The professional baseball season in this city was opened yesterday afternoon by a game between Portland and Helena, which, though one-sided enough to drive the veteran fans, Lou Coulter, from the grandstand, was not without some splendid features. Flying catches by Deisel, at short, were reminiscent of the lanky Hansen's play in the outfield. Runs and quick returns by Partridge in the outfield called to mind the work of George Rhee, probably the greatest fielder the country has ever known. Anderson, at second, proved himself to be the best for the position, and Vigneux and Sullivan, behind the bat, brought up in the memory of the older of the 1500 or more spectators present the picture of Mills, the fastest catcher in the Northwest League in the early days of '90.

These were the features of the game, for, outside of the work done in the field and a home-run by Hupp, there was nothing that would create excitement. It was simply a case of too much Engle, whom Helena could not have reached consecutively with a boom of logs. The visitors made four hits, but only one of them produced a run, and that with the assistance of Mr. Davies, who mistook a youngster perched on the fence for his colleague, Mr. Wood. On the other hand, Helena's boxmen pitched as they batted, and the outfield practice. Wicks had plenty of speed and good curves, but it was impossible for him to get the curves over the plate. After the first inning, he had to launch every fourth ball straight, and as a result, the field was pretty well patronized—a great deal more than it would have been had he been able to depend upon his skill to prevent free passages to first. In the fifth he gave way to the steadier Partridge, who allowed himself to be rapped for three earned runs in a single inning, and then got down to effective work.

**Enthusiastic First-Day Crowd.**  
Helena's inferiority in the box was observed by the crowd after the first inning, and the visitors were made to feel as thoroughly at home as if they were in their own city. Every good play they made was cheered, and the twirlers were free from criticism. The crowd was like every first-day crowd. It was enthusiastic, and every welcome was welcomed when he picked up his bat. Each twirler who did any good work in the field received an ovation when he stepped to the plate, and then even the critics were cheered when he lumbered down to first on a base on balls.

Portland went first to the bat, and Muller, who pitched well, was on hand for the first time. That ended the run-getting. Shaffer, Peeples and Flannery were up before Engle, and neither one reached first, Engle stopping their grounders and cutting the bases before they were half way down the line.

In the second hit by Davies and Muller and a wild pitch by Wicks scored a run. Left on bases—Trotter, Hupp, and Flannery. Both pitchers were effective. ## CAREER OF A LEADING LAYAL FILIPINO.

One of the First to Give Up the Struggle Against the American.

And today, as I find myself in this situation, with my point of view of these matters changed, I am convinced not only on force, but on the right to do all, but that much more can be gained by reasonable conduct, since America, as a nation, that has not at heart reconciled to American occupation and slavery, is equally true that there are individuals whose loyalty since taking the oath has not been called in question. He was born at San Francisco de Malabon, some 36 years ago. This place is located about eight miles from Cavite Viejo, or Old Cavite, the home of Aguinaldo.
