

TICKET IN YAMHILL

Republicans Hold an Enthusiastic Convention.

THE NOMINATIONS ARE COVETED

W. A. Howe Named to Succeed Himself as State Senator—Resolution for Three-Cent Per Mile Railroad Fare.

Yamhill County Republicans, in convention assembled, heartily endorse the state ticket and platform, and strongly denounce the "scout" policy of the Democrats. B. L. Eddy, nominee for joint Representative from Tillamook and Yamhill Counties, was endorsed for Speaker of the House.

MINNIVILLE, Or., May 1.—The Republican county convention for Yamhill County was called to order this morning at 10 o'clock by Judge R. P. Bird, chairman of the County Central Committee. Wash Laughlin, of Carlton, was unanimously elected temporary chairman. C. M. Henderson, of Newberg, was elected temporary secretary, and F. M. York, of Carlton, assistant secretary. Committees were then appointed.

E. V. Littlefield, of Minnville, moved that P. P. Olds, of La Fayette, be authorized to prepare and file certificates of nomination before 12 o'clock P. M. this evening. The motion was carried. Adjournment to 1 o'clock was then taken. On resuming the committee on order of business recommended that the temporary officers be made permanent. A motion to this effect was unanimously adopted. The report of the credentials committee was then read and adopted, and central committees announced.

The report of the committee on resolutions was received with enthusiasm and unanimously adopted. It follows: The Republican party of Yamhill County, in convention assembled, most heartily endorse the platform adopted by the Republican state convention, which convened in Portland, April 2, and also the state ticket, which was named at that time. Believing that the cause of the Democratic party is a policy of obstruction and cowardice unbecoming the American people, and that the Democratic party is a party of the people, we, the Republican party of Yamhill County, do hereby endorse the platform and ticket of the Republican party of Oregon as an able, far-seeing legislator and gentleman is exemplary, and constitute a matter of pride to his constituents, be it.

Resolved, That the Republicans of Yamhill County give Mr. Eddy their heartiest support for re-election, and induce him for Speaker of the House at its next session.

Believing that the present railroad rate for transportation is higher than is necessary, we would recommend that the Legislature establish a uniform rate of 3 cents per mile throughout the state.

Resolved, That the present law for the collection of taxes, as passed by the last Legislature, as well as the road law in force, should be properly amended as best suited to the interests of the taxpayer.

It was then announced that nominations were in order for Senator, W. A. Howe, of Carlton, who served in the last Legislature; Jesse Edwards, of Newberg, and J. M. Crawford, of Dayton, were placed in nomination. Howe received the nomination on the first ballot.

For County Clerk, G. W. Jones, of McMinnville; Samuel Laughlin, of North Yamhill; C. B. LaFollet, of Sheridan; George W. Cone, of McMinnville; Arthur E. Lambert, of McMinnville, were nominated. Sumner Laughlin received the nomination on the second ballot.

For Sheriff, T. P. Coughlin, of Dayton, was nominated by acclamation. For Recorder, H. L. Hoskins, present incumbent, of Newberg, was nominated by acclamation. For Commissioner, T. M. Laughlin, of North Yamhill, and T. R. Willis, of McMinnville, were nominated. Willis was nominated.

For Treasurer, H. Z. Foster was nominated by acclamation. For Assessor, E. U. Henderson, of Sheridan, J. M. Yoon, of McMinnville, C. F. Daniels, of McMinnville; John Evenden, of Sheridan; A. B. Chandler, of Bellevue, and Martin Miller, of Dayton, were named. A. B. Chandler was nominated on the third ballot.

For Surveyor, C. E. Branson, of McMinnville, was nominated by acclamation. For Coroner, T. B. Cummings, of Newberg, and A. H. Thomas, of Sheridan, were named. Cummings was nominated. The ticket is considered an exceptionally strong one, geographically and personally.

FOR GEORGE FOR SENATOR.
Petition Filed at Salem Asking That His Name Be on Ballot.

