisor. He is the present incumbent of the Road Supervisor's office in his precinct.

REPUBLICANS ARE SATISFIED. And Will Vote Ticket Straight Throughout Oregon.

The managers of the Republican state campaign have been busy for some time making a poll of the state to ascertain what foundation there is for the report that Republicans in several counties are dissatisfied. Reports have been coming in for two or three days, and several letters were received yesterday. From every source comes the statement that there is no appreciable opposition to the state ticket among the Republicans. In local matters some of the disappointed candidates have shown a disposition to knife the successful candidates, but even this is rapidly disappearing. So far as the Republicans from having an intention to fight any part of the ticket, that in those counties where candidates for state offices were disappointed it seems that a special effort will be made to bring out more than the full party vote. The Democrats have apparently made a mistake in circulating the stories of dissatisfaction, for they have only set the Republicans to work to close any possible breach in the ranks.

A quiet canvass has also been made in Multnomah County among those voters who have been known as Simon Republicans, to ascertain the intentions of the individuals regarding the state and county tickets. It has been learned that although there are some Republicans in Portland who will scratch the local ticket, they will as a rule vote the state ticket straight. In answer to questions put to them, the alleged scratchers say that they are Republicans and will vote the Republican ticket. Some of them indicate a disposition, however, to vote for one or more of the local candidates, as their preferences may direct. It is manifest after securing reliable information that the extent of the dissatisfaction in Multnomah County has been grossly overestimated and that it will not materially affect the state ticket.

Letters have been received from Baker City saying that while the Democrats were enthusiastic over Chamberlain, this enthusiasm did not have the effect of influencing the Republicans. The Democratic leaders had hoped to create a stampede for Chamberlain. In that respect the campaign rally was not a success, as the Republicans are standing solidly by their own candidates.

STRONG FOR FURNISH.

Man Who Opposed Him in Convention Will Work for Him.

Hon. E. D. Briggs, member of the last Oregon Legislature from Douglas and Jackson Counties, was in the city yesterday on business. He is a prominent business man at Ashland, and is taking no active part in politics at this time, though he was one of the delegates to the Republican state convention from his county. Prior to 1898 Mr. Briggs was a Democrat. When the money question became the issue, he left his party, and with many others, voted with the Republicans. What effect the action of the Sound Money Democrats had on the election may be seen from the fact that though Jackson County was for years the banner Democratic county of the state, it has been enrolled in the Republican column. Two years ago, Mr. Briggs was nominated on the Republican Legislative ticket in a joint district which had been Democratic by 100 majority. When seen at the Imperial Hotel yesterday and asked regarding the political situation in his county, Mr. Briggs said:

"So far as I have learned, the Republican ticket will carry Jackson County by at least a large majority as McKinley received in 1900. I believe that all the voters who left the Democratic party during the last six years will remain with the Republican party and will take pleasure in voting for W. J. Furnish, who became a Republican when they did. There seems to be a disposition among former members of the regular People's party to go to the Republican party rather than to the Democrats. Both parties have increased the chief principle of Populism—the initiative and referendum amendment. The Democrats have been claiming credit for the adoption of this plank, and seem to consider the initiative and referendum as a strictly Democratic doctrine. But the Populists think they were the means of bringing this proposed amendment to its present promising position in political affairs, and they resent the claims of the Democrats. While many Populists will be identified with the Democratic party, I expect to find a large portion of the members of the regular People's party voting the Republican ticket."

"Among the Republicans, there seems to be a desire to make a special effort to roll up a good vote for Mr. Furnish, not that we want to favor any particular candidate, but that we wish to prove our loyalty. Jackson County sent a Geer delegation to the state convention. We wanted Geer renominated, but we were fairly beaten in the convention, and we don't want anything to happen which would indicate that we are sore. We are not sore, but will help to make the majority for Furnish as large as possible."

