Tillman's Defense of White Supremacy in the South.

SENSATIONAL TALK IN SENATE

War Would Be Continued, Had It Been Known Negroes Were to Get Reins of Government.

In a sensational speech in the Senate, Tillman defended white supremacy in the South by means of the shotgun and the gallows.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—Discussion of the Philippine bill in the Senate took a sensational turn today, McComas referring to the alleged cruelties of American soldiers in the Philippines.

These remarks drew a sensational reply from Tillman, who declared that it was no longer possible to shift the responsibility for the infamies committed by the Americans in the Philippines.

The South would not submit to negro domination, he insisted that in order to maintain their self-respect the white people of the South had been obliged to take the negro by whatever means they could, using the shotgun as one of the means.

He urged that discussion of the Southern race question should cease. "You are tearing us apart," he said, "about our treatment of the negroes in the South, hoping at the same time that we will not interfere with your game of devilry in the Philippines.

Burton declared that he never had heard such language as that of Tillman. "Everybody is talking about the 'man cure' in the South," he said, "judges of other by himself. A man who, upon this floor, can defend slavery and government by the shotgun cannot be expected to think very highly of men who are trying to bring good government to the Philippines.

When the Senate convened today, Cullum, chairman of the foreign relations committee, reported favorably a bill making appropriations for the diplomatic and consular service of the United States in the Republic of Cuba.

McComas addressed the Senate in support of the measure. After declaring that the war with Spain had been forced on the United States by the Democrats, and that the Philippines had come to this country through that war, McComas asserted that in the debates on the Philippine question the Democrats ignored all history and ignored the treaty which they helped to ratify.

"The Senator now has quoted me correctly. And for these statements I stand responsible," he said. "I stand responsible."

Burton declared there was no authentic instance of the intentional killing of women and children by our troops in the Philippines. "The Senator is lying," he exclaimed. "I stand responsible."

Burton devoted a great part of his speech to a denunciation of General Funston, whom he made recently the subject of a sarcastic arraignment by Carmack. He ridiculed the Tennessee Senator's discussion of General Funston, and sarcastically suggested that he should stampede the entire Southern vote into the Democratic column.

McComas said the policy of the majority was one of scuttles, and that they would steal autonomy from the islands and leave them to anarchy and imperialism.

Referring to elections in the South, McComas said that the Senators from South Carolina and Mississippi (Tillman and McComas) cried out against the small percentage of voters in the early elections in the Philippines.