SALEM, May 1.—A petition having nearly 300 signatures, was filed in the office of Secretary of State Dunbar this afternoon, asking Governor Geor to allow his name to appear on the official ballot for an expression from the voters at the general election in June, as to their choice for United States Senator, as provided in the May 1 law. This is the only petition filed thus far, under the May 1 law.

The petition came principally from Marion, Polk, Yamhill, Clatsop and Multnomah Counties, although there are occasional signatures from nearly every county in the state. Marion heads the list with 200 names. Some of the other lists have signatures approximately as follows: Yamhill, 50; Clatsop, 34; Union, 15; Clackamas, 24; Polk, 8; Douglas, 13; Linn, 10; Washington, 17; Multnomah, 22.

pieces of the Republican party, and we respectfully petition that the official ballot be furnished for said election in the manner provided by law, to be voted for as our choice for United States Senator in Congress. We represent that we are qualified electors of the State of Oregon, and that our respective places of residence are set opposite our names.

Governor Geor was seen after the petition had been filed, but refused to be interviewed on his candidacy for the United States Senate, other than to state that he would probably give out a statement soon.

Secretary of State Dunbar will arrange the names on the official ballot, which will be announced in a few days. The law provides the ballot must be arranged not sooner than 30 days, nor later than 28 days immediately preceding the date of election. The names of candidates for United States Senator, as interpreted by statute, will probably be placed at the foot of the ballot. Section 6 of the Oregon general election law provides that the ballot be arranged in the following form: (1) Candidates for state offices, (2) for district and county offices, (3) for principal offices, (4) for other offices or constitutional amendments or questions submitted to a vote of the people. The Senatorial candidates will probably be placed in the fourth classification.

Democratic Nominees at Roseburg.
ROSEBURG, Or., May 1.—Democratic Nominees Chamberlain, Weatherford, Blackman, Wann and Riley addressed a large audience here tonight, the occasion being the opening of the campaign in this county. All parts of the county were represented. The general tenor of the speeches was the same as rendered elsewhere. Weatherford and Riley spoke very briefly, but will return here later. The candidates go to Cottage Grove and Eugene tomorrow. The county campaign opens at Glendale Saturday.

Prohibition Ticket Filed.
SALEM, May 1.—The Marion County Prohibition ticket was filed with County Clerk Hall today. The Prohibitionists will make a regular canvass of this county, but will arrange for speakers of state and National reputation in the interest of the Prohibition movement. Professor R. W. Kelsey, of Newberg, will speak in Salem on May 14, and James A. Tate, of Ashland, Tenn., National secretary of the Prohibition party, will deliver an address in this city on May 15.

To Encourage Registration.
BAKER CITY, May 1.—In order to accommodate the people who cannot find time to register during the regular hours, County Clerk Geddes has arranged to keep his office open evenings for two hours after the regular office hours. This will be a great convenience to people who cannot find the time to attend to registration during the regular office hours.

EXAMINE BAGGAGE AT SEA.
Custom-House Officers Might Sail With Ships and Work on Route.

New York Herald.
A correspondent offers a solution of the trouble in re the customs inspection of baggage of steamer passengers, which, if elaborated and systematized, might end the matter. He writes: "I have made more than 20 trips in and out of New York harbor, and, therefore, have heard the question discussed by all kinds of passengers."

"Let the Treasury Department put on board the steamers inspectors who go with them, and have them inspect the baggage enroute."

"These objections will be advanced: '1. That the inspectors cannot get at the baggage, but as passengers are permitted to get at their baggage enroute at certain hours of the day, it follows that the baggage is conveniently stored.' '2. Passengers might put 'amused goods' into the trunks from their staterooms, after inspection. Well, let the passengers, each of whom is required to indicate the trunks which they do not use on the trip; let the inspectors inspect, on board, all such and seal them, with the understanding that the place of baggage with extra care on the dock."

"There will be to examine on the dock thereafter only the hand baggage practically, and the person, which will require ordinarily very little time."

