About \$888,750 has been spent by the Government for improvement of the entrance to Coos Bay, and the amount required for completion of the existing project, according to estimates of United States engineers, is \$1,791,412. The present plan is to obtain and maintain a channel of 20 feet deep at low tide rur ning straight out to sea, by means of two high-tide nibblestone jettles. This depth has already been obtained, however, by the construction of but one of the jettles, on the north side of the channel. Statistics for the year 1900 show that 206 marine craft arrived in Coos Bay and 268 departed, drawing up to 18 feet of water. Receipts were 12,337 tons of miscellaneous freight, and shipments 81,961 tons, including 38,602 tons of coal and 39,886 tens (26,591,527 feet) of lumber
