PLENTY OREGON GRANITE

ONE OF THE LARGEST LEDGES IN THE WORLD IN LINN COUNTY.

Manager Stone, of Corvallis & Eastern Railroad, Tells of Its Merits—Excellent Quality and Cheap.

Manager Edwin Stone, of the Corvallis & Eastern Railroad, takes exception to a statement in The Oregonian that "this section, and in fact the whole state, is poor in matter of good building stone, which is the chief reason why so few stone buildings are erected here."

"I wish to call attention," says Mr. Stone, "to the fact that the whole state is poor in matter of good building stone, which is the chief reason why so few stone buildings are erected here."

It is estimated that \$25,000 is paid out to railroads every year for freight on granite from the East, chiefly Vermont, that is used in the Pacific Northwest—granite that is said not to be in any way better than that of the quarry on the Corvallis & Eastern.

There is good marble in Baker County, and marble and granite in Willamette. There is no lack of possible building stone anywhere in the state. The chief difficulty in making use of the more valuable native stone seems to be the reluctance of those interested to invest the necessary capital in a plant for sawing and polishing the stone.