"The inspectors would have ample time to acquaint themselves with the passengers, and such of them as are found to be reputable may be given passes to leave the dock, thus leaving the way cleared and the crowd thinned for the convenience of the customs officials to examine the unknown."

"If the inspectors appointed to go on the steamers are steady men, who do a day's work for a day's pay, just as the employees of the steamship companies, there will be positive economy in it for the Government."

Officers Released.
Men From the Chicago Returned to Their Vessel.

ROME, May 1.—The King has released the officers of the United States cruiser Chicago, who have been imprisoned at Venice. They will be immediately handed over to the Italian States Court, from whose charge they will be transferred to the Chicago, which is ready to sail.

Officers Paid the Damages.
VENICE, May 1.—The imprisoned American naval officers, after afternoon generously indemnified the persons claiming damages for injury, and the public prosecutor telegraphed to Rome that all legal impediments to the prisoners' release were removed. The claims were adjusted, the claimants for damages had telegraphed to the Minister of Justice, Signor Cocchio Ordo, asking him not to accede to the petition for pardon.

Defective Switch and Track.
KAHOKA, Mo., May 1.—The Coroner's jury on the Santa Fe wreck at Cama, Mo., returned a verdict finding that the wreck was caused by a defective switch and a defective track.

Queen Wilhelmina's Condition.
THE HAGUE, May 1.—The bulletin posted this morning at Castle Lee, referring to the health of Queen Wilhelmina, announced that Her Majesty's condition was satisfactory.

Archbishop Corrigan is Better.
NEW YORK, May 1.—Archbishop Corrigan was much improved today, and his physicians said that he was well on the way toward recovery.

Killed by a Train.
MISSOULA, Mont., May 1.—Thomas B. Douglass, of Columbia Falls, was struck and killed by a Northern Pacific passenger train this side of Eddy, a small station west of here.

Oil at Shallow Depth.
AUSTIN, Texas, May 1.—A strike of oil has been made at Waters Station, a few miles from this place. The oil was found at the shallow depth of 50 feet.

Will Play M. A. A. C. in This City.

BERKELEY, Cal., May 1.—Following closely upon the departure of the University of California track team for the

East today, comes the announcement that the University of California baseball team departs on May 15 for an extensive trip through the Northern States and Canada. The itinerary for the trip is nearly completed, and the college ball players have arranged to meet the leading teams in the Northwest.

The Californians will go direct to Portland, where they will meet the Multnomah Athletic Club nine on May 21. The next games will be played on May 23 and 24, at Victoria, B. C., during the celebration of the anniversary of Queen Victoria's coronation. During the latter part of May a game will be played at Roselyn, Canada, and on June 1 at Spokane. Two games will be played at Butte, Montana, and one each at Great Falls and Helena. Upon the return trip bats will be crossed at Spokane, Vancouver, Tacoma, Seattle and Namsam. Games will be played on July 3 and 4 at Portland.

The team representing the State University won the intercollegiate series from Stanford. Out of 15 games played this season, the team lost but two. Eleven men, besides Trainer Walter Christy and Manager Decoto, are expected to represent the University of California in dual meets with the big universities in the annual American intercollegiate games at Mott Haven. The eleven are the pick of the university, and almost without exception are first-class men in their events, capable, if in condition, of competing with the best anywhere. They are: Alfred D. Plaw, hammer-thrower and shot-putter; Roy R. Service, mile and a half runner; Francis H. Reedwill, mile runner; Anthony Cadogan, 100, 200 and 400 yard runner; Emily R. Shadle, 100-yard sprinter; Edward M. Hussey, broad jumper and captain of the team; William A. Powell and Herbert C. Cheek, hurdler and high jumper; R. A. Tibbets, two-mile runner; J. A. Wilcox, pole-vaulter; Edward Topham, broad jumper and quarter-mile runner. All the members of the team are students of the Academic College, at Berkeley, with the exception of Topham, who is a senior in the medical department.