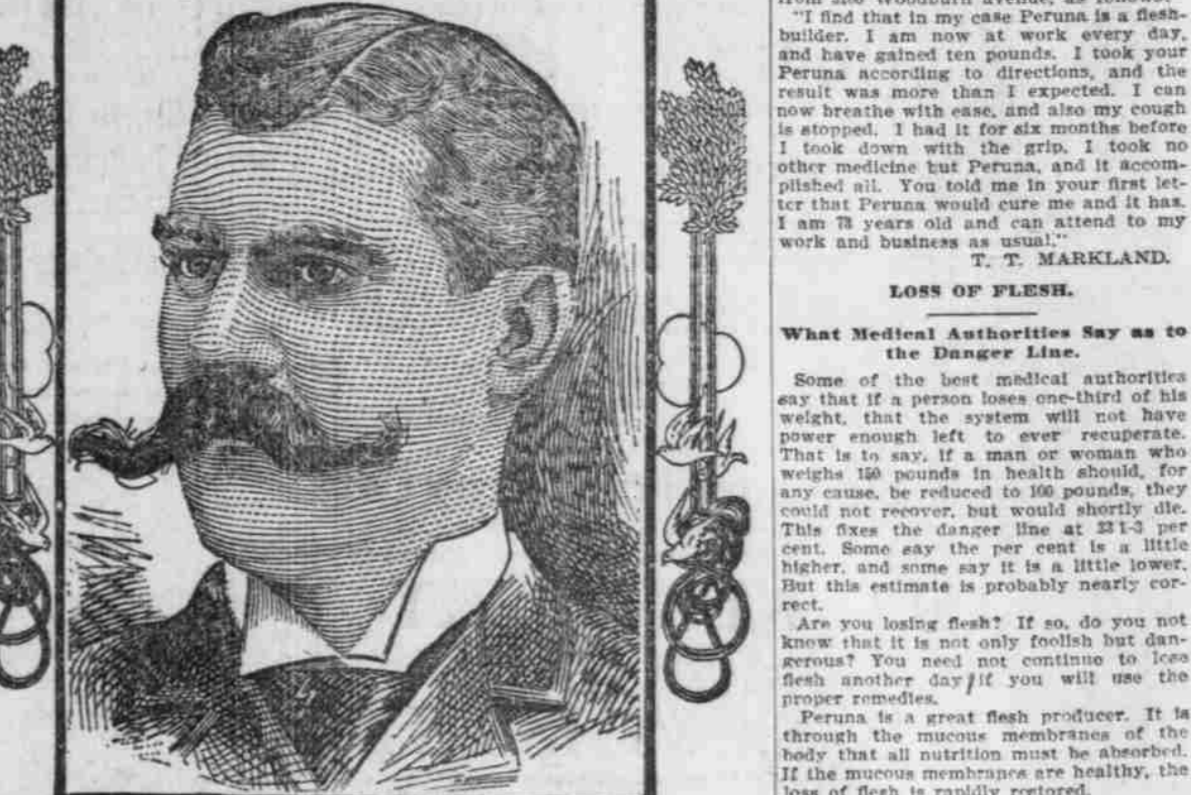

STRIKE OR NO STRIKE

CHAFFEE GOES TO MINDANAO.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—General Chaffee called today on the trustees of the Leeward District of the Island of Mindanao, General Davis telegraphed that he thought the presence of the Military Governor of the Philippines in Manila would have a favorable effect on the prominent Moros, and General Chaffee immediately replied by going to Mindanao. He has ordered General Davis to arrange a conference with the Moros and to report on the situation. A post will be established at Camp Victoria, where the troops now are. Little information can be obtained concerning the Moros, as the Moros are very reticent. Only two or three amputations will be necessary, and that no deaths are likely to occur. General Chaffee took with him a quantity of medical supplies and two doctors. He thinks there will be no more fighting, unless the troops are attacked where they now are.

CHICAGO STRIKE SITUATION.

CHICAGO, May 7.—The railway strike situation in Chicago took on a threatening aspect today when the employees of the North and West Sids demanded that a strike be called immediately, because some of their number have been discharged. President Bowen and other members of the executive committee of the Council of Labor will call on President John M. Roach, of the Union Trust Company, tomorrow, and will ask if it is the intention of the management to discharge all the car line employees who are connected with the union. What course the federation will pursue if Mr. Roach declines to meet the board is not known.

Butte Strike Is Off.

BUTTE, Mont., May 7.—The hoisting engineers of the Amalgamated Copper Mining Company's mines have declared their strike off. The men failed to obtain the support of the stationary engineers' union and of the Silver Bow Trades and Labor Assembly, and this is supposed to have broken the strike. The strikers, in number, demanded an increase in wages, and being refused, walked out, tying up nine of the biggest copper mines in Butte and throwing several thousand men out of work.

Denver Lumbermen Strike.

DENVER, May 7.—The local lumbermen's union, with a membership of 275 men, declared a strike this afternoon, and business came to a standstill in most of the city lumber-yards. The union demands an increase of 8 to 12 per cent in wages. About half the woodworkers who went on strike yesterday returned to work today, the eight-hour day being conceded at several mills.

SAMPSON'S FUNERAL.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—According to the present arrangement, the funeral services over the remains of the late Rear-Admiral Sampson will take place at 10:30 Friday morning, at the Church of the Covenant. The remains then will be taken to Arlington for interment, accompanied by a splendid military and naval escort. Secretary Moody will issue a general order announcing Admiral Sampson's death to the Naval service and prescribing the half-masting and other observations which will be carried out on board ship and at navy-yards and stations all over the world. The order also will pay a tribute to the services rendered to the Navy by Admiral Sampson. The pallbearers have not yet been selected. It is understood that as many as five available ship Captains who were with the North Atlantic Squadron in the West Indian campaign will serve. Rear-Admirals Taylor and Higginson and Captains Chadwick, Clark and Cook are among the officers mentioned in this connection. Secretary Moody will invite the members of the Cabinet to attend the funeral, and it is probable that President Roosevelt, who was a warm friend of the Admiral, will be present. Secretary Moody also will invite the members of the Cabinet.

NAVY CADETS WILL ATTEND.

ANNAPOLIS, Md., May 7.—The Naval Academy authorities have received word from Washington ordering the naval cadets to attend the interment of the remains of Rear-Admiral W. T. Sampson, in Arlington cemetery Friday.

MUNICIPAL LEAGUE.

T. N. Strong, of Portland, Elected Third Vice-President. BOSTON, May 7.—All sections of the country were represented by the delegates gathered here today to participate in the eighth annual meeting of the National Municipal League. The secretary of the league, Clinton Rogers Woodruff, of Philadelphia, presented a paper on "A Year's Municipal Progress," in which he dwelt on the growth of sentiment in favor of municipal ownership. Professor Charles Zuehlke, of Chicago, president of the American League for Civic Improvement, gave an interesting account of its work during the last year. The chief address was made by James Everhart, of Baltimore, on "The Movement of Honest Government."

FIGHT WITH A POSSE.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 7.—Five men have been killed in Floyd County by Constable Reedy and a posse as the result of the murder of Colonel Osborne and Budd Little, two weeks ago. James Tompkins and Walter Jones are said to have been two of the men killed, but the names of the others are unknown. According to reports, the men engaged in a desperate fight with a posse and were shot to death while resisting arrest.
