Republican Victory Would Benefit the State.

OPINION OF A ST. LOUIS EDITOR

The Triumph of Democracy Might Obstruct an Appropriation Bill in Congress—Expansion and Its Results in the West.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., May 22.—(To the Oregonian.)—A Republican victory in Oregon's June election will be of immeasurable benefit to the Lewis and Clark Fair project. Lewis and Clark's exploration of the Columbia River Valley in 1805-06 gave the United States one of its earliest and strongest claims on the Oregon country, comprising the present States of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, and parts of Montana and Wyoming. That claim rightly acknowledged in the treaty of 1846, which took her out of the disputed territory and carried the United States boundary on to the Pacific. The Lewis and Clark Fair of 1905 is intended to commemorate one of the largest and greatest territorial expansions in American history.

The Republicans of Oregon, like their brethren throughout the country, are champions of National expansion. Oregon's Democrats, in demanding in their platform that the United States shall get out of the Philippines, proclaim their hostility to National expansion. If Oregon elects a Democratic Governor and Democratic Congress the country will say, especially as the state is normally Republican, that it has proven traitorous to the principle which carried the Stars and Stripes from the Rocky Mountains to the Pacific and which put Oregon and its neighbors on the map of the United States. The Governor who is about to be elected will hold office until after the fair. If the Democratic candidate is chosen the state's chief executive will be committed against the policy which the fair is designed to commemorate, and will thus be held by Congress and the country to be an enemy of the fair which his state and the entire Pacific Coast should have a vital interest in promoting.

Oregon is soon to ask Congress for an appropriation for the Lewis and Clark Fair. A Democratic victory in the coming election would throw many obstacles in the way of getting money for this purpose from a Republican Congress. As Oregon is generally Republican, show an apathy or a faithlessness to principle on her part which would make supporters of thousands of persons throughout the country indifferent to the fair, who now ardently favor it. Primarily there is no politics in the Lewis and Clark Fair, and ought not to be. But in a country like ours, with two parties constantly confronting each other, and each anxious to secure a technical advantage over the other by promoting or opposing every important measure, politics necessarily touches in one shape or another, all the great questions which come before state or Nation. The Republican party is dominant socially and politically throughout the United States. It is dominant in wealth, in intelligence, in numbers and influence, and appreciation of projects like that of 1905. It is chiefly to the Republicans in Congress and to the Republican masses throughout the country that the fair must look for the support which will make that enterprise a success if it is to succeed. These are facts which the people of Oregon do well calmly, sanely and courageously to face.

DUAL TRACK MEET TODAY

Fine Programme Promised on Multnomah Field.

The second annual dual track meet between the Multnomah Amateur Athletic Club and the University of Oregon will be held on M. A. C. field this afternoon, and some exceptionally fine sport is promised. Ed Murphy arrived here from Portland yesterday, and is in the line for the events of today. Murphy is one of Multnomah's best men, and will be assisted in the field events and hurdles by the invincible Bert Kerrigan, who recently smashed two world's records at the club gymnasium. Murphy has been doing 11 feet in the pole-vault, and will try for a record this afternoon. He has recently developed considerable sprinting ability, and will make the Eugene men hustle in the short sprints and hurdles.

Games will represent the club in the short dashes, and ought to win the 220, as he holds the P. N. A. record for this event. In Payne, Redmond and Lewis the university has a trio of champions, and they are depended upon to win many points for their team. In the 440 and 880-yard runs, Payne will try conclusions with Bellinger, a new member of the club, who ran the 440 in 1:10 at Cornell University last season. Bellinger's records are somewhat better than those of the speedy Oregon lad, but the latter is in superior condition. Both teams will enter three men in every event, and the contest as a whole promises to be one of the closest ever held on Multnomah field. There are 12 events on the programme, and points count 5, 3 and 1, in order of finish. The team that scores 53 or more points will win out, but it is absolutely impossible to make any accurate forecast as to the result. The entry list is as follows:

Discus throw—Zan, Cooke and Chalmers, of M. A. C.; Thayer, Grider, Johnson, Hise and Penland, of Oregon.

Running high jump—Murphy, B. Kerrigan, O. Kerrigan, and Johnson, of M. A. C.; Payne, Thayer, Lewis and Henderson, of Oregon.
