The Federal census returns, recently published, giving wheat acreage in 1890, nocessitate a revision of estimates for recent years. The state totals are almost without exception larger than have been estimated by any authority, National, state or private. On the basis of the Federal consus, the American Agriculturist estimates the acreage of Winter wheat for the crop of 1902 at \$2,185,000 acres, or alightly larger than that of a rear ago. Spring wheat seeding is being delayed by excess of molature in parts of the Northwest, but in the southern half of the Spring wheat belt the work was completed in good season, and plant starting in reasonably good shape. Freliminary estimates of local observers indicate some reduction of Spring wheat acreage.


