**AMUSEMENTS TONIGHT.**

**NEED OF TRAVELERS' GUIDES.**—A party of travelers called at the Permanent Exhibit yesterday to look over the collection of Oregon products there. They were anxious to see the city, and inquired if there were observation cars on any of the street railways for the convenience of visitors. They said that in Denver, San Francisco, San Jose and other cities they found many of the electric railways special observation cars, which made several trips daily, some being in charge of a guide, who points out to the passengers all points of interest, and the scenery. They were told that nothing of the kind had been heard of here. George Lomberson says that there used to be a lot of little guide-books printed for distributing among visitors, giving all sorts of information about the city, but they are all gone, and he is unable to procure any more. He has a few pamphlets about Washington, Yamhill and Josephine Counties, but nothing about Portland, and he suggests that it would be well for some organization to take the matter in hand and provide some guide-books for distribution among strangers visiting the city.

**RETURN OF MR. WOOD.**—C. E. S. Wood, who has been East for the past six months on business, arrived home yesterday morning. He went to argue a case in the United States Supreme Court, and after he had done this, waited to argue another, the case of the City of Portland vs. Montgomery, but at the last moment it was laid over till next term. Mr. Wood has spent most of his time in New York, but has gravitated between Washington, Boston and Chicago, as business demanded. He says the winter East was not a very cold one, but he prefers the Oregon winter. He was very glad to get home, and is more than ever convinced that Oregon is the best part of the world. The thing that struck him most forcibly on his return was the need of better streets in Portland. He found some people on his travels who knew nothing about Oregon, but he also found that the best and highest-priced apples for sale in the markets of New York and Chicago were labeled Oregon apples.

**WAS IN "PARADISE."**—The records of births, deaths, contagious diseases, etc., in the city, kept at the City Hall, are supposed to serve some useful purpose, and those which are intelligible may. There was one case of smallpox, a contagious disease reported yesterday however, which is not likely to serve any useful purpose, as the various persons, some five or six in number, who copy these reports every day could not make head nor tail of it and had to drop it. It was to the effect that Carlotta Schaubach, 54 Fourth street, is afflicted with "paratuberculosis." No one about the City Hall knew what paratuberculosis was, and as there was no doctor's name signed to the return, no expert testimony could be procured. In such case it is advisable that the person making a return should sign them, or forget to hand them in.

Comrades will assemble at Grand Army Hall at 7 o'clock for the time for each service, and march in a body to the place of meeting. All veterans of any war, not members of the above posts, are invited to attend services with the comrades.

**SCATTERING CASES OF SMALLPOX.**—The health officials discovered another nest of smallpox patients yesterday, and a woman and five children were taken to the pesthouse from Second and Columbia. Two cases were also discovered at 346 Seventh street and added to those in the pesthouse, bringing the number of inmates up to 21. The buildings from which these persons were taken were thoroughly fumigated, but it is not certain that others have not contracted the disease from them. At this time there is small hope of the pesthouse being empty for some time.

**MONEY FOR GOVERNMENT SURVEY.**—E. R. Pond, president of the Oregon & California Land Co., assessors to the Oregon Central Military Road Co., has deposited about \$10,000 for the survey of 20 full and fractional townships lying southeasterly from Eugene, through the Cascade Forest Range Reserve, within the company's grant limits, and Surveyor-General McDermid has asked authority from the General Land Office to call for bids for the survey of the same. Advertisement will be made during the month of June.

**COMELY FOR COMMISSION MEN.**—The commission men on Front street have not looked with favor on the organization of the "Portland Produce Exchange," and when an effort was made to secure quarters for the Exchange among them, some of them tried to prevent this from being accomplished. An agent of the Exchange tried by offering higher rent than the commission men were paying, to secure one of the buildings occupied by them. When the owners of the property said to their tenants, "We have been offered \$25 or \$50 more rent, (as the case might be) for our buildings," the commission men were, with the exception of a few who had leases, obliged to "see the rates," and the result has been that the organization of the Produce Exchange has cost the commission men from \$25 to \$50 per month in the advance of rents. A fish dealer on Front street near Alder would not stand the advance of rent, and will move about the first of the month, and the Produce Exchange will occupy the building. The next thing the city will be seeking to collect rent from the commission men for doing business on the sidewalk, and from those who maintain stands or counters on them.

**PAYING OF FOURTH STREET RESUMED.**—The work of paying Fourth street, which has been delayed for the past day or two on account of the strike rendering it impossible to get sand hauled for the work, was resumed yesterday. The contractors bit on the plan of purchasing a lot of sand and set their own teams to hauling it, and were thus enabled to resume operations. The 100 feet on the west side of the street, in front of Woodward & Clark's store, which has been occupied by lumber, etc., having been cleared away, the pavement was laid there yesterday forenoon, and during the afternoon the blocks were flooded with hot pitch and sanded. The block-laying gang moved on down the street and resumed operations between Oak and Pine, and Howard Whiting, who has charge of the work, says that it will now proceed without further interruption, except on account of bad weather. blocks have been treated, and the pavement will be completed to Burnside street in a few days, and then the section of the street between Morrison and Jefferson will be taken in hand, and pushed to completion as rapidly as possible.

**STONE RACKS ALSO IN DISAPPEAR.**—Special Officer Thomas McCusker, of the Civic Improvement Association, says there is no more warrant for the stone bicycle racks that are appearing on Portland sidewalks than for the frame racks that have been removed. He deems them as objectionable as the racks that have been abolished, and wishes the public to know that they are in no wise authorized. He gives this notice, he says, in order that the people may not proceed under the impression that the stone racks will be continued by his association, and thereby suffer annoyance when it shall be necessary to remove the stone obstructions. Mr. McCusker thinks the light wire bicycle supports that may be fastened to a telephone or electric-light pole will escape censure, but he has no patience with structures that clutter the sidewalks.

**JAP RING'S UNDERSTAND SANITATION.**—Plumbing Inspector Hulme reports that the trouble at the Montana restaurant was caused by the Japanese proprietor not understanding anything about sanitary matters, as is generally the case with Asiatics. The discharge pipe from the sink in the kitchen became choked, and so the pipe was cut in two, and the slops from the sink were allowed to flow under the building. The condition of things under the floor can better be imagined than described. The plumbing inspector will see that the drains are put to rights, and then the Health Commissioner will see that the filth is cleared away from under the building, which it will be necessary to do at night.