"In our local affairs, we have a strong Republican ticket, and it will be enthusiastically supported. The candidate for joint Representative for Douglas and Jackson Counties, J. M. Hainsbrough, is a particularly strong man, and will be a good vote-getter."

EASTERN OREGON ALL RIGHT.

Judge Ellis Says Furnish Sentiment Is Strong.

Ex-Congressman W. B. Ellis, of Hepburn, was a visitor at Republican state headquarters yesterday. He says that from what he has observed he judges that the Republican ticket in this state will be elected with the usual party majority.



He says that the members of the party in Northeastern Oregon seem to be entirely satisfied with the ticket and are pleased to have an Eastern Oregon man at the head of it. He says that Mr. Furnish is particularly strong in his own county, and will get many Democratic votes there. While the Democrats realize that Mr. Furnish is a power in politics and feel the loss they sustained when he left the party, yet those who know him personally have a high regard for his integrity and ability, and many will vote for him for that reason. Judge Ellis is of the opinion that Judge Lowell will have no material effect in the campaign. Judge Lowell's friends were sorry to see him take the position he did, and will not follow his example.

ARRANGING FOR SPEAKERS.

Assistant Secretary Allen Gets Busy in New Office.

Harrison Allen, of Astoria, who was appointed a secretary of the state central committee Saturday, opened an office in the Benson block yesterday. During the day he was in conference with W. J. Furnish, Republican nominee for Governor, and other Republican candidates regarding the itinerary of the campaign. The dates and places at which addresses



will be made will be announced in a few days. Since several of the Republican nominees are now in office and cannot well leave their desks for extended tours, it is probable that much of the campaign speaking will be assigned to prominent speakers in various parts of the state. The Republican part of the fight promises to be short but sharp.

Democrats on the Road.

George E. Chamberlain, Henry Blackburn, W. A. Wann and D. W. Sears came down from Baker City yesterday morning and left last evening for Southern Oregon, where the Democratic campaign will be continued. Addresses will be made at Medford and Ashland April 23, and at Grants Pass April 24. J. H. Riley, candidate for Attorney-General, stopped off at Pendleton, and will join the other candidates at Roseburg May 1.

PILOTS CAUGHT IN FOG. Therefore They Could Not See the Ship Strategy.

"It is bad enough to be condemned for alleged sayings and doings, but for his sake do not blame us for the acts of Providence also."

Thus appeals Captain C. M. Gunderson, of the Oregon bar pilots, to the Portland Chamber of Commerce. The motive for the lamentation is the complaint of Captain Gordon, master of the steamship Strategy. Captain Gordon declares he had to lay to at the mouth of the Columbia for 14 hours because he could not get a pilot. He wrote to the Portland Chamber of Commerce, saying that the delay was unnecessary; that it caused loss to the charterers of his ship; that there was abundant opportunity for a pilot to come on board, but that not a sign of one was to be seen on the face of the waters. The Chamber referred the letter to the Pilot Commissioners.

Captain Gunderson says the pilot-boat was on the outside on the lookout for the Strategy, which was expected to arrive. But the schooner Joseph Pulitzer was shut in by fog. "That we were shut in by fog," says he, "was our misfortune, not our fault. Three pilots were there on board—Captain Gunderson, Captain E. Johnson and Captain J. Tilton."

A worse looking object than was Demartini as he appeared at the Good Samaritan Hospital last night about 6 o'clock would be hard to find. His clothes were torn into shreds, and his hands and arms horribly scratched and bleeding. When he was feeding the lions he allowed himself to get a little too near the cage. The second lion liked the fun also and seized this arm and began to tear it with his terrible claws.

Before the unfortunate man could free himself his clothes were in shreds and his arms torn and scratched in a frightful condition. The only wonder is that his face and eyes were spared. He was taken at once to the Good Samaritan Hospital, where the house doctors carefully dressed his wounds, but they say he cannot hope to use his arms for several weeks.
