CLUBWOMEN AT PASADENA

DELEGATES TO FEDERATION ARE WELL ENTERTAINED. Many of Eastern Representatives En Route Home Via Portland—Oregonians Leave Los Angeles.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., May 9.—This has been Pasadena Day, and there remains nothing more for California's women to do, for they have made this sixth biennial the most successful and delightful in the history of the Woman's Club Federation. When we reached Pasadena we were invited to partake of an elegant lunch, consisting of the usual good things, with the added California specialties—orange marmalade and oranges—then carriages were provided to take the visitors about the city. As Mr. and Mrs. Robert J. Burdette kept open house all day at "Sunny-Crest," and the Shakespear Club was "at home," there was a constant stream of carriages wending their way through Orange Grove avenue, the chief residence portion of Pasadena. The Portland delegates were especially interested in the beautiful house and grounds of Mrs. Reed, a former Portlander, but nothing could have been more charming than the gracious hospitality of "Sunny-Crest." This is an ideal home, crowning a hill which commands a view of the valley and range of mountains. The Raymond Hotel and the Green attracted many visitors, and then, as a grand finale, came the reception at the Anne Hathaway Cottage. Here flowers peeped over flowers, and flowers on flowers arose, and the fragrance of orange blossoms filled the air. Here the beauty and brain of Pasadena stood ready to welcome us and make glad our hearts with gifts of their most beautiful flowers. The ostrich farm attracted considerable attention, while Mount Lowe, the kite-shaped track and Catalina Island also came in for much attention. The streets of Los Angeles are beginning to lose their peculiar festive air which the women have given them during the convention. Two of the Oregon delegates, Mrs. Wade and Mrs. Dunaway, left for home this afternoon. Mrs. Hoyt goes to Santa Cruz, Mrs. Miller to Redlands and Mrs. Hidden to Monterey, all taking advantage of the stop-over privileges allowed.

A large party is now en route to the Yosemite, and another to the Yellowstone Park. Many are returning by the North-west route, so I pray you, good people of Portland and the North, have your latch-strings out when these women, the brightest and fairest in the land, call upon you. They are taking with them folders and cards and advertising matter setting forth every industry, every vantage, every attraction of the great state, and no gathering has ever come here that will more effectively advertise the state and magnify it before the people.

This biennial attracted more attention from the press of the country than any former meeting. Several of the best magazines and special story-writers were in attendance. This afternoon General and Mrs. Harrison Gray Otis threw open their home, "The Bivouac," in their honor. There were 72 representatives of the press from nearly every state in the town. The Associated Press sent Miss Bertha Demaris Knobe this year for the third time, to handle the biennial proceedings. Miss Knobe has done good service for the great National news-gatherers.

If the red and white blood tooth shells adorning the dresses of the delegates and local women may be taken as evidence, women are superstitious. Fifteen hundred of these shells were distributed en route to Long Beach. To wear one of these blood tooth shells, if it has been given to you, will bring you good luck. If you wear one you yourself have purchased, no good luck will hover over you.

The newspapers this morning did not do Mrs. Platt Decker justice. The scenes depicted as enacted during the nomination of President were greatly exaggerated. The women of the convention will always hold Mrs. Decker in great esteem, and the regret of the majority is that she would not allow herself to be nominated, because she had pledged herself to Mrs. Denison. While saying this, I would not convey the impression that there was dissatisfaction because of the election of Mrs. Denison, only that the Middle West and Northwest wanted a Western woman. Considering that the great questions, the color line and reorganization, were before me, I regard this as having been a remarkably harmonious gathering. Before adjournment, the president-elect was introduced by Mrs. Lowe, and she in turn introduced the incoming officers and board of directors. Then the great audience rose for the singing of the National Anthem, the president spoke a few words of farewell, and the sixth biennial convention was closed.

ARIZONA DELEGATE ILL.

Marcus A. Smith Stricken on the Floor of the House.

WASHINGTON, May 9.—Delegate Marcus A. Smith, of Arizona, was taken ill on the floor of the House today at the close of a brief but vehement speech on the statehood bill, in which he is deeply interested. Three members of the House, who are physicians—Messrs. Gilson, Showalter and Ball, attended him, and for a time they feared that serious results might follow. Mr. Smith was conscious, but an examination by the physicians indicated that he had been threatened with an apoplectic attack. The doctors remained in almost continuous consultation, being fearful that apoplexy might result. Shortly after 2 o'clock Mr. Smith had rallied sufficiently from the attack to permit his removal to the Shoreham Hotel. He was able, with the aid of Representative Wilson and Senator Blackburn, of Kentucky, to walk to the carriage. His physicians were much encouraged. It was said at his hotel at a late hour tonight that Mr. Smith was resting easily, that his condition had improved during the evening, and it was believed he was out of danger.
